



Before looking at our summer plans for the Club, I want to acknowledge the work of Harold Kaye (and his wife Caroline) and of John Weidert and Homer Wong for helping out with our 2013 Spring Fling Luncheon at Mariani's in Santa Clara. More about the event inside, but it was a fun event, and the group enjoyed hearing from Agilent's new President Ron Nersesian about the company's strategy.

Our next major Club event for 2013 is the picnic, which is coming up on Saturday June 8. Again, there is more inside, but I wanted to make sure every member knew of the opportunity to join several hundred fellow HPREC members at a new location this year. After HP vacated its Cupertino site (now owned by Apple) and shut off all the utilities, it became impossible to return to the Redwood Grove for picnics. We looked at a number of sites but finally chose Agilent's Santa Clara site patio (upstairs) for this year's picnic. Homer Wong has graciously offered to coordinate until we find a new picnic chair, and he is working with Agilent's site security and food service teams to plan this year's event. We have the option to use a portion of the cafeteria if weather is a problem and will have our traditional menu and games available.

Members and guests MUST be registered in advance to be admitted by Agilent Security, so please don't delay in filling in the flyer (pg. 19) in this issue and mailing in your check for the picnic!

Several other important changes are happening behind the scenes at the Board level that members should be aware of. First, Chris Benninger has agreed to serve the Club and assist me as Vice President through at least 2013. Second, Cam Nelson has volunteered to assist in coordinating the volunteer programs for HPREC, working with the HPARV group and representatives of HP and Agilent. Our members have done great things volunteering throughout our community for a wide range of projects, and Cam is looking forward to helping connect volunteers with projects and to share some of the results through stories in our newsletter and elsewhere. Finally, Jo-Ann Butler has offered to co-chair the Holiday Luncheon next December with Pat Fausett. That is one of our larger events, and it takes hours of effort to put together. They have already begun a dialogue with the new management at the Crowne Plaza Cabana Hotel and the date for our luncheon is Monday, December 9.

Now, as summer approaches, I have another request for our membership. I have listed my e-mail and phone number in the Directory, and would really like to hear from members about activities or events they feel the Club should support or organize.

We see a small group of regular participants in monthly or periodic activities. Fewer than 2 dozen regularly hike or bowl each month, and roughly that number play golf each month during the season. Our bridge group ended in 2011 and hasn't restarted. The active participants in our travel programs (day trips or longer weekend and weeklong trips) are also a small subset of the membership. While many members live out of the

area and are content to receive newsletters and a directory each year, I wonder if there are things our members want us to start doing. Should we establish a camping group for those with RVs or those who enjoy backpacking? Should we schedule bicycle rides around some of the wonderful trails and bike paths in the Bay Area? Should we schedule some activities in the evenings or on weekends? Should we try to sponsor more informal "group reunions" like those that OED or DMK or Mountain View Support Organization already host?

I've asked our Board members to bring their suggestions, and I would really welcome direct input from the members. If our Club is to continue to be viable and retain members and the support of HP and Agilent, we will need to adapt to evolving needs. I would love to hear from you on the kinds of things HPREC should focus on this summer and on into 2014.

## SAN FRANCISCO SYMPHONY OPEN REHEARSAL FEBRUARY 28, 2013

On a cool and crisp February morning, bright and early at 7:00 a.m., a group of 30 music loving HPREC members boarded a Royal Coach bus and

headed up to Davies Symphony Hall in San Francisco. This departure was a "first" for our Club, as we were using a new "gathering location" for the bus to pick us up and drop us off...Cupertino Vallco Shopping Mall, behind JC Penney. All went smoothly, and we were happy to see a familiar driver, Philip Jetson, who is one of our favorites.

The first part of this trip encompassed listening to one of the Symphony's "Open Rehearsals," which is always a wonderful working session with the musicians. This is one of the best musical bargains in the Bay Area and a truly lovely event for us. This particular program featured a young soprano, Nadine Sierra, who had a fabulous vocal range and technique. She has won many awards for her singing, and we agreed, well deserved. The orchestra remains one of the best in the U.S. Sadly, we learned of the lead oboist's passing that morning, as he had collapsed during a performance a few days prior. There was a profoundly emotional moment of silence for this gentleman. The program was the music from Zaide, by Mozart, written in 1780. Additionally, the orchestra played Bruckner's Symphony No. 7 in E Major (1883), which was excellent. What a glorious morning.

We stayed until the very end of the rehearsal, and then boarded the bus to head to The Ferry Building. There we spent the next couple of hours "on our own", which included selecting a place to eat and lots of fun shopping. The Ferry Building has some very good venues from which to select gifts, household items, food, and CHOCOLATES! Several of us walked down to the end of the pier and saw the Oracle boat that will be competing in the America's Cup later this year.

As we were bused home at the end of this beautiful day, it was agreed that this "Open Rehearsal" trip would be an annual event. We are so lucky to have the San Francisco Symphony in our neighborhood, as Michael Tilson Thomas (the renowned conductor) always puts together a feast for one's ears. ## HPREC Spring Fling Luncheon

More than 125 members and guests of the Club met at Mariani's in Santa Clara March 12 for the annual Spring Fling Luncheon. The restaurant did a terrific job with multiple menu choices, including traditional corned beef and cabbage, and it was a great meal, with a lot of "catching up" and active conversations at the tables.

