For those of you who were unable to join our annual Spring Fling at Mariani's this year, you really missed out on a delicious traditional St.

Patrick's Day meal of corned beef and cabbage, as well as an excellent presentation by Benson Porter, President and CEO of Addison Avenue Federal Credit Union. This year's attendance was a little smaller than previous years, but we had an intimate gathering of about 100 people.



Benson was introduced by HPREC Board Member John

Weidert, who is also the Chairperson of the Board for Addison Avenue. Starting with an overview of the economic trends facing the country, Benson then transitioned to a discussion about the merger of Addison Avenue with First Tech



Credit Union in Oregon. Although the merger was approved back on January 1, 2011, the integration is targeted to occur over the Memorial Day weekend. Credit Union members will begin receiving information about the merger and how it affects them beginning the week of April 25th. The combined credit union will almost double the number of branches to 38 and will now add 21st century high tech companies like Microsoft, Amazon.com and Intel to its field of membership. The merger will also provide some new products and services for all the members. Benson provided an explanation on how and why First Tech Federal Credit Union was chosen as the name of the combined credit union and previewed the new logo. He also emphasized the importance of the Addison Avenue name, and how it will be retained for the Investment Services division. At the conclusion of his talk, Benson asked the audience some trivia questions about Addison Avenue and rewarded the winners with some Addison prizes. (More pictures are on following page.)

HPREC Hikers Return to Almaden Quicksilver Park

Almaden Quicksilver Park is an old standby for HP hiking early in the year. Despite the rain over the past weeks, the trails were in very good condition, and we had a dry but cloudy day. We saw the rotary furnace (pictured below), Hidalgo Cemetery, and the sites of the old Spanish and English towns. We found some early wild flowers: Indian warriors, buttercups and a lone California poppy. Wildlife was confined to some birds and a banana slug. We had lunch in English Camp, the



site of the CC Camp during the 1930's and a good place for our group photo. A short hike brought us back to the parking lot.

Almaden

Quicksilver Park has a long history because of its cinnabar deposits. Natives used it to make their red body paint; the early Spaniards brought in Cornish miners to extract it for the quicksilver used in gold and silver mining. New Almaden was a thriving mining community through the early 1800's, then it went into decline and mining had disappeared by the early 1900's.



There was a revival with the installation of a modern rotary furnace in the 1930's that ceased production in 1974.

How to get there: Take Camden Avenue south from I-85; after 1.7 miles turn right onto Hicks Road. Go 6 miles on Hicks, past the Guadalupe Reservoir, to the junction of Hicks, Wood and Umunhum Roads. Go right into the Sierra Azul O.S.P. parking area and walk back over Hicks to the park entrance.

HPREC Hikers Sample Spring in the South County

Spring arrived a little late this year, but when it did, we got to experience all the green hills, full creeks and shows of flowers when we visited Rancho Cañada del Oro on April 12. It is an Open Space Preserve administered by the Santa Clara County Open Space Authority, adjoining Calero County Park near Morgan Hill. The preserve is over 3000 acres, with only 8 miles of trails, so we got some nice views with no structures in sight. Our 4.3-mile route took us past over 20 varieties of wildflowers, including fiddleneck, shooting stars, filaree, Johnny-jump-ups, lupine, blue nightshade, royal larkspur, narrow-leaf flax, hound's tongue, miner's lettuce, milkmaids, popcorn flower, buttercups, blue-eyed grass, blue Dick, manroot, poppies, linanthus, Indian warrior, tomcat clover, owl's clover and vetch.

We also saw lots of birds, including a large group of wild turkeys (not to be confused with HPREC hikers). If you wish to see for yourself, go before the summer heat.



Go south on Highway 101 and turn right (west) onto Bailey Road. When Bailey dead-ends, go left onto McKean Road. At about the point where McKean becomes Uvas Road, turn right onto Casa

Loma Road and go about 2 miles to the preserve parking lot. Parking is free. There are restrooms at the trailhead, but no drinking water anywhere in the preserve. Enjoy!

Frank Lloyd Wright Hanna House Tour April 9, 2011

Sunshine, blue sky, views of rolling green hills, and a beautiful morning greeted us for the HPREC tour of Stanford University's Hanna House.

