New Board member Cam Nelson has been busy meeting with HPARV (HP/Agilent Retiree Volunteers) group, and there will be more news coming as this program becomes even more active. We are also going to start a series of informal lunch gatherings at local restaurants periodically, so watch for e-mails or Web site announcements. China's Terracotta Warriors and SF Chinatown

On Wednesday, April 24, a full bus of HPREC adventure seekers headed to San Francisco and the Asian Art Museum early in the morning. Fran Low had arranged for us to get early entrance into the Museum to visit the Terracotta Warriors exhibit, and what an exhibit it was! As we entered the building, a huge terracotta chariot with four terracotta horses greeted visitors in the main hall, a truly spectacular sight. There were three rooms filled with artifacts and warriors, truly amazing.

The first emperor of China had made a complete army of terracotta warriors, horses, chariots and artifacts. The original warriors were each individually made and painted, as were the horses,



etc. There were over 10,000 warriors, which were discovered in China in 1974. Slowly the pieces of this magnificent army were put together and restored in a massive area, now covered with a roof and placed for visitors to view. Several of our HPREC members had gone to China in 2000 and saw the warriors, but



explained that they were very far away from them and were looking "down" on the figures. To be as close to these warriors today was truly breathtaking.

Having been in the ground for so many hundreds of years, and broken into pieces by another emperor's army, these terracotta pieces had lost their original paint and only the clay color remains. The suits of armor were amazing, as hundreds of clay tiles (about 1 inch x ½ inch) were pieced together with copper "clips." Each warrior had some sort of protection, all hand made. They are still excavating the site in China and finding more pieces of antiquity. Recently, copper birds were found, including a life-sized crane, swans, and ducks. The display at the museum was beautiful.

After spending almost two hours at the museum, we boarded the bus and headed off to Chinatown and had a yummy lunch at the Far East Café. Once again, Fran had selected the menu of tiny tasty treats for all of us, which provided an excellent variety of Chinese cuisine.

After lunch, we had time to shop and walk around Chinatown. Fran was able to point out where she was born and lived in SF as a child, which was an enjoyable bit of information for us. (Now we know why our trips to Chinatown are so much fun and interesting!!) The



Fortune Cookie Factory was a big hit.

Some people visited the Saint Mary's Cathedral, which was just across the street from the restaurant. This was not listed on our trip itinerary, but it was too close to ignore. This Cathedral was built in 1857 and actually survived the 1906 earthquake.

Unfortunately, it did not totally survive the fire! There was a wonderful exhibit of the building and restoration of the Cathedral inside, and those who visited it were very impressed with the entire Cathedral. Next trip to Chinatown we will include a docent led visit to this beautiful church. We boarded our bus and headed back to Cupertino, and we were able to enjoy some sesame and almond cookies on the ride. We all felt this was one of our better trips, thanks to the beautiful weather and spectacular warriors.

Russian Ridge Rapture Repeated

Local Wildflower Hike Popular with HPREC Hikers

Russian Ridge Open Space Preserve protects 1800 acres of some of the most scenic terrain of the peninsula skyline. The Bay Area Ridge Trail runs through it, and several branch trails offer diverse microclimates for flora and fauna. The HPREC hiking group walked about five miles on Russian Ridge on Tuesday, May 14, including pieces of the Ridge, Hawk, Ancient Oaks and Alpine Pullout Trails. Lunch was atop one of the hills, near a windmill.

Flora seen included: fillaree, butter cup, blue-eyed grass, mule ear, lupine (bush and mini), tomcat clover, purple vetch, tidy tips, yellow tarweed, owl's clover, man root, red maid, blackberry, yarrow, miner's lettuce, trillium, pink star flower, thimble berry, common monkey flower, lotus, Chinese houses, hedge nettle, salsify, checker bloom, poppies, morning glory, Solomon's seal, cow parsnip, blue dick, fairy lantern, columbine, but no bleeding heart.

We also heard meadowlarks and quail.

If you like to get outside in beautiful spring weather, while the ridges are fresh, hit Russian Ridge in May. It is at the junction of Page Mill Road and Highway 35 (Skyline).

We saw these wild flowers: mallow, yellow bush lupine, farewell to spring (Clarkia), flax, wild radish, lotus, Ithuriel's spear, monkey flower, blue-eyed grass, paintbrush (red, yellow and seaside), beach primrose, morning glory, golden yarrow, seaside daisy, yarrow, ice plant, pearly everlasting, field mustard and tarweed.

We hiked south from the pier to Rockaway Point and then returned to the pier. We used Rockaway Beach for our lunch stop. The distance is estimated to be 5.5 miles. We parked near the corner of Montecito Avenue and Beach Blvd. in Pacifica. There are public restrooms on the pier. We walked south across the seawall in front of the Sharp Park Golf Course. We used the switchback trails to reach the Mori Point viewpoint which had fine views up and down the coast. We then took the widest trail which stayed nearly level and then crossed a saddleback to descend along the back side of the peak at Mori Point. We merged onto a bicycle trail to reach Rockaway Beach.

