The collection is spectacular, and even the ladies had a wonderful time learning and seeing so many of the "war" vehicles that we have read about in our history


books. The two hours slipped into almost three, and we all felt this was an exceptional visit to an exceptional place.

Edgewood County Park & Nature Preserve by John McCabe

May's hike at Edgewood County Park and Nature Preserve, although it was a relatively short walk (about 3 miles), had something for everyone. There were lovely shady trails along steep canyons, sunny grassy hillsides with a wide variety of wildflowers (not to mention butterflies), hilltops covered with live oaks and buckeyes, and great views of the San Francisco Bay.

Among the flowers we saw were Blue Dick Lily, Blue Eyed Grass, Sticky Monkey Flower, Scarlet Pimpernel, Purple Sanicle, Owl's Clover, Hill Morning Glory, Indian Warrior, Lupine, California Poppy, Yellow Mariposa Lily, California

Buttercup, Ithuriel's Spear, Clarkia "Farewell to Spring", Tidy Tips, White Linanthus, Bed Straw, Maiden Hair Fern (no, that's not a flower, but it is pretty), and White Globe Lily ("Fairy Lantern")

Edgewood County Park and Nature Preserve is easily accessed. It is one mile east from Highway 280 on Edgewood Road.

HP Updates



Mark Hurd's Meeting with Retirees

The day before the editor's deadline, our event with Mark Hurd was formally submitted to his office for scheduling, but the date was not communicated to me in time to make this publication. I stood on my head to get the date in time; it didn't work.

Part of the delay has been due to the economy, the challenge of taking some of the cost out of the event, which has grown in interest over the last few years with live simulcast to multiple sites across the U.S. and invitations mailed to thousands of homes through the postal service, many being returned every year as having outdated addresses. These costs are surprisingly high.

Here's what I understand:

- It's still being planned for late Sept. or early October.
- It will be held at HP headquarters in Palo Alto. Several guest speakers will join Mark (Labs/Innovation/ Environ).
- You will need to register. If it's held in the A-level Auditorium, seating will be on a first-come, first-served basis, with overflow in the Atrium next to the Auditorium over the approx. capacity of 300.
- You will NOT receive a formal invitation in the mail.
- HPREC will be communicating the registration process via:
 - 1) the September HPREC newsletter and
 - 2) an e-mail to all club members who have opted to receive periodic messages from me.
- HP will also send an e-mail to retirees notifying us when the registration process becomes available.
- Agilent retirees who had worked at HP prior to the split may also register as in the past few years.

If you have not yet done so, we encourage you to <u>"opt-in" to our HPREC E-mail Online Directory so you can</u> receive an e-mail with details of the event when they become available from HP. Share this information with your non-club member friends. Encourage them to join the club, so they stay connected.

As the date draws nearer, there will be registration information on the <u>www.hp.com/retiree</u> Web site.

Note: When the economy began to sour, our Board discussed and communicated to HP that we would understand if they chose to NOT have the event in 2009. They appreciated the gesture, but said that Mark is still committed to meeting with us, just less expensively for now. Thank you, Mark.

Note: My apologies to those who were counting on purchasing some HP gear at the June 6 picnic. The strategy changed after the newsletter went to the printer. All items with the beautiful HP Retiree logo are available for purchase. If you use a computer, go to the retiree Web site. *Click on* **HP Gear** on the home page. If you do not use a computer, call Customer Service at 1-(800) 316-5411 between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. (CST). Same username and password as in column one.

• Discount Programs - U.S. wide – look for an "R" next to the vendor name for discounts that retirees are also eligible for:

-Automotive

-Communications (cell phone service)

-Computer/Electronics

-Entertainment/Travel

-Financial Services

-Health/Fitness/Beauty

-Home/Garden

-Books/Music/Flowers/Gifts

You need to be a "designated retiree" from HP to be eligible for these benefits, but there is **no** formal verification made. If you can provide sufficient proof to the company offering the discount, we suggest you try.

<u>Designated retiree</u> usually means 55 or older and 15 yrs or more when retired from HP.

