Spring Fling Luncheon

with Guest Speaker, Bill Sullivan, Agilent CEO

HPREC's Spring Fling Luncheon is always a festive affair, one that is highly anticipated and always enjoyed by attendees. This year's event was no exception. One hundred thirty HPREC members and guests from HP and Agilent Technologies enjoyed the usual lively and fun-filled conversation with old friends and an excellent meal prepared by Mariani's Restaurant staff (the fish was especially delicious!) topped off with chocolate sundaes for dessert.

Martha Maris, President of HPREC, welcomed several guests from HP and Agilent who were attending. From Agilent: Steve Beitler, Manager, Silicon Valley Government Public Affairs, and Karen Lewis, Executive Director of the Agilent Technologies Foundation. On the HP side: Camilla (Cam) Nelson, HP Office of Social Global Innovation, and Anna Mancini, HP Corporate Archivist.

The highlight of the luncheon was our speaker, William (Bill) Sullivan, President and CEO of Agilent Technologies. In his introduction, John Weidert, HPREC Board member and Agilent Liaison, noted that Bill joined HP in 1976 and during the course of his career developed considerable expertise in telecommunications, data communications and computers. In 1999, when Agilent was spun off from HP, Bill was named Agilent's Senior Vice President and General Manager of the Semiconductor Products Group (SPG). He was appointed to his current position in March 2005.

Retirees and guests were quickly caught up in Bill's enthusiasm for Agilent's new technologies and product lines. He discussed Agilent's recovery from the second downturn and its emergence as stronger and better positioned to become the leader in the chemical analysis and life science fields. During the downturn, Agilent employees across the board took a 10% pay cut, and the company was restructured into three units: Electronic

Measurement, Chemical Analysis and Life Sciences.

Bill provided some details on how each unit was focused on contribution, not only to its core technology but to the changing methods used in testing and research. This is particularly evident in the Life Sciences unit, where Agilent products are integrally involved in the search for disease biomarkers by scientists. (See note below) "Environment and health care are two areas where we can make a significant contribution," Bill added. Other product offerings assist the surveillance/terrorism field (jamming the detonation signal of IED's in war zones), food safety, and crime forensics analysis (most of the products seen on the TV program, CSI, are from Agilent.)

One of Agilent's most valuable resources, Bill noted, was its "experienced employee base." Despite the downturn, Agilent has continued to focus on its employees by maintaining benefits and providing opportunities for collaboration. Bill referred to a previous situation wherein they were trying to increase the output of one testing system. After getting a divergent group of engineers together, the problem was quickly resolved. "We know how to do that!" commented Roseville based engineers.

The upcoming merger with the Analytical business of Varian Associates, which shares a similar "employee culture," will further broaden Agilent's technology resources and product lines and "realize sources of value for customers and stockholders." The deal will, hopefully, close sometime this spring.

Afterward, Bill fielded a number of questions from the audience covering a wide range of topics from doing business in China to the effect of the new Health Care Bill on Agilent.

We also want to thank HPREC Board member Harold Kaye and his industrious committee for making this event so enjoyable: Lynn Cortes (flyers), Gordon Mullin and Fran Low (welcome table), Vera Robertson (reservations), JoAnn Hill (name tags) and John Weidert (guest speaker coordination).

A Guy Named Walt and the Marine Mammal Center

After several days of rain in early April, we were thrilled that April 7 dawned clear, warm, and absolutely spectacular. Forty-four adventuresome HPREC members boarded a bus at 8:30 a.m. and started the drive into San Francisco's Presidio Park for the beginning of a magical day. Our first destination was the newly opened Disney Family Museum in the heart of the former Army post.



The museum building itself is very modest, but once you enter, you are zoomed back in time to the beginning of the Walt

Disney era of storytelling, animated movies, lyrical musicals, tales of heroic animals, and incredible television episodes of The Mickey Mouse Club, Spin and Marty, Tinker Bell flying around the castle, and more. The museum is a fabulous compilation of Walt Disney's life and how he grew up and created his magical World, especially Disneyland and Disney World. The photographs of Walt's early life and his family scenes were extremely interesting. Several of us were humming many of the familiar tunes from the Disney movies. With the recent death of actor Fess Parker, Walt's Davy Crockett, the exhibits of that phase of Disney were particularly poignant. And how many of us grew up singing "Zip-a-Dee-Doo-Dah" from Walt's *Song of the South*? We were told that it usually takes three hours to see the complete museum, but we had half that time. None-the-less, we all agreed that we had an excellent taste of the exhibits, and private return trips are definitely in many members' future plans.

After leaving the museum, we had a fun picnic lunch on the Presidio grounds. We had ordered sandwiches from the Disney cafeteria, and brought chips, cookies, and water along with us from Costco. The picnic site was a bit short on tables, so

a few of our members were very creative as to where they perched themselves for their lunch!

We made a brief stop at the viewing post on the west side of the Golden Gate Bridge. The views of the city, the bridges (both Golden Gate and Bay Bridge), Alcatraz and the Marin Headlands were a photog's dream. The day was crystal clear and we all marveled at the beauty of our great state of California!