After lunch, we passed Nick's Restaurant and then used Nick Gust Way to reach the paved switchback path up to the top of Rockaway Point next to Highway 1 which gave us a nice view of Linda Mar Beach. Our return trip used a shortcut through a small garden on the left side of Dondee Way to reach the bicycle path. Later we descended from Mori Point using the Bootlegger's Steps.

From Half Moon Bay, take Highway 1 north through the Tom Lantos Tunnels at Devil's Slide to Pacifica. Take

exit 505B for Clarendon Road/Oceana Blvd. Turn left onto Clarendon Road. Take the first right onto Francisco Blvd. Turn left at the fourth street to Montecito Avenue to Beach Blvd.

Eastside College Prep By Chuck Sieloff

Eastside Prep is looking for tutors in the 7th and 8th grade reading program this coming school year. Tutors meet with small groups of 6 or 7 students (the same students over the course of a year) from 8:05 - 9:40 weekday mornings, to help students perfect their reading skills, lead discussions and assist students in completing written and performance projects associated with five preselected books.

For each book, the tutor receives a full curriculum of lesson plans which provide all the information necessary for conducting the sessions. Tutors choose how many mornings a week they will volunteer (one or two is common). Responsibilities include:

Leading and/or taking turns with the students in • reading aloud

- Clarifying content, themes, and history in the books (support material is provided)
- Introducing new vocabulary (preselected in the lesson plans)
- Posing comprehension questions from lesson plans
- Making sure the students understand and follow all project instructions
- Reviewing and helping students revise their writing
- Communicating about group process with fellow group tutors
- Assisting in performance projects (helping students rehearse, etc.)

The curriculum follows a two-year cycle: American Studies the first year and World Cultures the second. The selected books are young adult novels (from a variety of genres) set in the places and historical periods under study.

Prospective tutors who are interested in possibly joining next fall can meet with Tina Ehsanipour, the director of the program, to learn more about the program and even sit in on a group this fall if desired.

Throughout the year, short meetings (from 4:30-5:30 p.m.) are held at the start of each new book to discuss content and teaching strategies. These are not mandatory, but tutors are strongly encouraged to attend.

No teaching background is required to volunteer. The program is well-managed, and there is support every step of the way for everyone, especially new tutors. Also, there is a Google doc for absences to make it as easy as possible for tutors to find substitutes when they are unable to attend their session(s).

positive and negative numbers, a number value game, and sorting lots of holiday decorations.



Have a fun summer, and your Travel Committee looks forward to providing you some fun and educational experiences in the coming months and years!





Difficulty: Easy. About 5-6 miles round trip, on the flattest terrain this group has ever hiked. (Last time was August, 2006.)

Bring: Water, lunch and \$3.00 to reimburse carpool drivers. Also plan to contribute about \$8 per car for parking. The new credit card meters charge \$2.00 per hour in advance. Display the ticket on the dash. Violation fines run \$40.00. (Ask me how I know.)

Meet at: The usual carpool location at the Arastradero Preserve parking area at 10:00 a.m. Take I-280 and turn



southwest on Page Mill Road. Proceed .5 mile to Arastradero Road. Then go 1.2 miles to the Enid Pearson Arastradero Preserve parking area (with restrooms) on the right. To go directly to the trailhead, take Highway 1 south from Half Moon Bay and turn right on Poplar Street, which dead-ends at the trailhead and beach access parking area.

Time: 10:00 a.m.

Hike Leader: Jim Holl 1-408-446-2963, cell 1-408-528-5846

Hike Location: Fall Creek (a unit of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park) in Felton. Note that this hike is well suited to hot September weather. The trails are completely shaded and the locals claim that the creek runs all of the time. Fall Creek features the former site of lime kilns and a barrel mill and is second-growth mixed evergreen forest. Most of the hike will be along creeks with minimal elevation gain.

Difficulty: Moderate. About 5.2 miles with an elevation gain of 500 feet.

Bring: Water, lunch and \$3.00 to reimburse carpool drivers. Light walking sticks will be useful if you have them.

Meet at: A new carpool location—the parking lot located at the northeast corner of Highway 9 and Santa Cruz Avenue (across from Hobee's Restaurant) in Los Gatos. The sign at the lot says "Free Unlimited Parking - Northside Lot". To get there take Highway 17 South toward Los Gatos. Exit at Highway 9 - Los Gatos/Saratoga and continue West on Highway 9 (approximately 1/3 mile) to the parking lot on your right just before Santa Cruz Avenue. The carpools will depart at 10:00 am.

From the carpool site, take Highway 17 South from Los Gatos to Mt. Hermon Road (exit 3) west for 3.5 miles to Graham Hill Road, right for 0.2 miles to the next stop light (Highway 9). Turn left on Highway 9 and go through downtown Felton for 0.7 miles to the entrance of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park. Turn left into the park and proceed to the Park Entrance Station. The entrance fee is \$10 per vehicle (bring your Annual Pass if you have one). We will have about twenty minutes to visit the restrooms, gift shop and Roaring Camp railroad. Next we will move the cars to the trailhead on Felton Empire Road.

From Highway 101, the Bayshore Freeway, take Embarcadero Road northeast (toward the airport) until it ends; go left at the "T" intersection and past the Duck Pond. You've arrived when you see a sign on the left saying "City of Palo Alto Lucy Evans Nature Center"; park in the lot across from it.