Other helpful services from the home page:

 -Addison Avenue Federal Credit Union
 -HP Alumni Association (online networking, HP exit processes and tools, HP History, and more...not affiliated with our HPREC retiree club)

www.bayarea.hpway.org is on an external server hosted by HP that provides **primarily Bay Area** information on vendor merchandise and services, plus entertainment and activities negotiated for HP employees <u>and retirees</u>.

Examples of available discounts:

- AMC/Century/Cinemark movie passes
- Gilroy Gardens
- HP Pavilion discounts, See's candy, amusement parks, etc.

Many of these HP offered retiree discounts are available to: 1) club members even if you didn't meet designated retiree status at HP or 2) are not a club member but did reach designated retiree status according to HP.



HP Digital Oasis Photo Center in Bldg 20

In May's club newsletter, I shared a new benefit for retirees that HP is making available to those of us who live in the Bay Area. I promised some details on WHEN and HOW you can visit the Center. Please abide by these entrance guidelines as well as the monthly quantity maximums in order to keep the traffic in the Center moving smoothly and so we don't lose the privilege.


WHEN: <u>Daily</u>, between the hours of <u>9:00 - 11:30 a.m.</u> and between <u>1:30-3:30 p.m.</u> These are the quieter hours when employees are not visiting the Center.

HOW: If you have an <u>HP gold badge</u> or <u>gold picture</u> <u>badge</u>, you may park in Level C employee parking and knock on the external glass door of the Digital Oasis Center. It's located on the NW/Page Mill Road side of the building, **near the words "Level C" on the map below**. (Cafe is located at the back of Level C.) Knock on the glass door, show your HP ID, and Fran, the onsite Center manager, will open the door for you to gain access to the Center only. You will <u>not</u> be able to roam other parts of the building. Look back at your May issue to see the quantity of FREE pictures, posters, calendars, gift cards, etc. you can print for your use or gifts. HPREC Online E-mail Directory Update



Increasing numbers of club members are choosing to opt-in to our self-maintaining online E-mail Directory that we launched in the summer of 2008. With this article, we hope even more of you will add your e-mail addresses and select your Member Options.

We have recently increased the security of the e-mail directory. You will now see,

when you join, that your e-mail address is partially camouflaged. For example, an e-mail address now shows in the directory as:

Smith, Jane *******@aol.com

You can click on the e-mail address and send that person a message. Once it's received, they will reply back, and you will then be able to see their entire e-mail address. This was done to eliminate the possibility of someone hacking in and harvesting our entire list in one sweep.

Follow this process to initially sign up and select your Member Options; you may also change your Member Options at any time.

Go to www.hp.com/retiree, click on Worldwide Retiree Clubs, click

on Bay Area, *click on* Retiree E-mail Directory, follow the improved instructions. Once you add your e-mail address, your membership will be quickly and automatically confirmed, and you will receive an e-mail with access information to complete the process of choosing your options.

Be sure to select the Member Options (#7-9 on the web page) that work best for you.

The Member Options allow you to choose to:

#7 - stop receiving your paper version of the newsletter in the U.S. Mail and review it online in full color in <u>new</u> one-column format

#8 - receive an e-mail notification each time a new newsletter has been posted to the Web site (whether you receive a paper version of the newsletter or not)

#9 - receive periodic e-mails from us (maybe one message/month or two, usually from me) with pertinent club-related news. The next e-mail will probably be about the Mark Hurd event details.

Thanks to those of you who have opted-in to our E-mail Directory. More thanks for completing your Member Options. Over 15 more of you chose last month to not receive a paper newsletter but to read it online in its new one-column format instead. This helps us keep costs down, which further supports our efforts to reduce costs to you.

Contact me at <u>carol_nakamoto@hotmail.com</u> if you have forgotten the user name and password to gain access to the online e-mail directory ... it is NOT the same as for other HP secured areas, and we will not display it in the newsletter. If you want help with the process, let me know that too. Once you know the access information, please jot it down somewhere.

