We expect to also update some of the other bylaws' terms to reflect the current operating model.

Several Board members took a preview tour of Levi's Stadium. Seeing the incredible design and complexity of this \$1.3 billion project that just opened in Santa Clara is amazing. The Travel Committee is offering a tour in November. There are also opportunities to join groups for hiking, bowling and several "volunteer days" coming up. The 20th annual Bill & Dave Charity Golf Classic is September 29.

As my term as President winds down, I feel good about our Club, and wanted to share that several times in the past six months, we have been contacted by reporters for publications like the New York Times and Bloomberg as well as other retiree clubs interested in learning more about why HP (Agilent and now Keysight) retirees are so supportive of a retiree club focused on social connections, volunteerism and recreation. While these clubs were more common decades ago, there are few left. Lockheed's large club in the Bay area has dissolved, and GE has just recently dropped all company support for its regional clubs. I am convinced the relationships formed during the years at HP while Bill and Dave were still active are the foundation of our Club. The company was a place where people really aspired to work hard, and enjoy the culture and communal ability to make "Contributions" to society and to the markets we served. We valued our co-workers and put in the extra effort to avoid letting them as well as Bill and Dave down. It is worth noting that smaller workgroups like DMK, Building 27/Intercon, Computer Support, OED and DSD Sales/Marketing continue their own social networks and reunion activities. The technology industry has changed over the past two decades, and employees whose careers began at HP or Agilent after the mid-1990s don't have the same frame of reference as those of us fortunate to have worked in the 60s, 70s, 80s and early 90s at HP. The dot com/internet bust of 2000 and the recent great recession were painful for the technology sectors with many of the retirees leaving HP or Agilent after 2000 having elected to pursue new work opportunities. I have enjoyed the occasions to see old friends and meet new ones in my role with the Club. I hope all of our members will take advantage of our special opportunity to keep connected with a wonderful group of people by getting actively involved in Club activities.

2015 Nominees for Board of Directors By Homer Wong

For this year's election, we have two candidates who have been nominated for our Board of Directors by the Nominations Committee.

Oscar Lombardi – HP 28 Years

After completing his Chartered Public Accounting studies at the University of Buenos Aires, Argentina, Oscar worked for a large corporation and then in the accounting profession in Argentina, England and Italy. In January 1979, Oscar joined Hewlett-Packard in England. He had a variety of international assignments there, The Netherlands and the United States (Bay Area). In 1984, Oscar joined HP's Customer Support organization where he remained until retirement in 2007, completing 28 plus years of service. Some notable assignments were Business Manager for the WW Response Centers, Support Manager for the internal WW Customer Support IT Organization, and a variety of global initiatives chartered to improve processes, customer satisfaction and the cost of delivery for the Customer Support work force.

Since retirement, Oscar spends his time with hobbies such as woodworking, reading, walking, and helping within his parish and the Diocese of San Jose teaching religious subjects. Oscar and his wife Brigid volunteer at a soup kitchen on a weekly basis.

Henry Sanchez - HP 46 Years

Henry began his career with a company called PAECO (Palo Alto Engineering Company) in 1954, which became part of HP in 1956. PAECO provided magnetic components to HP for its manufacturing. In 1962, Henry joined the Customer Service Center, and in 1969 he joined the Field Service organization. Henry held a number of management positions in the field service organization and retired in 2000 from HP. His last role was Project Manager for the Longs Drugs major account, overseeing the installation of their new computer systems at over 100 sites.

Henry is a long time resident of Silicon Valley. Since retirement, he and his wife Shirley enjoy time with their grandkids and cruising with other retirees. Henry and Shirley are regular attendees of the HPREC events.

HP-related Retiree Websites

... for HP, Agilent and Keysight retirees

LATEST – Updates, new info from last newsletter.

www.hpretirees.org/hprec (Our Club's website, maintained by HPREC volunteers)

In recent newsletter issues, we outlined some "upcoming" new website enhancements. Here's how to renew your membership as well as update your contact information and email/newsletter preferences **online**.

