The Holiday Luncheon also serves as our annual Club meeting, during which the President gives the attending members an overview of the Club's activities and finances as of the closing of the previous fiscal year. Following are the highlights:

- Our three events, the Holiday Luncheon, Spring Fling Luncheon and Summer Picnic were held in 2010 and will be done again in 2011.
- Monthly Activities (hiking, bowling, bridge and golf) were enjoyed by many in 2010 and will continue in 2011.

- In 2010, there were many excellent trips and tours organized by our Travel Committee, and there will many to look forward to in 2011. HP Garage Tours were introduced!
- Our Volunteer activities contributed over 23,000 hours of community service (almost one-half million dollars in value!).
- We closed the fiscal year with 1594 members, down a little bit from the previous year. We ask members to encourage other HP and Agilent retirees to join our Club.
- The Club's income for the year was a little over \$16,000, and our expenses were about \$20,500 for a net loss of about \$4,300. This is due primarily to declining membership. The Club is financially healthy, which is why we have not increased dues.
- Our Web site and newsletter continue to improve. They keep our members well informed and reference resources.

I want to thank all of you who attended the luncheon. Our lives are very busy, and it was good to see our HPREC members taking the opportunity to catch up.

As we begin the new calendar year, I look forward to all the good times we are going to have with family, friends and our fellow HPREC members. Please watch the newsletters for opportunities to participate in the monthly activities, attend events, go on a trip or two, and to volunteer in the Bay Area communities. We all can “make a difference” – let's do it together!

2010 HPREC ANNUAL HOLIDAY LUNCHEON

More than 250 HP & Agilent Retiree Club members and guests assembled at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Palo Alto on December 13th for the Annual Holiday Luncheon. As the doors opened and socializing moved into the ballroom around the large tables, the hotel had prepared a terrific luncheon of roast turkey with all of the accompanying treats. President Deihleen Claffey opened the event with a Moment of Silence to recognize members who had passed and the sacrifices of our armed services.

Following the luncheon, guest speaker Gustavo Salem from Agilent Technologies' Life Sciences Business Unit presented a fascinating look at integrated bio-sciences, and some of the new developments coming out of Agilent and other R&D labs that will fundamentally change the development of new drugs and medications, and the diagnosis and treatment of diseases. Gus began by revealing that aspirin would not be able to be introduced today as a drug, given its side affects, risks and potential for harm. That said, aspirin still is sold at a rate of hundreds of millions of doses per year, after more than 100 years on the market, and new uses are still being identified. He went on to explain how advanced tools like gene sequencers and mass spectrometers and enhanced databases are making it easier to test efficacy and toxicity of new pharmaceuticals, and also to make it economically feasible to target orphan diseases with medications that might not be economical to introduce today. Agilent is again seeking to market FDA-approved diagnostic devices, and is working with research institutions and companies world-wide to bring biotechnology to market in ways that make diagnosis and treatment of diseases more effective and efficient. It was a terrific presentation, and Gus is a dynamic speaker.

Following the presentation, the Annual Meeting was conducted, and then prizes for HPREC Golfers of the Year were presented. Deihleen noted that the Board of HPREC had been recognized by HP at its 2010 Volunteer Luncheon in November, along with members Tony Tomarchio and Mark Linsky. Membership Chair John Weidert presented awards and gift cards to Frank Musso and Cort Van Renssalaer for their efforts in recruiting new members. More than 30 door prizes were passed out to attendees, including an HP computer and a number of gift cards for local and online retailers from both Agilent and HP.

OAKLAND – TAKING IN HISTORY ON THE OTHER SIDE OF THE BAY

On October 21, 2010, 32 HPREC history buffs and boating enthusiasts took a relaxing and comfortable bus trip from the HP Cupertino Site up to Jack London Square in Oakland.

Before boarding the *USS Potomac* for a cruise on the Bay, most of us had an opportunity to view a video on the history of the ship. The *USS Potomac* started out as the Coast Guard Cutter *Electra* on June 30, 1934 and was subsequently re-commissioned the *USS Potomac* in 1936 after being chosen to become the Presidential Yacht.

Before WWII, Franklin Delano Roosevelt withdrew to the boat as many as 50 times a year to get away from the stress of the job of running the country. The *USS Potomac* served as FDR's Presidential Yacht until his death in 1945.

Not much money was put into turning a Coast Guard cutter into the Presidential Yacht. There are no chintz curtains, no nautical bedspreads, and no comfortable berths. It is

definitely a “no frills” yacht, despite having had royalty, dignitaries and many other important guests on board.



After FDR's death in April 1945, the *USS Potomac* began a long and ignominious decline from her former role in world

affairs. After many adventures and many owners – including Elvis Presley at one point – she was seized in 1980 in San Francisco as a front for drug smugglers. Impounded at Treasure Island, she sank. The ship was



later raised and unceremoniously dumped on the East Bay Estuary, where she sat abandoned and rotting. A week away from being sold as scrap, the ship was rescued by the Port of Oakland, and the process of restoration was begun.

