Monte Bello OSP - A Great Day To Take a Hike In The Bay Area!

The re-scheduled January hike on Tuesday the 18th brought fourteen hikers to Monte Bello Open Space Preserve (located seven miles west of HWY 280 on Page Mill Road) to enjoy a sunny day and 360 degree views of the valley from the top of Black Mountain. The conditions were optimal: a dry trail, just damp in a few spots, and extraordinarily warm weather for January. We started the hike near the source of Stevens Creek and along a sag pond marking a major trace of the San Andreas Fault zone. Climbing 800 feet up toward the trail's high point from the trail's lowest point along the Canyon Trail, we passed two babbling brooks and a timid deer.

The lookout on top of Black Mountain did not disappoint, as one could see all of Silicon Valley to Mt. Hamilton. To the east and north, the whole of the peninsula, the bay, Mt. Diablo and Mt. Tam were in clear view. After taking in the great views, we stopped for lunch at the backpacker's campsite to get some shade and shelter from the wind. On the return trail, we saw toyon covered with red berries and madrone in full bloom. Being able to enjoy good company and the beautiful open space made us aware of how fortunate we are to be so close to nature within just half an hour of a developed area.

Two New Cupertino Hikes

On February 8, fourteen hikers explored two new trails in Cupertino. Weather for the Hammond-Snyder Trail was sunny and windy, which produced spectacular views from the Anza Knoll. This trail presented many

surprises such as the views of the Gate of Heaven Cemetery, the pretty wooded slopes on the east side of Anza Knoll, and two nice pond areas near the Cristo Rey Drive roundabout.

The second hike was sheltered from the wind and therefore, much warmer. The group walked from McClellan Ranch Park to Blackberry Farm and back.

The realignment of Stevens Creek (the water, not the road) through Blackberry Farm was noted. The complete redevelopment of Blackberry Farm is evident. If you visited Blackberry Farm with your workgroup, you will have a hard time finding many of the landmarks that you remember. There were 4H goats visible at McClellan Ranch Park. Among the wild animals seen were deer and a large egret.

The group picture was taken at a new bridge over Stevens Creek in Blackberry Farm.

To get to the Hammond-Snyder Trail, take Interstate 280 to the Foothill Boulevard exit, proceed south, then turn right almost immediately (at the first light) onto Cristo Rey Drive. Continue for about a mile, veer right around the traffic circle (keep on Cristo Rey Drive), and turn left into the Rancho San Antonio County Park. Stay left to the equestrian parking area. The trail map shows the Hammond-Snyder Trail, which the group took to the southeast.

To get to McClellan Ranch Park, return to Foothill Boulevard and turn right. Continue past Stevens Creek Boulevard for 1.2 miles and turn left onto McClellan Road (just past Kinst Court on the right). After 1/2 mile, turn left into McClellan Ranch Park at 22221 McClellan Road.

Volunteers for the Lucile Packard Children's Hospital

The Lucile Packard Children's Hospital (LPCH) is a world-class, non-profit hospital devoted entirely to the care of babies, children, adolescents and expectant

mothers. David and Lucile Packard made the initial \$40 million donation that enabled the hospital to open its doors. Many babies born at LPCH are now in college, and many of the first patients

have children of their own.

LPCH has hundreds of physicians. They also have many volunteers, including a number of HP and Agilent retirees. Here are some of their stories.

Sue Cortesi became interested in volunteering back in 1977 when Mrs. Packard gave a talk to HP employees about the importance of giving back to your community; Sue has been volunteering ever since and became a volunteer at LPCH when she retired in 2000 from HP. She works in the Well Baby Nursery and has been trained to use the ALGO machine, a device that identifies hearing impairment in newborn babies. She fastens a tiny plastic cup to each little ear, and then attaches sensors to the baby's back, shoulder and forehead. As the machine emits some gentle clicking noises, the baby's brain waves will change if they hear the clicks. That's how we know the baby can hear. One of the highlights for Sue was when she was able to perform the hearing test on four of her friends' babies.

Sue feels volunteering her time with babies is an honor and a highlight of her week.

When **Stan Whitten** retired in 1991 after almost 36 years with Hewlett Packard via Sanborn Co. in Waltham, MA, he immediately thought of volunteering at LPCH. The staff asked if he could commit to six months to a year; he did. Nineteen years later, Stan is still enjoying the opportunity.

Stan started in the Oncology and Day Hospital Clinic. All he had to do was to play with young patients, keeping them occupied while they waited for doctors and test results. He says that he felt like a grandfather to them. "My eyes still water up with sadness when I think of those wonderful children who did not achieve a lasting success, tempered of course with the joy of witnessing cures. It is great to see the miracle medicines at work today."