<u>RENEWING YOUR CLUB MEMBERSHIP</u> (for FY15)

PROCESS #1 - IF we already have your current email address in our secured online system:

- 1. <u>At the end of August</u>, you should have received an email from us, outlining how to renew your membership and pay for your FY2015 dues <u>online</u>. This new payment option is through PayPal. You do NOT need to have a PayPal account to participate. If you have a PayPal account, you can pay by either credit card or an e-check from your checking account. If you do not have a PayPal account, payment is by credit or debit card only.
- 2. You will receive a confirmation from PayPal that your payment was processed. It will serve as your acknowledgement that your Club membership has been paid for FY15.
- 3. We will no longer accept multi-year membership payments, so you will be asked to pay the annual dues rate of \$15.
- 4. Look for the new RENEW MEMBERSHIP link on the Club's home page, where you will find a form to update your mailing address, phone number, spouse information (if applicable), and whether you wish to make any changes to what appears in the annual Club Directory mailed to homes every February. You will <u>also</u> be able to provide us with your email address and let us know if you want to stop receiving the Club's newsletter (HPREC NEWS) at your home. *This new feature is easy, so give it a try*.
- 5. The information you provide on the Renewal Application will be entered into our secure Membership database by our Membership admin team. We ask that you enter all data so we may verify that our information is current.
- 6. <u>In mid-September</u>, as usual, you will receive at your home address an annual Membership Renewal/ Dues Invoice form (either "payment due" or "dues paid for FY15") and a paper ballot to vote for new Board members.
 - If you've paid online, please disregard the Dues Invoice if it says "payment due".
 - If you made changes to your personal information <u>online</u>, please return the completed ballot only by the requested due date.
 - If you did <u>not</u> update your personal information <u>online</u>, you need to return the renewal form, payment, as well as the ballot by the due date.

Please excuse any duplication this year as we introduce this new capability. Online balloting may also be an option next year and will only be available to members who have provided their email address. NOTE: If you did <u>not</u> receive the late-August email and thought we had your current email address, please follow the renewal steps in Process #2.

PROCESS #2 - IF you were not in our email system (or we have an outdated email address):

- 1. **In mid-September**, you will receive at your home an annual Membership Renewal/Dues Invoice form (either "payment due" or "dues paid for FY15") and a paper ballot to vote for new Board members. The membership renewal form will include a reference to the HPREC website, where you can now choose to pay online, as well as make any changes to your personal information and provide us your email address on the Renewal form. *Neat!*
 - If you choose to pay and update your personal information <u>online</u>, please return the completed ballot only. Your acknowledgement from PayPal will serve as confirmation of your renewal.

- If you do not update your personal information <u>online and choose to follow the manual process</u>, you need to return the renewal form, payment, as well as the ballot by the due date indicated.
- Your confirmation of renewing your Club membership will be in the usual form of your cancelled check.
- 2. Again, we will no longer accept payment for more than one year's membership renewal. We will, of course, grandfather any payments already made prior to this policy change.
- 3. If you had previously prepaid for FY15, your Membership Renewal/Dues Invoice form will acknowledge that, so you will return your membership renewal form (to capture updated information) and completed ballot for new Board members.
- 4. If you <u>do</u> have an email address but have chosen not to share it with us so far, we strongly encourage you to add it to aid us in our efforts to simplify processes and reduce costs. You can always choose a Member Option on the website noted above to limit the emails from us.

PROCESS #3 - IF you do not have an email address:

1. We will continue to mail the Membership Renewal/Dues Invoice form and ballot to your home annually.

UPDATING YOUR CONTACT INFO - OR - MAILING PREFERENCES – *new*!

At any time, if you wish to add or update your email address, or update other member info, here's how:

- 1. Go to our Club's website <u>www.hpretirees.org/hprec</u>
- 2. Click on "Member Info Updates" and complete the appropriate fields on the Update form. You will also be able to select your Email/Newsletter Notification Preferences (Member Options) at that time (what types of communication you wish to receive via email). Refer to the Passwords information (below) for username and password. Once you complete the updated information form, an email will be sent to our Membership Team for database updating, and you will receive a confirming email of the changes you made.

Note: Some members MAY <u>temporarily</u> need to type in the user name and password THREE times before gaining access to the new **Member Info Updates** form (like me, I use Internet Explorer). Hopefully, this glitch will be fixed by the time you read this.

We hope you find these more automated, modern features to be appealing to you and to new members whom you recruit to join the Club. *You might want to keep this information handy for September/October*. If you are having trouble renewing, just ask John Weidert for help. Appreciate your patience and participation!