Inside the 1930's built house more delights and surprises awaited us.

The wood and red brick exterior of the house is also used extensively throughout the interior central core. The floor to ceiling walls of windows showcase the gardens, making wall decorations unnecessary.



Angled rooms jut out every which way, and the Frank Lloyd Wright designed furniture is definitely a topic of discussion. You have to see it, and sit on it, to believe it.

Mrs. Hanna insisted that many "child friendly" features be built into the house, which was very unusual for the times. The large children's playroom is now used as a Stanford University conference room.

Hanna House suffered considerable damage during the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, as it was built on a minor branch of the San Andreas Fault. Stanford University spent 10 years reconstructing and refurbishing the house with original materials.

A great time was enjoyed by all.

Hanna House is open for docent led tours Saturdays and Sundays.

Naturally, these soaring gasoline prices are hitting us all, including the bus company that we use. Royal Coach has been our carrier of choice for the past many years, as their safety record is excellent. In fact, they have won several awards for their service. Because we are such a long-standing client, and because we pay our bill when we book a trip,



we are given a discount (usually 10%) on the cost of their service. Even with this, bus service is a major cost of any of our trips. BUT...without

using a bus, the cost of each one of us commuting to a trip location would be high, not to mention the logistics of trying to coordinate any sort of event that has several venues in one day. We appreciate your understanding and support of our efforts.

Additionally, we have been discussing the fact that many times a fun and interesting venue comes to



our attention, but the time to get a flyer made up for the Newsletter, get a bus, arrange for lunch or dinner, etc. is too short for a "managed" trip. Anyone who went to the 2011 Science Fair sponsored by the Santa Clara Valley Science and Engineering Fair Association came away with a good feeling about the future of our youth. Nine hundred thirty-one local students in grades 6 through 12 who live or attend school in Santa Clara County submitted a total of 700 technical and math projects. Fifty-one percent of the budding scientists and engineers were female. Ninety-two different schools, 54 of them public and 38 private, were represented.

ARTIST WITH WOOD: Gene Doucette

Gene Doucette was born and raised in the San Francisco Bay Area, California. His father owned a garage and Gene helped him from a young age. His introduction to woodworking was in 1941 during his



sophomore year at George Washington High School in San Francisco, CA. He decided he enjoyed it much more than the grease under his fingernails doing auto repair and started to pursue his education in woodworking. His high school shop teacher convinced him to set a goal of becoming a teacher after the war. Gene joined the Army Air Corps during WWII and then went on to graduate from San Jose State College in 1949 with a BA and a Teaching Credential. He taught Industrial Arts at

Sequoia High School in Redwood City, CA for eight years, from 1949 until 1957. He then changed careers and spent 36 years with Hewlett-Packard and continued to work on



wood working projects as a hobby during his time with Hewlett-Packard. He was married and had five children and was able to share his love for wood with them through building additions onto their home and working on furniture projects with his kids.

Since retiring from Hewlett Packard in 1993, he has spent much of his time traveling with his wonderful wife Barbara McKee and making all kinds of beautiful furniture. Gene spends five to six hours a day making furniture for his children, grandchildren and friends.

Some of you may be lucky owners of a replica of the HP Garage that Gene made from scrap redwood reclaimed when the HP Redwood Bldg. was demolished. He made 600 and donated them to the Club to be sold. The last ones were given as gifts to visiting international HP retirees a few years ago.

Originally Gene made his furniture from scrap wood such as pallets; he now receives over



90% of his materials from scrap pieces furnished by a friend of his who builds custom staircases. Today, Gene's focus on travel and wood working is a complete change from his work in Telecommunications, Inventory Control, Production Control, Master Scheduling and various other jobs during his 36 year career at Hewlett Packard.

Gene currently lives and produces his furniture at his home in Los Altos, CA.



Remembering Ray Rooney

HPREC's President 1979 – 1981

The following is an excerpt of an interview conducted by Gary and Eileen Ruppel on March 19, 2009. Ray passed away November 22, 2010.

Gary: "When did you start at HP?"

