The feedback suggests that this formula of local parks, catered barbecue menu and plenty of beverages plus traditional bingo games is a winner. Thanks also to **Chris Gandel**, **Paula Hoelker-williams** and **Elizabeth Shen** for their work managing the bingo games. Our Holiday Luncheon co-chairs (**Jo-Ann Butler** and **Pat Fausett**) are already working on the details for the luncheon at David's Banquet Hall in Santa Clara on December 8. Please save the date and plan to join us.

By now, all of our Agilent retirees have also received their letters from Agilent indicating whether they'll be remaining Agilent retirees or switching over to become retirees of Keysight Technologies following the split in November. The Board has started work on adjusting our Bylaws to ensure that retirees of Keysight will have the same options and status as retirees from HP or Agilent. **John Weidert**, our Club's liaison to Agilent, has started meeting with **Jeff Weber** in Santa Rosa. Jeff is the new Community Relations Manager with Keysight, and we are looking forward to the same supportive relationship with the new company we've enjoyed with HP and Agilent. From past experience, I'd encourage all Agilent stockholding members to keep copies of their documents when the new Keysight shares are distributed, to make future tax calculations a little easier. For shares held electronically, it is possible to enter a "cost basis" into most brokerage firm systems manually, and that can save a lot of digging and scrambling later.

Finally, a few more comments about our newsletter: For those still receiving paper copies, you've noticed the change to a single column format (eases workload) and of the new "white envelope" delivery method (significant savings over the "fold & tape" method of mailing). We have incorporated a number of changes in formatting to highlight schedules and content shown to be of highest interest to the readers. We are still looking for an Editor to lead the bi-monthly process of assembling articles and event flyers into a single MSWord document, delivering a PDF version to the FedEx Office for distribution to the membership and sending it to the webmaster for uploading to our website. **Paula Hoelker-williams**, **Carol Nakamoto**, **Lynn Cortes** and **Marialis Seehorn** have agreed to continue in Coordinator and Associate Editor roles, and have done a great job of pulling the final versions together while we continue seeking a permanent solution. Anyone with MSWord experience willing to contribute a few days of effort every other month is most welcome to step forward and take on this critical task for the Club.

RENEWING YOUR CLUB MEMBERSHIP (for FY15)

In May's issue, we outlined some "upcoming" new website enhancements. So, let's get ready to renew our Club memberships in a *NEW* way! Here's how it will work:

PROCESS #1 - IF we already have or will have your current email address in our secured online system (see below on how to add/change) by <u>August 15</u>:

- In late August, you will receive an email from us, outlining how to renew your membership and pay for your FY2015 dues <u>online</u>. The payment option will be through Paypal. You do NOT need to have a Paypal account to participate. If you have a Paypal account, you can pay by either credit card or an e-check from your checking account. If you do not have a Paypal account, payment is by credit card only.
- 2. You will receive a confirmation from Paypal that your payment was processed. It will serve as your acknowledgement that your Club membership has been paid for FY15.
- 3. We will no longer accept multi-year membership payments, so you will be asked to pay the annual dues rate of \$15.
- 4. Instructions will be <u>online</u> for how to update your mailing address, phone number, spouse information (if applicable), and whether you wish to make any changes to what appears in the annual Club Directory mailed to homes every February. *This new feature is easy, so give it a try.*
- 5. In mid-September, you will receive an annual Membership Renewal/Dues Invoice form (either "payment due" or "dues paid for FY15") and a paper Ballot to vote for new Board members.
 - If you have paid online, please disregard the Dues Invoice if it says "payment due."
 - If you made changes to your personal information <u>online</u>, please return the completed Ballot only by the requested due date.
 - If you did <u>not</u> update your personal information <u>online</u>, you need to return the renewal form as well as the Ballot by the due date.

Please excuse any duplication this year as we introduce this new capability. *Online balloting will be an option next year*.

PROCESS #2 - IF you are <u>not</u> in our email system by August 15:

- 1. In mid-September, you will receive at your home an annual Membership Renewal/Dues Invoice form (either "payment due" or "dues paid for FY15") and a paper Ballot to vote for new Board members. The Membership Renewal form will include a reference to the HPREC website, where you could choose to pay online, as well as make any changes to your personal information and provide us your email address.
 - If you choose to pay and update your personal information <u>online</u>, please return the completed ballot only.
 Your acknowledgement from Paypal will serve as confirmation of your renewal.
 - If you do not update your personal information <u>online</u>, you need to return the renewal form as well as the Ballot by the due date indicated.
 - If you choose to follow the manual process, we ask that you return the completed membership renewal form and Ballot, along with your check by the due date indicated on the form. Your confirmation of renewing your Club membership will be in the usual form of your cancelled check.

- 2. Again, we will no longer accept payment for more than one year's membership renewal.
- 3. If you had previously prepaid for FY15, your Membership Renewal/Dues Invoice form will acknowledge that, so you will return your membership renewal form (to capture updated information) and completed Ballot for new Board members.
- 4. If you <u>do</u> have an email address but have chosen not to share it with us so far, we strongly encourage you to add it to aid us in our efforts to simplify processes and reduce costs. You can always choose a Member Option on the webpage noted above to limit the emails from us.

PROCESS #3 - IF you do not have an email address:

1. We will mail the Membership Renewal/Dues Invoice form and Ballot to your home annually.

IF you wish to add or update your email address before August 15 and fully benefit from the new process, here's how:

- Go to our Club's website <u>www.hpretirees.org/hprec</u>.
- Scroll to "Retiree email list" and click on either "Add your email address" or "Change your email address". Refer to the Passwords information for username and password. You will also be able to select your Member Options at that time (what types of communication you wish to receive via email).

IF you wish to have an HPREC volunteer on the Membership team add your email address to our system:

- When you receive the Membership Renewal form in the mail in September, add your email address to the form, along with your chosen Member Options. It will be entered into the Membership database, along with any other personal information that needs updating.
- You will then be able to receive periodic emails from an HPREC Board member (or me informing you when the newsletters are posted online).
- We will be sharing the new, easier process on how you will keep your email updated in the future.

We hope you find these more automated, modern features to be appealing to you and to new members who you recruit to join the Club. *You might want to keep this information handy for September/October*. If you are having trouble renewing, just ask **John Weidert** (jweidert2@gmail.com) for help.

BASICS – As a reminder, you can find the BASICS (for new members/refresher) in three places:

- Online at the Club website, click on "Website Introduction" link
- In the front pages of your annual Club <u>Directory</u> (mailed to your homes every February)
- In your Membership Welcome Packet when you first joined the Club

Passwords: They are not shown in the online newsletter for security reasons. They are communicated in the:

- Club Directory
- Paper version of the newsletter
- Bi-monthly email from me notifying you that the newsletter has been posted online (see Online Newsletter on Page 7)

HPREC'er Gene Arnold recounts his early childhood growing up in Palo Alto

Names like JC Penney, Woolworth's, Werry Electric, Roos Brothers, Smith's Sports Shop, just to name a few. He remembered the cash delivery systems with the pneumatic tubes used to send cash to the cashier.

At the conclusion of the walk, Gene and a few of us took in a bite at the famous Peninsula Creamery. Gene ordered a half chicken-salad sandwich and a vanilla shake, just like he used to order when he was growing up in