BASICS – As a reminder, you can find the BASICS (for new members/refresher) in three places:

- Online at the Club <u>website</u>, click on "Website Introduction" link
- In the front pages of your annual Club <u>Directory</u> (mailed to your homes every February)
- In your Membership Welcome Packet if you recently joined the Club

Passwords: They are not shown in the online newsletter for security reasons. They are communicated in the:

- Club Directory (annual)
- Paper version of the newsletter
- Bi-monthly email from me notifying you that the newsletter has been posted online (see * on next page, **second** button)

Online Newsletter, Paper Newsletter or Both? It's Your Choice!

* Want to **stop** having the paper newsletter mailed to your home and read the **color** version online? Go to <u>www.hpretirees.org/hprec</u>, click on "Member Info Updates", select Email/Newsletter Notification Preferences, fill in your email address, and then select your preferred option(s) for what types of communication you want to receive from the Club. Selecting the:

- **first** option gives you a choice to stop the paper mailing of the newsletter (you can instead read it online) or to continue/resume the mailing to your home if you change your mind later.
- **second** button will allow me to send an email to you (six times per year) notifying you when the newsletter has been posted online (a few days earlier than when it would otherwise arrive at your home address).
- **third** button will allow a Board member (or designate) to send a periodic email to you that we hope you will find informative (maybe 3-4/yr). You may select all three if you wish.

* Another way to stop or resume the paper mailing of the newsletter is to click on the Newsletters link on the Club's home page, and fill out the form.

HP Memory Project Update: A Tribute to Marc Mislanghe Submitted by John Minck

In all of our common years of our careers at Hewlett-Packard, during the Golden Years of High-Tech in the second half of the 20th century, Marc and I never met. Nor did we know of each other. I wish I had met him sooner, because he was such a wonderful person to know.

It was only in the 21st century, as he was creating his Virtual Measurements HP Museum on the Internet, which he called <u>www.HPMemory.org</u>, that we met. He came to use my written Narrative History of HP for background. In 2007, he came to Palo Alto, to present some HP historical work with Ken Kuhn and Glenn Robb. Marc and Ken, from Alabama, who also had an HP-oriented website, both had basements full of vintage HP instruments. Ken and Marc met, after bidding against each other on eBay, for old HP products, quickly deciding to work together. Ken had also helped with some editing of some of Marc's English, which he always apologized for.

That writing soon became our collaboration and passion for the last 4 to 5 years, as Marc created a special archive on his website for the HP Memoirs of retired employees, who wished to share their life and HP careers with the world. These memoirs ranged from Jim Hall, the designer of the first LaserJet printer, which changed the world, to Dave Cochran, the algorithm genius behind the HP-35 electronic slide rule, to Betty Haines, the company telephone operator, who told charming personal stories of her interactions with Dave and Bill.

At the time of his passing, Marc had published exactly 20 of these personal stories of the exceptional work culture of HP, right from the people who lived there. Cort Van Rensselaer's memoir even went back in time, to 1943, when he worked part time in the Polly & Jake building, for the fledgling company in WWII. Marc was SO proud of this accomplishment, as well he deserved. He reported that EVERY DAY, up to 1300 people visited his website, for more than a few minutes. They downloaded the memoirs by the hundreds. People really did want to read about those golden years and the remarkable work culture of HP.

I can't believe Marc is gone. His plans and visions were underway. But we have lost that precious enthusiasm and spark which he brought to each of us. I miss him already. John Minck (JLMinck1222@att.net)

Palo Alto's Foothills Park By John McCabe (leader)

We had a typical sunny July day for our hike at Palo Alto's Foothills Park. It is only a few miles up Page Mill Road from HP's headquarters, and yet it seems far from Silicon Valley. Six HPREC hikers went up and down about 6 miles of woodland trails through dense woodlands, wooded canyons, open chaparral, and along Boronda Lake. The trails included all or parts of Wildhorse Valley, Fern Loop, Costanoan Trail, Los Trancos Trail, Toyon Trail, and Chamise Trail. Along the way, we saw great views of the valley. We saw lots of lizards; various birds, a deer, and a beautiful California king