Later Stan transferred to the pre-school area to play with babies and younger children. Here he reads to children, plays games with them, and comforts infants until they fall asleep. Stan admits, "It sounds boring but coupling it with love gives me a great feeling of satisfaction." Stan cannot imagine his life without the last 19 years at LPCH. As he says, "I thought that if Lucile Packard could give \$40+ million dollars to children's health care, I should be able to give a few hours each week of my time."

Fran Low, who refers to herself as "The Mad Hatter," has been knitting soft woolen hats for LPCH's "chemo kids" for a number of years. She claims it only takes two or three hours to make a child's hat, depending on the difficulty of the pattern. "I really enjoy knitting, and since I can't sit still without anything to do, it's like therapy for me." Fran, along with some other friends who have family members serving in the armed forces in Afghanistan, also knits hats for soldiers to wear -- Afghanistan is really cold in the winter!

For about twelve years, **Barbara Bowden** has been knitting preemie caps and blankets for the NICU. This work combines her love for knitting and the desire to

find a home for the finished product. Barbara related the following story. "A few years ago, after leaving a steam train in Colorado, a voung woman handed me a note and quickly walked away. It read, 'I heard you talking about the baby caps you make, and I just wanted to thank you for what you do for mothers.

About 4 years ago we had a little boy

who was very premature. A group of ladies in our town make things for preemies, so we received a little outfit for our son. What you do is a great thing, even though you may never meet the mothers. Just know we are very appreciative of your gift. I wouldn't be able to say all this without crying, but I wanted to say thanks in some way. Melanie'' Needless to say, Barbara cried when she read the note and made a promise to herself to keep knitting for preemies.

Myra Slade volunteers two 4-hour shifts per month as a sales person in the LPCH Gift Shop. Since 1996, she has been selling balloons, toys, stuffed animals, baby

clothing, preemie sizes, candy bars, games, books and much more. The mission of the Gift Shop is to raise money to benefit LPCH, helping to cover some of the uncompensated care costs.

For the last 16 years, the Bill Hewlett & Dave Packard Charity Golf Classic has been raising money for LPCH. In recent years, the money raised has gone to support the hospital's Teen Health Van. This van provides free medical services to teenagers in the Bay Area who don't have health coverage. Teens receive medical checkups, medication, counseling, etc. Without this van, many teens would not receive any health care. A number of HPREC members support the Golf Classic by playing in the tournaments. **Shelia Highe** and **John McCabe** serve on the tournament's steering committee. Among other duties, they solicit companies to donate goods and services to the charity. During the 16 years that the Golf Classic has been in existence, over \$480,000 has been raised to support the LPCH.

Bookmark it, as all of the other Web sites can be found from this one-stop-shopping site. This site includes how to order HP logo items, catch up on HP News, and sign up to receive retiree-related e-mails directly from HP Retiree Programs (separate from HP Shopping and HPREC).

If you choose to start at this URL going forward, to get to our Club's home page, click on Retiree Clubs, then Bay Area, choose "Yes" (a step added by HP IT to alert you that you are leaving an HP controlled Web site and entering a Web site hosted by your Club).

If you choose to bookmark our Club page as most visited, you can always find the HP-hosted home page (with all the HP News, EPP, HP Logo items, Benefits updates, vendor discounts, HP and Agilent contact information, and much more) by clicking on **HP Retiree Home** in upper left corner of our Club's home page.

www.bayarea.hpway.org is the Bay Area Employee Programs site for vendor and event <u>discounted</u> items and <u>planned activities</u> for HP employees, and many are made available to retirees. See a sample of offerings in the **Latest Info** section.


www.hp.passportlifestyle.com

www.hpalumni.org is an independently hosted Web site. The HP Alumni Association operates online <u>e-mail</u> discussion forums for former HP and Agilent employees and retirees, and is a vast resource of information. Sign up, it's free to join.

Stay Connected via E-mail

For HP and Agilent retirees to receive periodic e-mails from organizations that fit your interests, you have **three** places to sign up: HPREC, HP,



and HPAA. For privacy reasons, these cannot be shared.

NOT receiving online newsletter notices? NOT receiving periodic e-mails from a Club Board member about important news?

To sign up, go to our HPREC home page, scroll to Retiree e-mail List:

- 1) If you never added your e-mail address to our secure online directory, CLICK ON "Add your e-mail address" and/or select your HPREC Member Options.
- 2) If you previously added your e-mail address, CLICK ON "Change existing e-mail address or change member options." Make sure you've chosen "elect to receive an e-mail notification when your bi-monthly newsletter is posted to the Club Web site." This e-mail will always provide passwords to you.

Review the other available member options to ensure your preferences are carried out. Use password information under HPREC in this article. We do not send the newsletter as an attachment.