Our next stop was the newly built Marine Mammal Center in Sausalito. This facility opened on June 15 of last year, and the "hospital" is a state of the art center. There are over 175 baby seals and sea lions being cared for in the various areas of the hospital. And, since opening this new facility, they have treated more than 1500 marine mammals, returning many to their natural habitat. To watch the babies being tube fed is amazing, and to learn that the volunteers must actually teach the baby seals and sea lions to "fish" for their supper was very interesting. The size of a full grown elephant seal is astounding, as evidenced in this photo of our guide standing next to a full size statue of one of these magnificent creatures. The 90 minute tour was excellent, the environmental discussions were stimulating, and the gift shop was great.



The bus ride back to Cupertino was peaceful, as many of us were tired from all the fresh air we had during the day, and naps were in order. A super fun excursion for our HPREC family!



TRAVEL TALK

Your Travel Committee has been very busy these past several months planning and executing some fun excursions for our membership. As we develop new itineraries, we seem to come across some “opportunities” to improve both our processes and the execution of the trips themselves. Therefore, in this issue we want to address a few areas that we have identified as “the need to know more about.”

First of all, with the guidance of the HPREC Board of Directors, we have altered our payment requirements. You will notice that we have a price for a trip if paid by a certain date, and then a different price if reservations are made after the first due date. We have elected to add an additional \$5 charge for reservations received after the original cut-off date, as we have found the volunteers are spending an unusual amount of time updating all the counts and data for the event in a very small window of time. The large events, like the Holiday Lunch, Spring Fling, and Picnic are especially impacted with last minute calls and additions...so we are hoping to encourage early sign-ups to avoid this crunch.

We are also aware that many of us have mobility issues when it comes to stairs, walking on uneven grounds, and just plain walking. Therefore, we are making notations on our trip fliers as to the “Activity Level” the trip may have. If you still have concerns about what the trip may involve, please do not hesitate to contact the leaders of the trip, as noted on the fliers. And a word of thanks...calls about trips and events have been made within the calling guidelines, as listed on the fliers, as well.

When lunches and dinners are listed on the fliers, please know that we try to accommodate all food requirements from our members. Many restaurants will substitute a vegetarian meal if we give them enough notice. However, when this comes to the larger events, such as the Holiday Luncheon, this is difficult to make exceptions, as the menu is set when serving over 300 people. If we have turkey listed as the main course, we cannot change it to ham or fish...we are sure you understand.

For longer trips, such as the 4 day adventure to Palm Springs in 2011, we have been informed that HP will no longer let us park cars on their sites overnight. This is an insurance and legal issue for them, so we have been seeking an alternative parking place for longer trips. Right now Vallco, Village has a parking area that we could use, once we discuss the specifics with their security people. This will be on a case-by-case basis, and we are continuing our dialog at this time. For “Day Trips” we will still use the Cupertino site of HP.

Lastly, we would like to clarify our member-guest policy for trips. Every member is entitled to bring one paying guest, and that guest will be included in the acceptance process. However, if the member wants to bring more than one guest, those guests will be put on the Waiting List until the cut-off date for reservations. If the trip has MEMBERS on the Wait List, all members will go before the additional guests. We do this because this is your club...you pay your dues...and all members should be in the queue prior to additional guests being accepted.

We have some great trips coming up, so check out the fliers in this edition. The Mothball Fleet in Suisun Bay is a real prize...see the ships before they are gone! We are also working on a sawmill tour and day in Petaluma, a tour of The Cowgirl Creamery, the SF Ballet for December’s “Nutcracker”, the SF Pacific Orchid Expo in 2011, a trip to Vision Quest Ranch in Salinas, a trip to the newly re-opened Oakland Museum, and a cruise on the Bay in Roosevelt’s Potomac yacht. Due to the high expense of operations and the ongoing delay in transferring the property to California State Parks, overnight camping will no longer be available. Reservations for day use are not required.

This change was made necessary due to the continuing California budget crisis, which has caused a crippling lack of funding for State Parks and prevented the agency from being able to take ownership of the property to date from POST and Sempervirens Fund. We encourage anyone who wishes to accelerate this process to support the "YES for State Parks" campaign, an initiative



proposed for the November 2010 ballot. The campaign seeks to establish a

stable source of funding for State Parks through the creation of a State Parks Access Pass. To learn more about this effort, please visit www.yesforstateparks.com.

Preservation policy an historical first in Cupertino

City leaders set to review heritage site guidelines

For the first time in Cupertino's history, the city is

developing a policy to identify and protect historic city sites.

The city council will look at a historical preservation policy on April 6, which could put guidelines in place to address how to preserve and honor historic structures that may need to be renovated, restored or removed.

For the past two years, the Historical Preservation Advisory Committee has been working on guidelines and creating a list of sites for the city's historic inventory. The recommended policy pertains only to publicly owned properties. City planner Gary Chao said there is no current ordinance to determine best practices for preserving historic sites, and in the past, the council

has made decisions on a case-by-case basis.

Committee members evaluated numerous city sites, looking at each one's aesthetic, historic, social, cultural and economic merit. The committee also analyzed each site through an architectural lens to see if the design reflected a particular era or master craftsmanship.

