

A COUNTRY DAY IN PETALUMA

May 16 was a fun and yummy day for 28 HPREC members, starting with our 8:30 a.m. departure from Cupertino via bus. We had a delightful ride to our first stop...the Marin French Cheese Factory, which is nestled in the hills of Petaluma. This is a small cheese factory that produces delicious brie cheeses, many of which are available at Costco. We had a tour of the factory, which is in the finishing stages of a remodel of the factory floor. This cheese is all hand-made, and the process is fascinating. Currently, the Cheese Factory is not open for tours, but because we had booked this so far ahead, we were given a very private tour. (Another tour bus arrived and was consequently turned away, as they did not book a tour ahead!) Many of us bought a month's worth of cheese...it all was so yummy and wonderful.

We had ordered sandwiches in advance, and the staff put together a delightful brown bag lunch for us. Their picnic area was truly lovely...by a pond and Canada geese coming and going as we ate. A real thrill was seeing an osprey (member of eagle/hawk family) land in a tall tree and then plunge into the pond to catch a fish and fly away with it in its talons. John McCabe tried to catch a photo of this bird in flight, but the osprey was too fast. (See pond photo on page 6.)

After lunch we traveled to the McClelland Dairy for a tour of their totally organic dairy farm. This was quite an adventure, as we saw everything from a new born calf in the pasture, to lots of baby calves in their stalls, and a herd of cows being milked. The herd is small...about 300 cows. This dairy is family owned and as organic as can be. They grow their own food (called silage) for the cows and make award winning organic butter. While the unpleasantness of "cow-smell" was definitely in the air when we were in the barns looking at the young calves, the honest beauty of these critters was wonderful. Caroline Kaye fell "in love" with a calf that had a protruding tooth, which she promptly named "Snaggle Tooth"! (See photo on page 6.)

The best was yet to come...several HPREC members MILKED a cow! This was such fun, as we all sat on hay bales as individuals tried their hand at milking. After that, we walked over to watch the automatic milking and then on to the gift shop. There we tasted their award winning Old European Butter...it was FANTASTIC! Many of us bought quite a bit of butter...and at \$12 per pound, this is not your everyday cooking butter. But it was so very different and tasted great on crackers alone!

This was a really fun day in the country, and the ride back to Cupertino was relatively quiet...all that country air made a lot of the members sleepy. Both of these places we visited were just super...the people treated us so well. Another fun HPREC trip!





April 26 dawned bright, sunny, and windy as 28 HPREC members set off on a day of great fun and history. Our first stop was the aircraft carrier, USS Hornet, which is based in Alameda. The size of the ship was awesome and boarding the carrier made one think about where the ship had been. We started the tour with a veteran telling us some of the history. As a surprise plus, a gentleman (now 87 years old) talked to us about when HE was on the carrier as a 17 year old sailor. His stories were amazing. Then, for over 2 ¹/₂ hours, we climbed all over the carrier with a terrific docent (another WW II veteran)...going up to the bridge on VERY steep and narrow ladder/stairs; going down (a real challenge for those of us who are afraid of heights) to the engine room; and seeing everything in between.

The exhibits on the carrier were well done, which included the 1969 Apollo 11 space capsule and photographs of the moon walk. There were photos of the Hornet recovering the Apollo 12 capsule with her all-Navy crew. The USS Hornet is one of the most decorated ships of the Navy. GO NAVY!

Lunch was an adventure, and we ended up having our "picnic lunch" in the Oakland Amtrak Station. Yep...it was a great "find", as the temperature and wind outside would have been too much for us. Then on to the Cathedral of Light.

This Catholic Cathedral is very modern and amazingly beautiful. We were blessed (no pun intended) to have a very good docent who lead us through the entire Cathedral. There is a burial vault in the basement of this Cathedral that houses many distinguished leaders of the Catholic Church, as well as public vaults for the local community. The outstanding feature of this Cathedral is the etched glass "front" of the altar, with a big Jesus looking down on all His people. The photograph does not do this wall of glass justice.

This was both a fun and educational day for all of us. We are constantly amazed at the unique places we can visit within the Bay Area...so join us for our next adventure.







Volunteer Opportunities at Eastside College Preparatory School

Eastside College Preparatory School in East Palo Alto California specializes in serving students who will be the first in their families to go to college. Attaining this goal not only changes the lives of the students and their families, but their communities as well. Eastside is committed to opening new doors for students historically underrepresented in higher education. Their students are 64% Latino, 33% African American, and 3% Pacific Islander. All of Eastside's graduates have been admitted to four-year colleges. A full 80% of Eastside alumni are currently enrolled in a four-year college or have earned their bachelor's degree. (Nationally, only 11% of firstgeneration college students graduate within six years.)

