President's Message

It was great to see so many of you at the Holiday Luncheon! We had a nice lunch and gave away over seventy-five gifts – WOW! HP and Agilent were generous again this year. The gifts included a HP Dream Screen (frame), 2 HP Photo Printers, HP-logo folding chairs, HP-logo blankets, five \$100 HP gift cards, gift certificates from several local stores and restaurants (these were from Agilent), See's candy, many mini binoculars donated by HP and more! Our guest speaker, Prith Banerjee, the Director of HP Labs, gave us a general update regarding HP and HP Labs. Prith was very informative and kept us well entertained with his wonderful sense of humor. Following are pictures from the luncheon - maybe you'll recognize an old friend or two - enjoy!

The annual luncheon also serves as our annual Club meeting, during which the President gives the attending members an overview of the Club's activities and finances as of the closing of the previous fiscal year. Following are the highlights:

- Our three events, the Annual Holiday Luncheon, Spring Fling Luncheon and Summer Picnic were held in 2011 and will be held again in 2012. Beginning this year, HP will not hold an Annual Retiree Briefing meeting. HP has asked that the clubs manage an update, to be provided by HP, locally. We will be sharing this update, and have a door prize, also provided by HP, at the Spring Fling Luncheon in March.

- Monthly Activities (hiking, bowling and golf) were enjoyed by many in 2011 and will continue in 2012.
- In 2011, there were many excellent trips and tours organized by our Travel Committee, and there will many to look forward to in 2012.
- Our Volunteer activities contributed over 14,000 hours of community service (almost three hundred thousand dollars in value!).
- We closed the fiscal year with 1506 members, down almost 100 from the previous year. We continue to ask members to encourage other HP and Agilent retirees to join our Club.
- The Club's income for the year was a little over \$13,400 (the low number is caused by our dues notice error which resulted in dues being paid late – the remainder of the dues income will show up in Q1'12) and our expenses were about \$24,000 for a net loss of about \$10,600. In general, our loss is primarily due to declining membership. The Club remains financially healthy, which is why we have not increased dues.
- Our Web site and newsletter continue to keep our members well informed and are excellent resources for our members to reference.

In the new year, please read the newsletters for opportunities to participate in the monthly activities, attend events, go on a trip or two, and to volunteer in the Bay Area communities. We all can "make a difference" – let's do it together!

For those of you who live south, you might consider taking HWY 9 to HWY 35, turning north ~3.5 miles to the Grizzly Flat parking area on your right.



All of these activities average about 65 hours per month,



Hike Location: Wunderlich (San Mateo) County Park in Woodside. We will hike a 5.4 loop with about 950 feet of elevation gain. The trail has a steady slope up to the meadows which are at 1,430 feet. After eating lunch there, we will hike back through different but similarly sloped downhill trails. The hike will take us through a variety of environments including toyon, madrone, oak, and redwood trees and a salamander pond.

Turn right into Wunderlich County Park and park in the parking lot.

HPREC member **Jane Gillespie Evans**, 84, passed away on December 1, 2011. She became the first woman to graduate with a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from San Jose State University in 1965. Jane subsequently was the first woman engineering graduate to be hired by Hewlett-Packard Company. While working at HP, Jane attended Santa Clara University, completing an MBA. For twenty-five years, Jane played a significant role in HP's rise as a global provider of electronics and computers. She was a role model to countless engineers, women and men, exemplifying the best of the profession. Jane was an active leader of the Institute of Electronics and Electrical Engineers (IEEE), serving at local, regional, and national levels. She was Chair of the Board of Directors of the 1997 WESCON Conference. Under her leadership, WESCON was held in Silicon Valley for the first time. Jane was a fellow of both the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Society of Women Engineers, where she also served on the national Board of Trustees. She received the IEEE's Centennial Medal, the Career Action Center's Woman of Vision Award, San Jose State University's Engineering Award of Distinction, and the Girl Scouts of Santa Clara County's World of Today and Tomorrow Award. In 1999, Jane was inducted into the Silicon Valley Engineering Hall of Fame. She is survived by her two nephews, Christopher Moore and Charles Moore. (*San Jose Mercury News*)



Patricia C. Dunn, 58, died on December 4, 2011. She climbed from an entry-level position as a secretarial assistant to become the Chief Executive Officer of San Francisco-based Barclays Global Investors (BGI) as it developed into the world's largest institutional money manager and subsequently served as the Non-Executive Chairman of the largest IT company in the world. In 2006, she found herself at the center of a media firestorm regarding an investigation by HP to find the source of leaks to the press. Although the company later acknowledged she did not authorize, direct, or conduct the investigation, she was asked to resign from the board because her continued presence had become a distraction given the attention to the matter by the media. Dunn graciously complied, mounting an aggressive defense, which included testifying on Capitol Hill and, after being charged with four felonies, an appearance on 60 Minutes. All charges were later dropped in "the interest of justice" by a California Superior Court Judge before a scheduled preliminary hearing was held. Not only was the case against Dunn weak, there was evidence Dunn had been scapegoated. Dunn, who was legendarily even-tempered, collaborative and focused in her business dealings, was equally tenacious as a cancer patient. By some accounts, she underwent more chemotherapy at the University of California San Francisco Medical Center than anyone else in the institution's history, outliving the three-year life expectancy for her type of ovarian cancer by nearly five years. Dunn and her husband endowed a chair at UCSF's Department of Surgery and also funded clinical trials of an ovarian cancer immunotherapy at the University of Pennsylvania in which, in some cases, she participated. Besides her husband Bill Jahnke, Dunn is survived by two daughters, Janai Brengman and Michelle Cox, a son, Michael Jahnke, and ten grandchildren, as well as a brother, Paul Dunn, and a sister, Debbie Lammers and her husband Chris, along with their children Paul Dunn, Jr. and Laura, Stephen and Kelly Lammers. (*San Jose Mercury News*)




