



Bess Stephens

Bess Stephens retired in May, 2007 after enjoying 26 years of service at HP. When Bess retired, she was Vice President of Global Philanthropy and Executive Director of the HP Company Foundation.



Since retiring, Bess has continued to follow her passion for community and civic involvement. She divides her time between volunteering with nonprofits, helping to develop the leadership capacity of women leaders and social entrepreneurs and supporting education.

The three organizations are:

1. Center for Excellence in Nonprofits (CEN). CEN was started over 15 years ago by HP's former Executive Vice President and COO, Dean Morton. Its mission is to foster highly effective leaders and vibrant nonprofit organizations that transform the quality of life in our communities. Bess works with the Program Committee in the design,

selection and evaluation of program offerings for its members.

- 2. Global Women's Leadership Network (GWLN). This is an international network of women leaders who are developing leadership capacity and management skills in women. GWLN offers programs and services to help women leaders transform their organizations, their communities and the world. Sponsored by the Leavey School of Business at Santa Clara University, the organization offers regular seminars and forums locally, as well as an annual intensive residential program that recruits women leaders from around the world. Bess is a member of the Governance Board and has helped the nonprofit with its ongoing strategic planning and its annual fundraising efforts. This past summer, Bess traveled to Istanbul, Turkey with the nonprofit's Executive Director and Board Chair in support of a women's leadership summit sponsored by Kagider, the Women's Entrepreneur Association of Turkey.
- 3. Santa Clara University. A long time advocate and friend of education, Bess also serves on the Board of Regents at Santa Clara University. She is a member of the Regents' Executive Committee and is currently working with a Task Force of Regents to identify ways to strengthen the University's relationships with Silicon Valley companies.

Since leaving HP, Bess has followed the progress of a few philanthropic social investments started under her leadership at HP. She visited HP supported schools and Digital Village sites in Southern Africa. She also visited and met the leaders and students at training centers established as a part of the Micro-enterprise Acceleration Initiative developed by her former department. Launched in April 2000, the HP Digital Village Program was designed to bridge the digital divide by bringing the tools for learning and competing in the digital economy to the global communities that needed them the most.

Bess visited DV sites, training centers and schools close to Johannesburg, South Africa and had a chance to learn about their success, community impact and ongoing challenges. She was joined by HP regional leaders, who graciously facilitated these visits: NGO partners and retired HP Executive Diana Bell, who formerly led both the Total Customer Experience & Quality Organization and Corporate Affairs. HP fulfilled its commitments to the Digital Villages in 2006. The Digital Village in Dikhatole, named in recognition of Bess's global program leadership, provides teachers training in computer skills. In turn, these teachers offer train the trainer sessions for other teachers at their respective schools.

The HP Get Information Technology (HP Get IT) Center she visited in Pretoria, South Africa demonstrated impressive results. Initially launched in early 2007, Get IT is part of HP's current social investment strategy. HP leaders working with strategic partners have rolled out HP Get IT to over 100 centers in 30 countries throughout Europe, Middle East and Africa. The program has reached over 100,000 young people.

Bess also travels frequently with her husband John, an Agilent retiree. During the past three years, they have enjoyed traveling to the east coast to visit their families and taken an "Across America" train trip from New York to San Francisco, as well as a number of adventurous international trips. Bess also has an exciting new hobby; she is developing her skills as a budding photographer, an interest she shares with John. The photographs they have taken in Alaska, the Czech Republic, Dubai, Egypt, France, Morocco and Spain have enabled them to create permanent memories of their visits. Bess says, "So far, retirement has been filled with meaningful experiences, plenty of quality time with family and lots of fun!"

Uvas Canyon looks good in a wet year



This area was once the tribal territory of the Mutsun Ohlone Indians and was settled by Europeans in 1865. It became a county park in 1961, after a devastating logging period. It has about 1200 acres with great hiking trails, picnic areas and a pretty campground.





Hike Location: A two-part hike on the coast just south of Half Moon Bay. We will begin our activity at POST's Wavecrest property with a level stroll along the bluffs to the Ritz Carlton (coffee anyone?). Then it is on to the little known Burleigh H. Murray State Park property. Never heard of it? Well, neither had Gary until stumbling upon it one day. We will visit the Mills Barn. This historic structure dates back to the late 1800's and is a good representation of an English Lake County Bank Barn. Total hike distance is five level miles.