A dozen Lite Hikers enjoyed a picture perfect July day on the San Mateo coast. Dale Lachtman acted as our unofficial tour guide and described the beautiful sights, and the history and geography of the area. At some parts of the hike, the wind was howling; the rest were quite calm. The dangerous and often closed portion of Hwy 1 (Devil's Slide) was replaced in 2013 by the Tom Lantos Tunnels, greatly increasing access to points south of San Francisco. The trail is a section of the California Coastal Trail. If you go, keep in mind that parking is limited. From Palo Alto, we carpooled, taking Hwy 280 to Hwy 92 West, Hwy 1 north past Montara, arriving at about 11 am. Along the 1.3 mile paved pathway there are picnic benches, restrooms, and benches.

Fitzgerald Marine Preserve to Pillar Point and Back By John McCabe (leader)

We had an absolutely gorgeous August day for our hike from Fitzgerald Marine Preserve to the beach at Pillar Point, and back. The skies were clear (you could easily see the Farallon Islands). The temperatures were perfect. The 10 HPREC members and guests had a lovely time while getting their exercise. We saw harbor seals frolicking in the water, pelicans and cormorants flying overhead, feeding frenzies in the ocean, and naked ladies (flowers, that is) on the bluffs. Other highlights included a location of the filming of the *Memoirs of a Geisha* movie, the Moss Beach Distillery restaurant, and site of the Mavericks competition. The Pacific was so peaceful it was hard to imagine such large waves breaking there.

If you would like to do this hike yourself, take Highway 92 to the coast, turn right on Highway 1, drive 6.2 miles and turn left on California Avenue. Follow California Avenue to the parking area at Fitzgerald Marine Preserve. Hike south from the Preserve along the top of the bluffs. When you get to Pillar Point, walk around the Pillar Point Air Force Station with

its many radar towers that are used track objects off the coast of central California as well as aircraft, missiles, space boosters, and orbiting bodies in the sky. Enjoy a rest (or, like we did, lunch) on the breakwater behind the Air Force Station. Coming back, go north keeping the bluffs on your left and the Half Moon Bay Airport on your right, but hike farther from the ocean and closer to the airport.

Mountain View's Shoreline Park Lite Hike By John McCabe (leader)

Shoreline Park is always a nice place for a stroll. It is even nicer when you can do it on a lovely weekday in August. It is quieter and less crowded than on a weekend day, and the wildlife is that much less afraid of people. We saw lots of birds: the snowy egret and the willet pictured below, American avocets, blacked-necked stilts, western grebes, great egrets, double-crested cormorants, gulls and of course, Canada geese. If you would like to do this hike yourself, from Highway 101, take the Shoreline Blvd. exit and continue east on N. Shoreline Blvd, through the gatehouse, past the golf course and

He was involved with instruments in his youth, building his own oscilloscope in the post-war period, using available surplus WWII electronics. It required a new CRT display tube, which needed to be bought new, with funds that took him a while to accumulate. He worked for the US electronic kit-maker, Heathkit, for a time, selling his time to build and test those kits for customers. But his joy was being hired by Hewlett-Packard Company as a Support engineer and Sales engineer for a productive career.

In his retirement, Marc became enamored with the idea of a measurements museum. He was accumulating a collection of vintage HP instruments and computers, in his home basement near Biarritz, France. As a preamble to a real museum, he decided to create a virtual one, using an Internet website called HPMemory.org. As his website expanded with instrument-related content, inventories, HP instrument introductions, described by decade, massive archives of HP publications, applications and measurement processes, he happened upon several HP author memoirs. This led to his website section which began a long look at the human side of Hewlett-Packard, the HP Way, and the work culture of the pre-eminent high tech company of the twenty century. By the time of his shockingly unexpected death, he had compiled 20 HP memoirs, which revealed the memories of a variety of authors, from division managers to the telephone operator who knew Hewlett and Packard personally. You will see his vision for his future measurements museum, sketches, promotional pamphlet, ideas for structuring some of the key instrument and computer breakthroughs of those decades. His personality is laid out in all of those pages, little animations, huge numbers of pictures. In most cases, Marc would rehabilitate an old vintage instrument, clean it up, and THEN take the picture to use in the web content. He had an almost innate sense of where to look in HP publication archives to find a picture of some company event or personality profile. Alas, where will we find another history visionary like Marc?