Ray: "I go back to 1942 with HP. I was the 31st employee. Of course, that was during the war when warm bodies were hard to come by. All the young military age people had gone to war and I happened to be married at the time and had a couple children. Dick Arms and I were great friends. I used to work with him at a service station. He would come in and we would talk, visit back and forth. We went hunting and things of that nature. When I was out of work he said, 'Why don't you come down and apply at HP? It's a pretty good little outfit. I'll put in a good word for you.' He was just getting started himself as an engraver making faceplates for the dials. At that time, Dave Packard and Lucile were doing the hiring. Being a young kid with no experience, I wanted to look my best. So I dressed all up in my best Sunday go-to-meeting suit. Dave was in shirt sleeves, I was completely over dressed. I was kind of shy too. Dave was only 2 years older than I. He was a young guy, just getting started. They had no money to speak of. He and Bill started

a company with \$500 and a good idea. He interviewed me for quite some time. I'd had no experience of any kind in electronics. I had done some plumbing type work, digging ditches, working at service stations. In those days jobs were hard to come by. It was getting toward the end of the depression."

Eileen: "I noticed that you were making 60 cents an hour when you started at HP."

Ray: "That was the hiring wage for new, inexperienced employees. I'd been born and raised on a farm, making \$1/day, pitching hay and milking cows. 60 cents an hour was pretty good money."

Gary: "Where was the company located?"

Ray: "It was called Tinker Bell's Fixit Shop. Mr. Bell, a Scotsman, rented the front two thirds, and in the back, he repaired lawnmowers, bicycles - kind of a handyman type guy. He was way up in age then, so first thing you know, HP hired him as a coffee man. He made coffee and distributed it to employees. I think at that time he pretty much gave up the Tinker Bell Shop. Never in my fondest dreams did I imagine... Hewlett and Packard had great ideas. They knew how to treat people – from the very beginning. They had a suggestion plan where we would get rewarded for best ideas. They set the stage for modern production. Up until that time, the worker didn't have much going for him. With the bonus plan, you worked your fanny off and next thing you know, you were getting an extra 15-20 cents an hour. I remember the old days. We'd work five days and on Saturday we'd work a half day. We had sawhorses and planks in the yard and we'd put out the crates and the packing in the road. We'd ship 200 A's or B's. They sold their first to Disney for \$100 each. That was big bucks in those days especially with Hewlett and Packard. It was a pretty remarkable company when you stop and think about it."

Gary: "What did you do at the Redwood Building?"

Ray: "During the war, I was the night foreman at the Redwood Building. Jack Goodman was the day foreman. Help was hard to come by as that was during the middle of the war. A lot of elderly women came out of the woodwork to work for HP as assemblers and wirers and I was in charge of that group. Of course it didn't last too long, maybe a year. Did you ever hear about the Leopard? It was a big instrument, a device that, threw radar off our ships, diverted the signal away from the target. We were in the middle of a big production run when the war ended. We had one or two prototypes out with the fleet. There were 11 kinds of sheet metal, half fabricated. It just ended. There was no market for our stuff. Everyone was flat for a period of time. And then we were faced with all these people and nothing for them to do. The elderly women who'd been working to help the war effort resigned, they left. So they put us to work painting the walls."

Gary: "Some of my notes indicate that, a couple years after you retired (July, 1977), the HP Retiree Club was formed. My notes say the first meeting was on April 4, 1979, at the Palo Alto Elks Lodge."

Ray: "No, Mac's Tea Room. I was there. I can name most of the people who were there. Frank Cavier called the meeting. The idea of the retiree Club was Fred Andersen's. He and his wife were forming a travel club, Homestead Travel. Fred was just getting done with HP; his career was at an end.

"I guess I was selected to be there because I'd been involved in other organizations such as 'Activities Unlimited' – the first HP social club. People who liked to go out and have fun – dance a little, drink a little. We met at my house for our parties. There was the Harmony Plotters and the Symphoneers.