A number of HP and Agilent retirees have volunteered there through the years. They have found the students to be smart and eager to learn. Eastside is currently looking for volunteers to tutor 7th and 8th grade students in their morning Reading Program. This is a wonderful chance to work with these students during their formative years in a very well-organized program. Each group of 6-7 students reads a young adult novel about the historical period they are studying. You, as their tutor, using a well documented lesson plan, review the novel, discuss the characters and plot, and do other activities such as role playing, creating character journals, writing articles, etc.

Ideally tutors will participate in two or more morning sessions a week with their groups so that they get to know the students; however, the program adjusts around individual schedules and availability. One-day slots are available. Tutors substitute for each other when regular schedules cannot be kept due to illness or vacation. During each 45 minute session, you take turns reading age appropriate books, work on word sounds, explain new vocabulary, and complete short exercises with your student. I guarantee the experience will be fun and rewarding for you and help to ensure the academic success of your student!

This past spring, I volunteered at San Miguel Elementary School in Sunnyvale. I worked with a fifth grader and expect to be back there again in the fall with a new student.



Shoreline harbors lots of wildlife, and we might see common birds such as ducks, avocets, swallows, sandpipers and white pelicans, along with more unusual creatures like jackrabbits and burrowing owls.

This area is wheelchair accessible.

Coffee and light lunch or snacks are available at the Lakeside Cafe. The Rengstorff House is open for tours on Wednesdays from 11:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. plus the grounds and gardens are open to the public at the same time. For those interested, we can take a guided tour after the hike. There is no cost but donations are always welcome.

Meet at: 10:00 a.m. at the parking lot near the Lakeside Café and the boat house. Restrooms are located in the Cafe building.

Bring: Water. The breezy trails along the bay can be cool even when the rest of the bay area is sweltering, so dress accordingly. A donation if you plan to tour the Rengstorff House.

Hike Location: Butano State Park. (Say <u>boo</u>-tano). We last hiked here in 2003. At press time, this beautiful 3800-acre forest was **NOT** slated to shut down due to the California budget fiasco. We'll keep you posted as we approach September. Butano is the native Quiroste/Ohlone place name for "a gathering place for friendly visits". The steep terrain along Little Butano Creek prevented the usual 19 century practice of clear cutting, so some old-growth redwood and fir are mixed in with the very rapid second growth. The result is a stunning walk along a year-round running stream, which is at or near its original profile. Go about 4.5 miles southwest of Pescadero by way of the Pescadero and Cloverdale Roads to get there. There is a parking fee, so please bring your hang tag, if you have one.

Meet at: The Arastradero Preserve parking area to carpool. From I-280, turn southwest on Page Mill Road. Go .5 mile to



Arastradero Road and then go .5 mile to the preserve. Bring water, lunch and \$3.00 each to reimburse carpool drivers.

Hike Location: Golden Gate Bridge, San Francisco. Never walked across the Golden Gate Bridge? Let's do it together. The span is 1.7 miles (8,981 feet or 2,737 m) each direction, including approaches. We will meet at the Bridge Plaza at the south end of the Bridge. This is the last exit before crossing – watch the signs. Carpools are essential, as parking is limited. We will walk from the plaza to the visitor area on the Marin side, take a rest break, and then retrace our steps to San Francisco. This may take about $1 - 1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs. roundtrip allowing for viewing and photos.

Meet at carpool locations at 10:00 a.m.

At the Arastradero Preserve parking area. From I-280, turn southwest on Page Mill Road. Go .5 mile to Arastradero Road and then go .5 mile to the preserve.

Or from the East Bay, just outside the entrance to Coyote Hills Regional Park. Meet at the southwest corner parking area at the intersection of Paseo Padre Parkway and Patterson Ranch Road.

This hike is wheelchair accessible.

Bring: Water, jacket and hat (that won't blow away), sunscreen, camera, binoculars, and snacks/lunch if you wish. Some snacks are available for purchase at the Visitor Center. There are restrooms at both ends of the span.

Because Art was able to complete college with the help of scholarships, he and Mary established scholarships for Engineering students at U.C. Berkeley, and then went on to establish fellowships at both Cal and

Stanford. They were widely known for their philanthropy at these universities, as well as the Palo Alto Medical Foundation, Stanford Hospital, Lucille Packard Children's Hospital, Avenidas in Palo Alto and a host of other organizations.