The two and one-half hour cruise from Jack London Square out to the Bay, and then out under the Golden Gate Bridge

was pleasant, and the seas were calm. We sailed under the new section of the Bay Bridge and got a glimpse of the construction in progress. The homes clinging to the hills of Tiburon and Sausalito were magnificent. We even cruised under the Golden Gate before sailing back, hugging the coastline of San Francisco. The majestic Palace of Fine Arts came into view. Ghirardelli Square was almost close enough to reach out and touch. We didn't want the cruise to end, but the sea air had given us an appetite for lunch.

After lunch at Kincaid's, we headed over to the newly renovated Oakland Museum. “Pixar: 25 Years of Animation” was the featured exhibit. It was fascinating to see how and what is involved in producing an animated movie. The Gallery of California History was also on display. Of course, we had to check out the gift shop before getting back on the bus for our trip back to Cupertino. It was truly a day of cultural history.

HPREC Hikers Rediscover the Walking Wonders of Saratoga

The city of Saratoga, California was not incorporated until 1956. (Whataya mean, "before I was born?") Something has been happening there since 1848, however. A succession of sawmills, toll roads, grist mills and hot springs resorts have preceded its current role as an upscale residential community. In fact, the springs in the area reminded the founding fathers of Saratoga Springs, New York--thus, the name.

Agriculture crept in during the waning resort years, and

This hike started right downtown, at Wildwood Park, with its riparian regime of sycamores and playground equipment. From there, we went through the business district, past the old cemetery, through a zone of craftsman homes, to the reservoir. The homes then got newer and bigger as we worked our way over to Villa Montalvo. The new Villa Montalvo County Park has

Also, there is now an admission charge to view the gardens. Hakone is as beautiful as ever, and you can drive in from Highway 9, rather than walking in. We returned to Wildwood Park directly and concluded the hike there.

Sawyer Camp Trail North

2010 Annual Volunteer Luncheon

Over 70 HPREC volunteers and guests attended the sixteenth annual HPREC/HPARV luncheon held in Palo Alto and hosted by Hewlett-Packard on November 11. As always, this luncheon was a fun event and gave our member volunteers an opportunity to socialize as well as to exchange ideas and information about organizations where they volunteer. As this was Veterans Day, we also recognized those who had previously volunteered their service for our country.

Our volunteer hours continue to grow. Based on 109 volunteers reporting hours including the seven done-in-a day events sponsored by HPARV, 23,472 hours were reported for 2010. More than 60% of these hours were contributed to community organizations, including RAFT, Second Harvest, and the Registrar of Voters, as well as national organizations such as the Red Cross, AYSO, YMCA, USO, and Junior Achievement.

Approximately 25% of volunteer hours were focused on education, as our volunteers teach, tutor, and telementor students in community schools and supporting groups. Volunteers also contributed to many health organizations including hospitals such as Lucile Packard Children's, Stanford, El Camino, and blood donations and hospice care, as well as helping to keep the environment healthy.

In terms of pay, our contributed hours represent an equivalent donation of almost half a million dollars. Thank you one and all!

Our speaker, Caroline Barlerin, Director of HP's Global Social Innovation team, presented a change to HP's traditional philanthropy model. HP is now looking at innovative ways to create partnerships for community involvement, and a new program

under consideration will encourage more employees to contribute their skills to non-profits by paying for a number of volunteer hours each month. We're looking forward to seeing how retirees can contribute.

Our **2010 Volunteers of the Year** were recognized and presented with their award plaques in a ceremony hosted by HP's Camilla Nelson and Agilent's Steve Beitler. The winners were: **Tony Tomarchio** for his ongoing efforts on behalf of the Palo Alto Veterans Hospital and Ronald McDonald House; **Mark Linsky** for his continued leadership at Junior Achievement and AYSO, as well as the Saratoga Rotary and the Senior Coordinator Council; and the **HPREC Board of Directors** for their many hours contributed to the HPREC membership to organize, coordinate, and manage the many activities, trips, luncheons and *The HPREC News*.

Many thanks again to the HPARV committee for organizing this event, our hosts Jill Sweeney of HP Retiree Engagement and Kate Cashin for coordinating the luncheon and door prizes, Caroline Barlerin and Camilla Nelson of HP's Global Community Involvement, and Steve Beitler of Agilent's Silicon Valley Government and Public Affairs for door prizes.

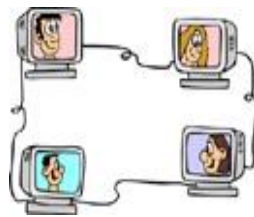

Fond Remembrances of Yas Shimoguchi by the HPJ Retiree Club

May-san and Jean,

Yesterday's HPJ Retirees Annual Meeting turned out to become Yas-san's 49th Day Memorial Service. About 80 retirees gathered at Hachioji Factory. I gave a short talk about Yas-san: he used to recollect the two years at YHP as "the prime time in my life." YHP people loved him and liked him to talk about how Mr. Hewlett had cared about him, came to see him every day at the most difficult time, and how he had played softball with Bill and Dave. Yas-san was indeed a lucky witness of the MBWA and the HP Way. As he told us similar anecdotes in his own words, we learned about the HP Way through Yas-san.