"About six of us met there at Mac's Tea Room to try to get this retiree club started. I remember a lot of them. John and Stella Terry, Frank, Fred, and Elsie Yearian were there. A bunch of people who knew nothing about starting a club. But we talked about it for quite a while and it came to the point of - what are we going to do for officers? Frank Cavier looks around the room and says, 'Fred – you're president, Rooney – you're secretary and Yearian, you're treasurer,' and that's the way the whole thing got started. We sent out mailings and invitations to join our new club. We started out with 50 members. It was a fairly lively organization too. We used to meet where the Old Barrel is. We had a lot of our functions there and a lot of good entertainment too. Those Germans were pretty good musicians. We had meetings there with about 50 people."

Gary: "What did you set out to do? What were you going to do with this Club?"

Ray: "Purely recreation. We never intended for it to be anything but fun and that's the way it's pretty much remained to this day. Fred was busy getting the travel business going so he had the job for about a month before he turned it over to me. I was never elected, I was appointed President. We had bylaws drawn up. At that time, one term was always served. I was around for two terms since we were just getting started. Roger Cowger was the second President. We had a great group of people as officers. I think the success of the Club was due to the great start we had. Most employees in those days were pretty social, they liked to have fun."

Eileen: "What kinds of activities did you do?"

Ray: "We went on overnighter trips, weekend trips, day trips and lunches. Just like now, only on a smaller scale. Fred arranged the travel and I went on a lot of the trips. I used to do a lot of singing. On the bus trips, we'd sing it up to pass the time. Even though I was a pretty shy guy, I'd get on the mic and lead them all. I remember a trip to Canada through Vermont where we all gathered around at night and sang. I still sing and I play the harmonica."

We just learned that HPREC member Art Turnbull, 85, died on April 30, 2010 at home in Boise. He went into the Navy February 1942 at age 17 and was one of the few remaining survivors of the sinking of the USS Morrison DD560. After the war, he got married and took a job as a lathe operator at Olson Manufacturing Company in east Boise where they made sugar beet topping machines. Less than a year later, the employees went on strike and Art had to get a new job. Art and his wife Myrt then moved to Santa Monica, California. While there Art studied hard and received his GED. He later earned an AA Degree in Tool Engineering. In 1963 Art went to work for Mechrolab in San Francisco. Within a few months the company was bought out by HP and they moved to the Palo Alto area of California. In 1965 the company bought the F&M Scientific company in Avondale, Pennsylvania and Art was sent there to help manage the plant and to deal with personnel issues. While there, Art was a Technical Advisor in Vocational Technical Education at the local college. In 1969 HP transferred Art back to California where they had him take over the responsibility of the fabrication operations, the machine shop, sheet metal shop, paint shop, plating, assembly inspection and everything in between. When HP decided to build a plant in Boise, they asked Art to manage the fabrication shop there. To Art's dismay there weren't many people in Boise who were trained in all the things necessary to do fabricating, so they had to transfer some skilled operators and program engineers from the Palo Alto plant. Art then went to work initiating apprenticeship programs for CNC machining, sheet metal and painting. Art retired from HP in September 30, 1986. He is survived by his son Scott Douglas Turnbull, his nephew Bob (Ann) Whitlatch, his niece, Geri Whitlatch, honorary nephew, Chuck Goertzen, four grandnieces, four great grand nieces and his special friend, Patty Johnson. Ingeborg Littau, 78, wife of HPREC member Erwin Littau, passed away in November 2010.

Erwin started his HP career in 1966 at HP Labs in building 1, and moved later to building 25. After his retirement in 1990 he and his wife were looking for a place where they could see the night sky without any interference from artificial light. They found it in Leavensworth, WA, where they have been living since. (*Erwin Littau*)

LaJune Bush died on February 9, 2011. She worked at Hewlett-Packard in government affairs. 

Hike Location: Pogonip Open Space Preserve in the City of Santa Cruz. This 640-acre remnant of the Cowell Ranch is squeezed between Henry Cowell State Park and the campus of UC Santa Cruz. It has a variety of habitat, including oak woodland, redwood, grassland, chaparral and a sycamore grove. The land is recovering from its early use for logging and limestone quarrying. There are also remains of the Casa del Rey Club, golf links and polo grounds. Our route will be about 6 miles with 800 feet cumulative vertical gain. 


