HPREC President's Message By Bernard Bruand

We also got many volunteers to help during the day. Thanks to all the volunteers and participants.

The only point we can regret is the reduced number of participants versus last year. We only got 112 participants this year, while we got around 160 last year. We are not sure why, but many people thought it was due to a conflict with many graduation ceremonies. We will plan a survey, most likely of all members, to find out what we can do better, how we choose the best date and other ideas for improvement. Please look on the website from time to time if you are not on our email distribution list, to see how to access the survey. This is a new feature that we hope to implement in the next several months.

Newsletter: We still had issues with the distribution of the May printed newsletters. The newsletters are now printed in Chicago. We moved the schedule for creating the newsletter forward by a week to meet paper copy delivery time expectation. The newsletters were in the hands of the US Post Office on May 11; however some people did not receive their copy until after May 25, which was the date when all copies should have been distributed (7-10 business days is the service promised by the postal service).

We are still working on improving the delivery time; I hope July will run smoothly. Al's most notable work was with the Delcon Division, building a really fast-growing division, and then moving the whole thing to Colorado Springs. While preparing the move, Al was diagnosed with testicular cancer. His management team did the managing while he recovered.

Since the last HPREC newsletter, we have also added a story about Bob Grimm's Memorial Service at Parkside Hall next to the Tech Museum in San Jose. There was a huge turnout, maybe 400 people, who saw exhibits and heard talks on Bob's remarkable civic volunteer activities, as well as his other work and hobbies. For example, he was a member of a railroad maintenance/motorcar car club, which once took a 20 car entourage 500 miles through the wilderness on a trip into Alaska by rail. (It took some effort to get the proper railroad permissions to make the trip on their tracks.) Bob also belonged to a group that restored old fire engines, and helped organize and support the Los Altos Festival of Lights parade each year.

Update By Carol Nakamoto, your HP Liaison

This Q&A is from HP's official private US retiree network: "HP Continuum" <u>http://hp.alumniprogram.com/news/520/</u> and was added to an HPAA newsletter when a member asked about the pending HP split scheduled for this Fall...

Q: What will happen to HP retiree medical coverage after the separation?

A: HP recognizes the importance of retiree medical benefits and intends to continue current retiree programs. No changes are anticipated as a result of the separation, but as is the case each year, changes to retiree medical designs or premiums are possible for 2016 based on increasing health care costs. On a longer-term basis, each company will make independent decisions regarding retiree benefits, considering market, business and other factors. As is the case today, future changes are always possible, and the separation will not change that fact even though no changes are currently planned.

HP's **Snapfish Center** was closed on the Palo Alto campus on May 31, 2015 due to HP's decision to divest the business. Online discounts for employees and retirees were also discontinued, effective June 30, 2015. Meet at the Usual Carpool Location* or if you drive there directly, drive to Half Moon Bay and then go south on Highway 1 for 4.8 miles past the Highway 84 junction at San Gregorio. Turn left onto Pescadero Road and go 2.6 miles through the town to Cloverdale Road and take a right. After 4.2 miles, turn left onto the entrance road for Butano State Park. The entry kiosk has a \$10 parking fee (\$9 for seniors) or you can use your State Parks Pass. Proceed to the picnic/parking area with restrooms to meet the group. Driving time from the carpool location is about 75 minutes.

Butano (Say <u>boo</u>-ta-no) was last hiked in 2013. Butano is the native Quiroste/Ohlone place name for "a gathering place for friendly visits." This park is one of the best kept secrets on the coast. The steep terrain along Little Butano Creek prevented the usual 19th century practice of clear cutting, so some old-growth redwood and fir are mixed in with the very rapid second growth. The result is a stunning walk along a year-round running stream, which is at or near its original profile.

The park is just inland enough to be sunny when the coast is still overcast. Still, it can be in the 50s, so bring a layer. When last hiked, stings had been reported, so bring whatever allergy stuff you need. The route is only 5 miles, but has lots of ups and downs, including some steep steps.

Bring water, sunscreen, lunch and \$4 for the car pool driver. Bathrooms are available at the beginning and end of the hike.

Length: About 5 miles. Duration: 3¹/₂ hours. Difficulty: Moderate No dogs. Not wheelchair accessible.

Meet at the adjacent Pescadero State Beach; this is located off Highway 1, about 15 miles south of Half Moon Bay. Meet in the first parking lot south of the bridge over the marsh (named Pescadero Creek on the highway sign).

Last hiked during 2008, Pescadero Marsh Natural Preserve is a popular spot for bird watchers and other naturalists. The Reserve is a refuge for blue herons, kites, deer, raccoons, foxes, and skunks.

The walk is level across part of the marsh.