HPREC Bylaws Updated and Revised

In November 2008, the HPREC Board of Directors approved a thorough review of the club's Bylaws and appointed a committee to conduct the review. The committee consisted of Marcia Adams, Martha Maris, Carol Nakamoto, and Pat Capshaw, who chaired the committee.

HPREC Bylaws were originally written in 1988, with minor amendments made in 1989, 2000, and 2004.

The goal of the Bylaws Review Committee was to ensure that the Bylaws represent the reality of how HPREC operates today and fulfill legal requirements. The Committee also wanted to make the document more "user friendly" so it would be a more useful tool in helping the HPREC Board of Directors govern in the most efficient way. This required addressing issues such as the term of the President and Vice President, the need to make sure meetings meet quorum requirements, clarifying the purpose of the organization and the roles of Board members, associates, officers, and past presidents.

In April the Bylaws Review Committee distributed a copy of the revised Bylaws to each Board member, along with a summary of the changes. The Board was asked to review the changes and give feedback to the committee.

At the May meeting the Board voted to approve the recommended revisions as submitted. However, there is one amendment that requires membership approval. The committee is recommending that the number of Directors be changed from a fixed number of 20 to a range of no fewer than 15 and no more than 19 Board members. This number covers the four principal Officers, and "up to" 15 elected Directors, which gives



flexibility if the Nominating Committee is unable to fill a position during the annual nominating process. You will be asked to vote on this amendment to the Bylaws in the ballot for the upcoming Board of Directors election, which you will be receiving in September.

The Bylaws Committee extends its thanks to Don Higgins and Stan McCarthy for their early work on getting this project started. We also owe a debt of gratitude to

former HPREC Board Member Susan Carnahan for her input and legal assistance in researching the California Non-profit Code pertaining to HPREC to ensure that we're in compliance.

As always, any club member may request a copy of the Bylaws...as a source of useful information and possibly as a good tool to help you fall asleep at night!



How to Sign Up for HPREC Bus and Drive-Yourself Trips

When you see a trip in which you would like to participate, please follow these guidelines:

COMPLETING TRIP FLYERS

1> On the actual trip flyer, please make sure you PRINT all information, so that we can clearly read your input. Example of form on which to PRINT:

2> If possible, use a printed address label for identifying your name and address. Please make sure we have complete first names, not just initials or "Mr. and Mrs. Jones". Additionally, please indicate by circling if the second listed person is a "spouse" or "guest", and whether that person is also a member.

3> Please read the trip flyer carefully so that you provide all the requirements necessary to participate. If a stamped, self-addressed envelope is required so that we can mail you tickets or maps, please make sure you include that with your reservation.

4> For ease in keeping track of payments for trips, please write ONE check for EACH event you wish to attend. (*Sometimes different volunteers handle the registration for different trips, and bank deposits are done at different times.*) You can mail several reservations slips and adjoining checks in one envelope, but just make sure you have one check per event. PLEASE DO NOT STAPLE CHECKS TO REGISTRATION FORMS.

5> We are trying to eliminate phone calling for confirmation purposes. Therefore, please PRINT clearly your e-mail address. If you do not have e-mail, we will make an exception and call, but we prefer to use e-mail for confirmation and sending directions.

THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT HOW WE HANDLE RESERVATIONS

1> Attendee lists are created by the date of postmark on your envelope. If a Wait List is necessary, we use the same process to identify the order on that list. Your postmark is noted on each reservation form if several checks are received at one time.

2> If you are put on a Wait List, the first name(s) on that list will be contacted should an opening become available. If we cannot get in touch with that person, we will leave a message, then go to the next name on the list.

3> There may be events in which we cannot accept any cancellations, as we have already paid for buses, meals, tours, etc. Please read your confirmation messages carefully, as they will indicate when we cannot refund your money. We make every effort to find "replacements" for you should you cancel. If we do find a replacement, we will refund your money. If we do not have a Wait List from which to work, a refund will become almost impossible, especially as we get inside the seven day window of the scheduled event.

4> Please note the following policies in regards to inviting guests:


- Each paid HPREC member is allowed one (1) guest per trip. If spaces are available after the initial listing, we may be able to accommodate other guests.
