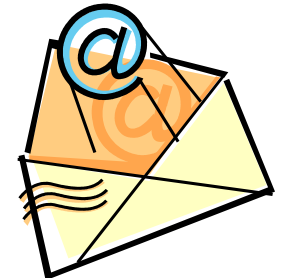

We arrived at Vision Quest Ranch (also known as Wild Things) and learned that this 51 acre animal sanctuary also serves as a boarding kennel as well as a place for professionally trained wild and exotic animals to retire with a dedicated staff to care for them. While the animals are in cages, they are very well cared for and appear to enjoy the interaction with visitors. It was sad to learn that the tiger (Star), who was the EXXON “Tiger in Your Tank” tiger, is living his last few days there, as he has a terminal disease. (See photo below.) He is a beautiful tiger.

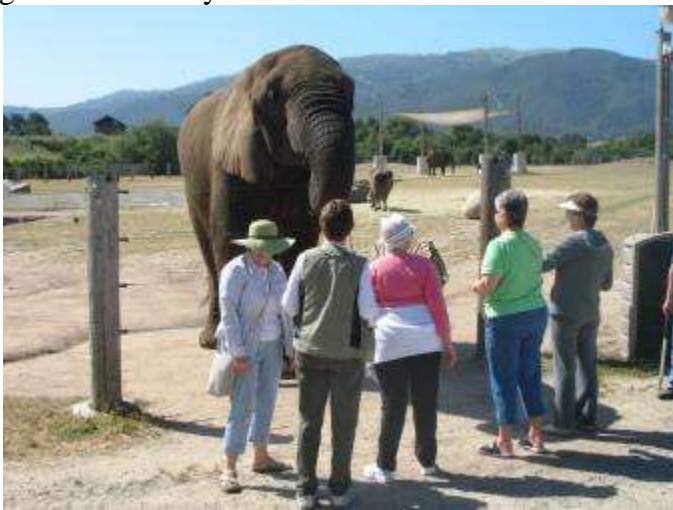


After a briefing by a staff member, we took a one hour walk around the compound to see and learn about the colorful backgrounds of these amazing creatures. The elephant “playpen” was very large and contained five elephants and one zebra. It seems the zebra was placed with the elephants at an early age due to disciplinary problems with other

zebras, and has now grown up thinking he IS an elephant!



And we all got to feed the large bull elephant (Butch) carrots. This was very interesting, as his trunk was very flexible and was oh-so gentle when taking the food from your hand. At the conclusion of the tour, we visited the gift shop and learned about their “Elephant Ears” program that supports elephants through the Elephants of Africa Rescue Society. Several of us bought a dining and entertainment book, of which 100% of the proceeds go to that society.



Then on to John Steinbeck’s House for a delicious lunch served by ladies who volunteer at this home. As we ate, one lady talked about the house (which is beautifully cared for), and the life that John had in this place. There was also a gift shop in the “basement” of the house, which many of us visited as well.

Our final stop of the day was the Steinbeck Museum. This was quite well done, and we learned even more about John’s life in Salinas. The exhibits

were very enlightening and contained some wonderful photos of Steinbeck and what this area looked like so many years ago.



It turned out to be a very warm day, so the trip back to Cupertino found many of us enjoying the cool water and cookies before we snoozed. We all agreed that this was a very worthwhile trip, both fun and educational.

We had a perfect day in May for our Los Trancos Open Space Preserve hike. We saw lizards, deer, a female



turkey with her brood of little ones (see the picture of her disappearing into the brush), lots of flowers and a plaque honoring Flora Lamson Hewlett (see picture). Among the wildflowers viewed included Blue Eyed Grass, Owl's Clover, Mule's Ears, Lupine,



California Poppy, and Trillium. Herb Knoesel, while bird watching, identified the new Airbus A380 on its way to its first landing at SFO. The Los Trancos Open Space Preserve is

located seven miles up Page Mill Road from Highway 280 just before Skyline Boulevard. It will be on your right side; the Monte Bello Open Space Preserve parking area is on your left side and has bathroom facilities.

Seven Hearty HPREC Hikers Take on the Pogo Mentality

OK, so it is not a presidential election year. The political mentality survives, however, as Pogo readies another presidential run—and HPREC hikers investigate the source of the name for **Pogonip** Open Space Reserve of the City of Santa Cruz.

What they found, however,



in this area of shady creeks and late wildflowers, was that the **Po** stands for the polo grounds that once prospered here in the 1920s/30s; the **Go** stands for the golf links which flourished here as the Casa del Rey Country Club; and the **Nip** stands for the drink you could have had in the decaying clubhouse on the property.

This was one of Henry Cowell's properties which provided redwood for lumber and limestone for cement to reconstruct San Francisco after 1906. Of course, his foundation also provided California college students with their first glimpse of the future of socialized medicine, with Cowell medical services on virtually every major California campus.

The property is recovering nicely. Second growth redwoods look good, and the limestone quarries are overgrown with oak, bay and redwood. We spotted numerous flowers.