This year our guest speaker was Ron Nersesian from Agilent Technologies. Ron is an engineering graduate from Lehigh University in Pennsylvania, and worked for HP in New Jersey as well as several other companies before rejoining Agilent in the Electronic Measurement Group. Ron was promoted to Chief Operating Officer in 2011, and was given the title of President at the end of 2012. Ron was accompanied by Mr. Dominique Grau, Vice President of Worldwide HR. Also joining at the speaker's table was Greg Mitchell, the new CEO of First Tech Federal Credit Union.

Ron and other Agilent executives had just returned from a meeting with financial analysts in New York, and he was able to share the Agilent strategy to continue pursuing several complementary lines of business rather than dedicate the company solely to life sciences, chemical analysis, genomics or electronic measurements. This strategy makes the analysts' work more difficult, but helps to cushion the company from downturns in one market, and was part of Dave Packard's strategy for HP from the 1970s to the late 1990s. Agilent's businesses are all profitable and are showing growth even in slowgrowing economies, as healthcare and communications continue to evolve around newer technologies. Agilent is well positioned to benefit from increased investment in both areas.

#### **Baylands Lite Hike**

It was a perfect March day for a Lite Hike. The earlier sprinkles had cleared, the tide was fairly high, and the temperature just right.

We saw lots of shore birds (like avocets, stilts, egrets, willets, and godwits), a magnificent pheasant, ducks (including ruddy, mallard, gadwall, shoveler, and scaup), and views out onto the San Francisco Bay.

From the parking area at Byxbee Park, we walked along the Marsh Front Trail to the Sailing Station, then to the Lucy Evans Baylands Nature Interpretive Center, past the duck pond, and back to the parking lot. Our hike was a total of almost three miles on level paths.

To get there: From Hwy 101, take the Oregon Expy/ Embarcadero Road exit to Embarcadero Road East. Go right at the T and park at Byxbee Park parking lot.

#### **Alum Rock Park**

Alum Rock Park is the oldest regional park in the state and is owned and run by the City of San Jose. The park was founded in 1872 along Penitencia Creek, which was known for its mineral springs. The scenic beauty of the



site is preserved to the present day, along with the slight sulfurous odor along parts of the creek. We were fortunate

to pick a perfect California day – deep blue skies, a brisk cooling breeze, and wildflowers along the hillsides. We took the North Rim Trail with open views of the magnificent hills. Above us were teetering turkey vultures, and flitting by the trail were three busy acorn woodpeckers close enough for us to clearly see their bright red heads. The hillsides were splashed with yellow mustard, blue native chaparral peas, white millfolium, sticky monkey flowers, yellow lupine, and scarlet pimpernel. Lunch was enjoyed along the creek, where a Steller's jay squawked for handouts. Along the way back, we saw a family of deer, wild turkeys, and a

lone mallard along the creek. Alum Rock was a perfect spring hike for a perfect April day. (Thanks goes to Ed White for suggesting this hike.)

For those who wish to hike Alum Rock Park, take the Berryessa exit from I-680 toward the hills. Hang a right on N. Capital, then left on Penitencia Creek. Continue on Penitencia Creek Road until you reach the park entrance, which is clearly marked. There are two more parking areas further along Penitencia Creek Road if you are interested in exploring other trails. Restrooms and potable water are available within the park, along with shady picnic tables and a nature center. Parking is \$6.00 per car.

Our group of eight enjoyed a breezy stroll along the banks of Saratoga/San Tomas Creek (Reach 6 of the county trail) and even explored a portion of Reach 5 for a distance of approximately 2-1/3 miles, enjoying the vegetation on the creek banks and the occasional shade of the redwoods, but missing the presence of water in the creek! Due to the low rainfall this winter, a water district worker told us that they are not releasing water from Vasona Dam for now. It's a good thing that the beavers selected Guadalupe River and Los Gatos Creek for their new spot. The only wildlife we were able to spot was ground squirrels, but we did enjoy the many dogs being walked on the trail.

If you would like to enjoy this hike yourself and you are coming from the north, take the Lawrence Expressway exit from Hwy 280 or Hwy 101, turn right on Bollinger, then left on Wunderlich and left on Castle Glen---just past Murdock/Portal Grammar School. If you are coming from Hwy 85, take the Saratoga Avenue exit and turn left on Saratoga Avenue, turn left on Lawrence Expressway, then left on Prospect Avenue. Turn right on Johnson Avenue, then right on Castle Glen.



#### NASA Exploration Center and Moffett Field Historical Society Museum Trip

On a sunny, cool March 6, 2013, thirty five HPREC members gathered for the NASA Exploration Center opening at 10:00 a.m. We were welcomed by Horatio Chavez who was excited to show us "his" exhibits and answer our many questions.