Bring water and \$8 or a State Parks Pass for the parking fee.

Length: about a mile. Duration: A bit more than an hour. Difficulty: Easy. No dogs. Not wheelchair accessible.

No carpooling, proceed directly to Wildwood Park in Saratoga. From Highway 85, exit at De Anza Blvd or Saratoga Avenue and drive towards the Saratoga Village (Big Basin Way). Once you are on Big Basin Way, turn right on 4th Street to Wildwood Park where the street crosses Saratoga Creek.

Last hiked in 2010, this roughly 5-mile hike starts from the parking area at Saratoga's Wildwood Park. It then winds through the city of Saratoga to the trails at Villa Montalvo Arboretum. After lunch in the gardens at the Villa, we go back via a separate route to Wildwood City Park. The hike has some strenuous uphill sections, both on city streets and on the Villa Montalvo trails.

San Francisco Stairway Walk in Dolores Heights Area By Jim Holl (leader) with photo by John McCabe

Twenty hikers gathered on May 12 for a trip to sunny San Francisco. Our first stop was to see the Hidden Garden Steps (aka the 16th Avenue Steps between Kirkham Street and Lawton Street). These newly tiled steps were very beautiful. This first stop was added after the *HPREC News* announcement was written. To have the very latest hike

Our second stop was the Randall Museum parking lot. Please note that this facility will close this fall for a year of refurbishment. Our walk took us through the heart of the Castro district and up to Dolores Heights. We used *Stairway Walks of San Francisco* by Mary Burk with Adah Bakalinsky and chose portions of walk number 21 (Dolores Heights) and walk number 18 (Upper Market). The group picture was taken on the Liberty Steps. The Liberty Steps were also our lunch stop. We had a great view of the 500 block of Liberty Street which features tract Victorians that display wood embellishments: the decorative circles and pendants are known as "donuts" and "drips."

Another feature of this hike was the 218 step Vulcan Stairway, a miniature Shangri-La with eclectic cottages and beautiful gardens.

For those of you who want to take this hike on your own, our exact route took us down the ramps from the Randall Museum at 199 Museum Way to State Street,

left to Castro Street, right on Castro to and through the Muni station and back to Castro. Turn right on Castro to 19th Street, left on 19th to the Sanchez Stairway on the right. Go up the Sanchez Stairway and continue on Sanchez using more stairways to 21st Street, then right on 21st to Rayburn Street, right on Rayburn and left to the Liberty Stairs. Go down the stairs and along Liberty to Castro, right on Castro to and through the Muni station. Turn left on 17th Street to Ord Street, right on Ord to the Vulcan Stairway. Walk up the Vulcan Stairway to Levant Street, right on Levant to Roosevelt Way, right on Roosevelt to Museum Way and then right on Museum to the Randall Museum.

On a mild overcast day, ten HPREC "lite-hikers" walked the levies at the Don Edwards Wildlife Refuge in Alviso. According to the information pamphlet provided at the Environmental Education Center, over 280 birds make their home on the Refuge. We saw a number of Canada geese that now inhabit California wetlands, black-necked stilts, seagulls, egrets and many others. The highlight was a beautiful blue heron.





The levies are flat and provide several paths to walk; the triangle round-trip is about three miles. To get to the Refuge, exit Highway 237 at Zanker Road north-east and continue on Zanker to Grand Boulevard. Take a hard right turn on Grand to the Refuge; it is about 1.2 miles from the highway.

Our June regular hike was very well timed. The day before we hiked, it was very hot. The day after we hiked, we had something extremely rare, a rainy June day in the Bay Area. Twelve HPREC hikers took advantage of the opportunity to enjoy each other's company while exploring the Edgewood County Park and Natural Preserve. We hiked shady trails along steep canyons, sunny grassy hillsides, and hilltops covered with live oaks and buckeyes. We had great views of the San Francisco Bay.

The preserve is a very special place because of its native plants and wildflowers. It has unusual serpentine soils. They are low in calcium and nitrogen, but high in magnesium and heavy metals. This makes it inhospitable to most plants from other parts of the world, but perfect for plants that evolved here. Although the grasses had turned golden brown, wildflowers that the preserve is famous for were in bloom. They included sticky monkey flower, clarkia (farewell to spring), tidy-tips, Ithuriel's spear, goldfields, mariposa lily, Indian warrior and California poppy.

If you are interested in doing the hike yourself, the main entrance of Edgewood County Park and Nature Preserve is on Edgewood Road about a mile east of Highway 280. We hiked all or portions of the Sylvan

Trail, the Serpentine Trail, the Live Oak Trail, the Franciscan Trail, the Ridgeview Trail, and the Edgewood Trail.