Meet at: The 280 & Page Mill Road Park-&-Ride at 10:00 a.m. to carpool which is strongly encouraged as parking is at a premium. Bring \$3 to

reimburse the drivers along with your lunch, water and layered clothing.

Hike Location: Fall Creek (a unit of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park) in Felton. Note that this hike is well suited to hot September weather. The trails are completely shaded and the locals claim that the creek runs all of the time.

Take Highway 17 south from Los Gatos to Mt. Hermon Road (exit 3) east for 3.5 miles to Graham Hill Road. Turn right on Graham Hill Road for 0.2 miles to the next stop light (Highway 9). Turn left on Highway 9 and go through downtown Felton for 0.6 miles to the entrance of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park. Turn left into the park and proceed to the Park Entrance Station. The entrance fee is \$10 per vehicle. We will have time to visit the restrooms, gift shop and Roaring Camp Railroad. Next we will move the cars to the trailhead on Felton Empire Road.

Fall Creek features the former site of lime kilns and a barrel mill and is second-growth mixed evergreen forest. Most of the 5.2 mile hike will be along creeks with an elevation gain of about 800 feet.

Meet at: The PARKING LOT LOCATED AT THE NORTHEAST CORNER OF Highway 9 and Santa Cruz Avenue (across from Hobee's Restaurant) in Los Gatos. The sign at the lot says "Free Unlimited Parking-Northside Lot." To get there, take Highway 17 south toward Los Gatos. Exit at Hwy. 9-Los Gatos/Saratoga and continue west on Hwy 9 (approximately 1/3 mile) to the parking lot located on your right just before Santa Cruz Ave. The carpools will depart at 10:00 a.m. Bring \$3 each to reimburse carpool drivers. Bring water, lunch and a light walking stick if you have one.



STOP AND SMELL THE ROSES!

If you have that urge, stop by the San Jose Municipal Rose Garden, and you can smell over 4,000 rose bushes. Some are more fragrant than others, and the garden map that you can obtain from a volunteer indicates the more fragrant roses.



The San Jose Municipal Rose Garden is located at the intersection of Naglee Avenue and Dana Avenue in San Jose. It was originally a prune orchard, but was bought by the City of San Jose in 1928. The City Council voted to set aside 5 1/2 acres of roses and the San Jose Rose Society pledged to provide the roses. It

was officially dedicated in April of 1937.

Herb Grasshof is one of the dedicated volunteers at the Rose Garden. Ever since his retirement, he had been looking for just the "right" place to volunteer. He was looking for a volunteer opportunity where he could work as his time permitted without a commitment to a specific day or time each week. It took him a while, but he found that "right" place at the Rose Garden.

After a few hours of training, he was designated as one of the "Master Volunteers." The volunteers do everything from deadheading roses, weeding, pruning, mulching, fertilizing and much more.

Early on as a volunteer, Herb thought that maybe this type of activity might be too isolating, and he would end up "talking" to the roses; but he soon found there are a

large number of visitors to the garden. Many want to know the history of the garden, have questions about the roses and about the volunteer organization supporting the garden. Herb says he has talked with visitors from all over the United States, Europe and Asia. Volunteers wear bright green vests, so that visitors can easily spot them. Herb has found that public relations work is a large part of the daily activities.

Herb loves being in the outdoors, tending the beautiful roses, working with the other volunteers and talking with the visitors...and smelling the roses! He can go and come as his schedule permits, working any day of the week, including weekends.

In the early 2000s, city budget cuts impacted the Rose Garden, and the garden lost its All-America Rose Selections status as the garden fell into disrepair. In 2007, Friends of the San Jose Rose Garden,



a non-profit organization whose mission was to restore and renovate the garden, was established. By 2009, the

garden had been restored and is now back to full accreditation by the All-American Rose Society and is also one of 23 test gardens (for new types of roses) in the nation.

Herb says more volunteers are needed and always welcome. Check out www.FriendsSJRoseGarden.org for volunteer information. The Web site also has a tremendous amount of information about the garden's history, how to become a volunteer, special events, photos, and information (including videos) about caring for your own roses.

A visit to the Rose Garden should be on your list of things to do. It's open daily (at no charge) from 8:00 a.m. until one-half hour after sunset. So, stop and smell the roses -- you'll be glad you did!