At the retirement party, I heard his friend tell us that Yas-san joined HPREC because he wanted to be of service to other club members. And he kept his word; he served as a board member for a good many years, and organized bus trips, and overseas trips to Japan. When the HPJ Retirees Club toured to California two times, Yas-san recruited many HPREC members to make "cultural exchanges" successful both times.



Yas-san demonstrated how community service should be implemented. His leadership led the Mountain View Buddhist Temple to acquire the land, build halls, recruit the priest, to become one of the most active Buddhist churches in Northern California.

I shared my remembrance with the audience and gave a prayer to Yas-san's photo. The group photo was taken on December 3rd, at Hachioji Factory.

The HPJ retirees decided to set up the "Yas-san Fund." I will follow up with the fund and will let you know.

Russ had a keen interest in High-Fidelity audio reproduction, and a critical and reliable ear for reproduction quality (leading one product manager to comment that "I am sure that if Russ is satisfied with the [audio] performance, then it is meeting [the] specification"). At HP, Russ met several other engineers who shared his interest in audio reproduction, with whom he collaborated outside work on numerous projects, including the design and construction of FM receivers, phase-locked pulse width FM demodulators, short-wave receivers, audio amplifiers, headphone equalizers, and loudspeaker design. One of these collaborations, with Siegfried Linkwitz, led to the design of the Linkwitz-Riley crossover network, which is used in high-end loudspeaker systems and professional sound reinforcement applications. He is survived by a brother, Leon, wife Vicki, and children Victor, Daniel and Kaitilin. (*Submitted by Vicki Riley*)

2011 is the 10th anniversary of the death of Bill Hewlett, and Marc asked me to write a remembrance of Bill's life and accomplishments.

“Remembering Bill Hewlett (1913 – 2001)”

On this tenth anniversary of the passing of Bill Hewlett, we remember his remarkable influence on the lives of millions of people. Customers of his company, Hewlett-Packard, have benefited from superior technology in measurements and computation during the Golden Years of Technology in the last half of the 20th century. His HP employees enjoyed a company work culture that was second to none, respecting the dignity of every worker, exploiting the creativity of people with a “management by objective” which took hands off previous top-down styles which stifled personal initiative.

For long term employees, we might have accepted the common notion that it was Dave Packard who with his 6-foot-4 imposing presence dominated the management of HP, and its outside image. But that was absolutely not true, the management duo of Dave and Bill was truly a collegial one, which exploited their individual strengths and the respect they had for each other. They themselves noted that they almost knew what each other was thinking. Bill tended to be the technical resource, with special attention to new product strategies and future initiatives, with a special professional relationship to Research VP, Barney Oliver.

And yet, in the 1968-1971 ...”

I have a great volunteer opportunity to help the HPREC Membership Committee with our data entry process. I would like to have at least two volunteers helping with this so the time and work can be split up.

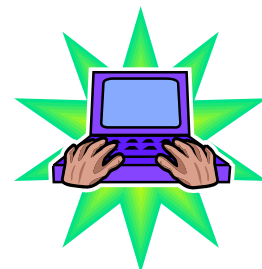
The amount of time is approximately two to four hours, once a week. This is usually on a Wednesday morning, but it can be flexible.

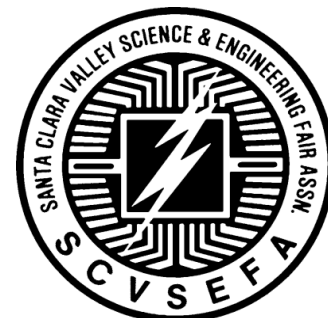

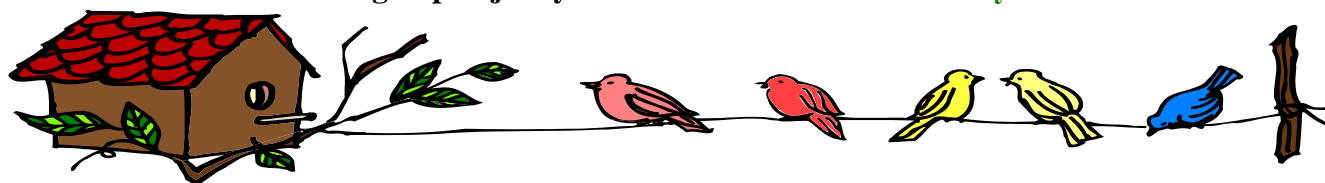

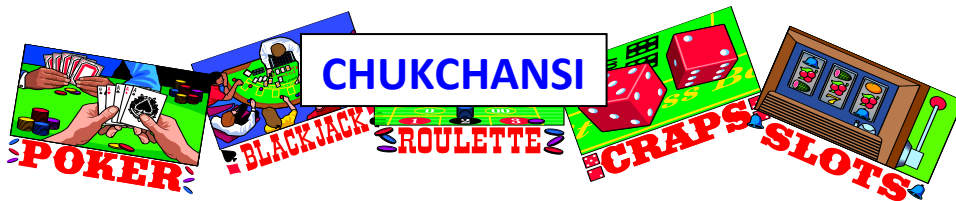