Our route took us along the Felton-to-Boardwalk rail line, which is operated by Roaring Camp, then through redwood groves, grasslands, chaparral and oak/madrone woodlands. We saw one of the many limestone quarry



sites and a restored stone kiln. Four seasonal creeks were still running, but the wildflowers were dwindling. The surprise of the hike was a pool containing a large number of goldfish. Fish food was stashed in the

crook of a tree for hikers to feed the fish!

April and May are the best months to visit Pogonip. To get there, just drive to Felton and go south on Highway 9 for 3.8 miles. The Rincon parking area is on the left.

From the Historian

Dick Stone joined HP in 1950 and retired in 1978 at age 65. He is now 97. Stan Selby joined HP in 1946 and passed away at age 74 in 1966. This letter is self-explanatory and may bring back some memories of how it was at HP during the times these two individuals worked at HP.

“May 11, 2011

Dear Survivors of Stan Selby,

I am writing to you because you knew Stan Selby well, and I want you to know how Stan changed my life, how he rescued me from years of dismal failure and misery to about six years of relief and happiness.

Gary Ruppel of Palo Alto gave me your names, people who were close to Stan, and since I cannot write to Stan I'm expressing to you the deep-felt thanks that I wanted to give to him.

I was hired in 1950 after a career as a reporter for a few small newspapers. Prior to that, I was a graduate student at the University of Cincinnati, having graduated from Yale. My majors were Greek and Latin. People would ask me, "How do you expect to make a living?" For three years, I was totally immersed in studying. It is necessary to emphasize this because of the stupid, stupid, stupid decisions that I was about to make. The first was giving up my fellowship -- I was sick of studying -- and the second was the answer that I gave to Noel Porter when he was interviewing me for a job at HP and asked me where I wanted to work. I was fed up with studying. I wanted to work with my hands, so I was assigned to Machine Assembly.

In Machine Assembly, I was a trial to the supervisor. Pliers and screwdrivers were like extra thumbs for all the good they did me. Very soon my supervisor caught on and moved me from one instrument to another, hoping that there was something I could do. He was always disappointed. I was moved into the machine shop and assigned to a drill press, the simplest of all machines.

I had never received a raise, and when one was given me, it was for five cents; was told that I got it because someone felt sorry for me.

True to form, I was transferred to Wiring and Assembly. Soldering proved to be such a challenge that one of my soldering joints was displayed as an example of how not to solder.

I was moved to the Test Department. I wasn't any good at that either. I think they gave me several other chances, and I flunked them all. I was miserable. I used to go to a nearby church on my lunch hour and pray.

Then, as I was making a fool of myself at another job, Stan Selby called me off the line and asked me if I wanted to go to Stanford and have some tests made! God bless him!!! For ten years, Hewlett Packard had put up with me. Any other company would have fired me within two months. But, that was when Bill and Dave were there!

Now comes the good part.

The tests showed that I would be a complete failure doing things with my hands. Please believe me: I am telling you this not to brag but to show why I am so grateful to Stan's memory and why I wish so ardently that I could thank him. From waking up dreading the day, I woke up each day looking forward to work. When I walked the dog I thought about it.

Dick Were asked for me to work in Inventory Control. My job was expediting orders from the other divisions. It was fun. The divisions in Scotland and Germany invited me and my wife to visit them. What a reward!

And that was not all. I was working in Zella Williamson's "think tank." She was the best boss I ever had. Dick told me that one of his biggest headaches was what to tell the buyers when their suppliers offered discounts if they would order larger quantities. He was pleased when I came up with a formula measuring the savings against the costs of carrying the extra inventory.

Since that formula and the economic order quantity formula required some computation and since this was before everyone had a hand calculator, I provided the buyers with what is called a nomograph. It consisted of a couple of logarithmic scales on a page that, when connected by straight lines, would do the necessary math.

The accolade came when I retired. I was asked to return to work. They asked me to come back and enhance the conventional Economic Order Quantity formula so that it would include in the cost of carrying inventory the components as they were being put together.

I know all that sounds like bragging, but I told you about it because I wanted so very much to thank Stan and since I cannot thank him, I want to thank those who were close to him.

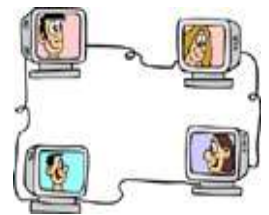

2> Please remember to send in a self-addressed and stamped envelope IF you do NOT have an e-mail address and use a computer for correspondence. We

are not calling people anymore to confirm reservations.

3> Make sure your check, if required, is included with your reservation. We only “book” people if the reservation is complete. Having to send back a reservation for payment will delay getting a positive confirmation notice and could result being placed on a “Wait List.”

line, serving as the Lab Manager and then as a founder of the Oscilloscope Division. In this role, he was noted for his ability to design around major competitor Tektronix's patents. He moved to Colorado Springs in 1964 when the Scope Division occupied its newly constructed quarters in Garden of the Gods Industrial Park. He led the Advanced R&D Lab for several years, and was the division Quality Assurance Manager. His last assignment was the Metallization Engineer for bipolar integrated circuits at the Colorado Technology Center. A cost-saving effort led by Norm in Colorado Springs quickly expanded corporation-wide to include environmental pollution reduction.