"Most of the sites we chose had at least one of these themes or more," said Helene Davis, a member of the preservation committee and Cupertino Historical Society. There are about 30 sites on the list, but the city could add more. Some historic sites the committee reviewed are the replica Baer Blacksmith Shop, De Oro Club on Homestead Road, the now closed Montebello School, the **Glendenning Barn on the Hewlett-Packard campus**, Nathan Hall Tank House and the Hammond-Snyder House near Gate of Heaven Cemetery. "Quite frankly, Cupertino doesn't have a lot of historic places," Davis said.



In 1850, Robert Glendenning came to West Side, which is now part of Cupertino, where he operated a ranch. When he died in 1884, the land along Homestead Road was given to his children, Mary, Margaret C., Ellen, Joe, Jim and George. Today the Glendenning Barn, complete with fruit trees and a picnic area, can still be seen in the middle of the HP campus. The Cupertino City Council will be looking at a historical preservation policy on April 6 that could help future decision-making when making changes to historic structures.

The council will be reviewing the recommendations April 6, but will not make a decision until the city has an opportunity to collect more public input this spring.

A preservation policy has been in the works for years. George Monk, who served on the preservation committee, also worked on similar city initiatives in the 1990s. "The city needs guidelines on what to do with old things. We have ordinances for fences, so why not an ordinance for protecting historic things?" Monk said.

Monk said that the city might want to consider taking a stance on honoring some newer or private historic buildings, such as the first Apple Inc. building in the city. Monk said the Apple building might be the most important historic site short of the DeAnza party camp near Blackberry Farm, where the Spanish exploring party that gave Cupertino its namesake stayed. Davis said it is important to protect what little Cupertino has.

The City Council public hearing will be April 6. The meeting begins at 6:45 p.m. in Cupertino Community Hall 10350 Torre Ave.

Kuo-Jung Chang and Fred Kohler Enjoy Retirement Activities

In retirement, **Kuo-Jung Chang** and **Fred Kohler** are doing what they enjoy and enjoying what they are doing. Fortunately for this husband-wife team's community, this includes lots of time volunteering.

Before she retired in 2007 after a fourteen year career in the Legal Department, Kuo-Jung thought about what she really enjoyed -- reading and food. In 1996, she began volunteering at **Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic (RFB&D)**, a national organization that records textbooks for reading challenged clients. She started going to their Palo Alto unit after work once a week, using some of the skills she had learned in her native Taiwan to direct the recordings. Kuo-Jung really enjoys this activity, the people she volunteers with, and the recording process. She noted that Bill Hewlett, who himself was dyslexic, was an enthusiastic supporter of the organization.

Kuo-Jung's love of food led her to the **Urban Ministry of Palo Alto**, a non-sectarian social service agency which provides clothing, food, shelter, care, and counseling to homeless and low-income clients. There Kuo-Jung, sometimes with the assistance of her husband, Fred, prepares and serves food to those who otherwise would go hungry.

Working with the nearby **Museum of American Heritage** gives Kuo-Jung the opportunity to maintain their garden with other volunteers. Last year, in conjunction with *Sunset Magazine*, they created a Victory Garden. Kuo-Jung also found time to help the **Costaño Elementary School** in East Palo Alto, by working with a group of volunteers to help build a lab room for their teachers.

Fred Kohler contributed to HP's Finance Department for 30 years before retiring in 2005. When he retired, Fred knew that he wanted to spend time volunteering.

Each year since retirement, Fred has been a tax aide for the **AARP Tax-Aide Program** (training available from AARP), which provides free tax assistance and tax form preparation service for low and middle income, as well as taxpayers age 60 and over. Fred says he enjoys meeting people and gets great satisfaction from helping others.

Through an HP connection, Kuo-Jung learned that the local **RFB&D** board was looking for new members with financial experience. Fred was elected to the board three years ago and became Board Chair last year. The run-down building that had housed the studio for 40 years was no longer suitable and was sold by the

foundation that owned it. Fred was actively involved in the search for new studio and office space and the capital campaign to fund outfitting of the new space with new recording booths and related equipment. The campaign was successful and the move to the new studio in Palo Alto was completed in December. Last year at this Northern California Unit, 200 volunteers devoted nearly 4,000 hours to record over 220 audio books!

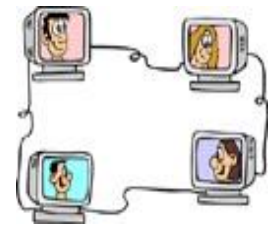

Stay Connected via E-mail

Once you add your e-mail address, your secure election will be quickly confirmed via e-mail, and you will receive club-specific access information that allows you to re-enter at any time to 1) update a changed e-mail address or 2) change your Member Options.

These Member Options are:

- choose not to receive paper version of newsletter;
- choose to receive an e-mail when the newsletter gets posted to club Web site;
- choose to receive

periodic e-mail messages from a member of the board that cannot wait for the next newsletter.

- c) For e-mails from the **HP Alumni Association**, click on “Retiree Clubs, Groups and Alumni Networking,” scroll down to Alumni Groups, follow the “To Join” instructions.