The gem of the exhibits was the moon rock brought



to earth by Apollo 15 in 1971. Also included in the exhibit was a model of the SOFIA aircraft designed for infrared astronomy observation of the stratosphere and a Mercury-1A

capsule launched in 1960.

A visit inside the mock-up of the International Space Station was a popular experience. Later, we

watched a film which showed us how the astronauts lived on the International Space Station. This Space



Station is definitely not for claustrophobics.

After lunch at the Tee Minus One Bar & Grill on the Moffett Field Golf Course, we visited the Moffett Field Historical Society Museum which was next to the historical Hanger One. Hanger One was built for the USS Macon (ZRS) airship in 1931, and is one of the largest freestanding structures that covers over 8 acres. The Akron, an earlier airship, was based on the West Coast in 1932. The Moffett Field site was chosen for its "lack of San Francisco fog."

Our docent, "Frenchie," was a retired naval pilot whose storytelling was riveting. He brought the history of Moffett Field and its personnel to life for our enjoyment and understanding. Moffett Field is a former naval air station and today is owned and operated by NASA Ames Research Center. Moffett Field Historical Society Museum is a definite "MUST SEE" place to enjoy Silicon Valley history.

This was both a fun and educational day for all of us!

#### TRAVEL TALK

By Your Travel Committee

Your Travel Committee would like to bring to your attention a couple of items that need clarification and repeating in order to have smoother processes when participating in HPREC trips and events. While we are excited about seeing more responses to planned trips, we want to make sure that you are aware of some of the practices, procedures, and policies that govern our trips and events.

1> We have a new parking area for Day Trips only, which is the parking lot at the Vallco Shopping Mall, just behind JC Penney . When we send a confirmation message to participants, we will include a map so that it will be easier to access the area. Please note that we CANNOT use this area for overnight parking.

2> Several people have called and inquired about bringing children on our trips. A general rule is no, as we cannot accept the liability of young children. However, there are some trips that are child-appropriate for teens. We ask that you contact the Trip Leader for clarification for specific cases. Otherwise, no young children are allowed.

#### 3> PLEASE KEEP YOUR RESERVATION SHEETS!

We get so many calls from members who can't remember the time the bus picks up, or the actual date of the event, or if they have even signed up for the trip/event. A general rule of thumb is that, if your check has been cashed, you are signed up for the trip. That is your confirmation.

4> Trip reminders are only sent by e-mail a few weeks before the actual event. If you do not have e-mail services, you MUST send us a self-addressed/stamped envelope in which we can send you the computer generated trip reminder and other important information. It is not fair to expect a Trip Leader to take on that responsibility and use his/her stamps, envelopes, and time. Please note that our confirmation sheets do not include home addresses, just e-mail addresses and phone numbers. We stopped making phone calls several years ago.


5> If you need additional information about a trip, please call JUST ONE of the Trip Leaders. It becomes a confusing mess when several Travel Committee members are contacted by phone, and each one tries to answer the same question. Call one person, leave a message, and then call the other Leader IF you do not get a response in 24 to 48 hours.

6> "No Shows" continue to be a problem. You will not get a refund of your \$ if you do not show up as expected. More importantly, you have a "reserved space" on the trip, and if you do not show up, you have kept another HPREC member from being able to attend the event. If you cannot make the trip, call the Trip Leader so he/she can move someone up from the Wait List.

7> The "Wait List" is totally determined by postmark date. There is nothing to be gained by calling a Trip Leader to check where and when you will be moved off the Wait List on to the actual trip. As soon as we know there is an opening, the next person on the list is called and offered the opportunity to join the event.

8> If there are special needs the Trip Leader needs to know about and understand, please contact him/her at least 10 days before an event for which you have been confirmed. We try to accommodate all requests.

Thank you for helping your Travel Committee provide you with fun, exciting, and safe trips and events. We all cherish our HP and Agilent days...so keep the spirit alive and well!

## Volunteers at the Santa Clara County Science Fair

From the early years of the Regional Science Fair for students in Santa Clara County, HPREC members have helped make it one of the most successful events of its kind in the US. The fair is professionally run, and student entrants are treated in the same manner as professional scientists exhibiting research projects.

This year 1,025 students presented 868 projects. Many students return with different research projects each year, and one student we encountered was competing for her seventh year! The complexity of many students' research was well beyond their school courses. Their enthusiasm for science is contagious.

This year's Synopsis Science Fair would not be a success without all of our volunteers. The eighteen HPREC members and friends who volunteered for this year's 52nd annual event made up about 30% of the actual volunteer staff. HPRECers found there was always a lot to do during both the registration and judging days: setting up exhibit spacing, managing the parking lots, registering students, helping set up exhibits, selling tee shirts, etc.

The paybacks for volunteering are twofold. You gain a sense of accomplishment and enormous pride as a number of past winners of the Santa Clara County Fair have gone on to win prizes at the state and international levels. Being involved is also fun. After seeing several male students with heads of "flaming red dyed hair," we had to ask, "What's with the hair?" It seems the students were members of a robotics club, their red hair a badge of membership. However, one mother smiled saying that the female club members had elected to dye only the tips of their hair! It will all grow out over time.




