
# HPREC President's Message By Bernard Bruand

Summer is almost over, schools are starting a new year, and HPREC is finalizing the ballot for the election of the new Board members, as well as the renewal of annual membership dues.

**Holiday Luncheon:** The date has been set for December 7 at David's Banquet Center in Santa Clara (across from the 49ers Levi's Stadium off Tasman), the same location as the last two years. I hope many of you will join us, and you will find all the information needed in this newsletter. Please don't delay and sign up by November 13 for the preferred price of \$30 per person, rather than \$35 per person from November 14 through the November 30 deadline.

**Newsletter:** We have managed to speed up the delivery of newsletters; however, the mailing cost with USPS is higher than before, especially for larger issues. The number of people requesting a paper copy is slowly going down as more members elect to view/ download the online newsletter, helping to reduce the mailing costs for the newsletter. Remember the online newsletter contains all color photos, and shortcuts to allow you to jump directly to articles and flyers.

**Join-Renew-Update:** Click on <u>Member Info Updates</u>. See Carol's Corner for more information on this. You can also opt out of receiving a paper copy, which saves money for the Club.

**Membership Dues:** The Board will review our cost and expenses strategy in the September board meeting. Since the cost of the newsletter mailing is the highest cost item in the HPREC yearly budget, we may consider having a lower rate for annual dues for members who elect to view/download the online newsletter rather than receive a paper copy in the mail or a higher rate for those who pay their dues past the October 31 deadline. This is only an idea at this time. Our objective is to review the Club's costs going forward for the next 2-3 years and decide how to manage the annual membership dues. Just like in our personal lives, inflation and new laws (such as, increased minimum wage for restaurant workers) affects the expense line for all of our activities. We want to be proactive. Good news - there is no change for dues for 2015-2016 – it remains \$15 per member for the fiscal year.

# From the Historian – Club Membership Trends and Drivers By Gary Ruppel




As Club President Bernard Bruand and I were going through some of the paper historical records, it occurred to us that perhaps it would be interesting to show the membership history of the Club since its inception in April of 1979. The Club began with a group of six members which quickly grew to 60 in 1980.

When HP made the decision to stop providing the Club with the names of retiring employees (due to privacy laws), some of our membership numbers began to decline. The importance of retiree

referrals remains strong.

Some of the early data was a little sketchy; however, it was possible to determine the membership numbers from the Board of Director meeting minutes. Most of the data you will see on the graph below is from either the month of October or November. In a few cases, the number for the year was created by interpolation; if that sounds technical, it isn't. It is just a wee bit better than a wild guess.



# Almaden Quicksilver Mining Museum Tour Report by Carol Arnett

Did you know that liquid silver was more valuable than gold during the California gold rush?

On July 14, several HPREC members toured the Almaden Quicksilver Mining Museum. (Note: This included two



members who are current docents at the museum.) We learned about the value of liquid silver, including how the mercury was extracted from the cinnabar rock and turned into liquid to be shipped to the gold rush areas via the San Joaquin Delta. The Almaden Quicksilver Mining Museum was housed in the Casa Grande, built between 1850 and 1854 for the manager of the New Almaden mines.

The tour included the living room, office and dining rooms recently refurbished and furnished with period furniture. The last part of the Casa tour is the mining museum with samples of the various types of cinnabar rock and displays about the mining operation.



**David L. Price**, 62, passed away on July 16, 2015. "He was easy to wound, tough to kill." Leave it to David to write the perfect epitaph — his own — when he was diagnosed with terminal cancer more than a year ago. The doctor's diagnosis was supposed to be a 2- or 3-month death sentence. But David, a brilliant writer, was a master of sentences. He was also a bit of a boat rocker, rebel, curmudgeon and a creative genius. He wasn't about to let the medical community write the last chapter of his life.

Instead of starting to die, David spent the past year living life to the fullest. He published his first book, *Slugger*, a novel that combined his penchant for humor, great prose and baseball, in May 2014. In October of that year, he married Fatima De Bastiani. It was a match made in heaven and on the Internet — David being in Mountain View, CA, and Fatima a mere 7,500 miles away in her native Brazil. They met online, then flew to each other's country several times during their courtship. Fatina was at his side virtually every moment once David received the fatal diagnosis. Indeed, everyone in the U.S. and Brazil who knew David and Fatima — and, believe me, there are thousands of friends and admirers — believed that Fatima's love, support and cooking made a mockery of the initial, three-month sentence.

David's passions have always been his family, his love of writing, baseball, music and cats — roughly in that order — so it was no surprise when he published his second book in January. *Apparently So* is a compilation of funny and poignant stories and poetry, including his favorite articles during his 15-year career at Hewlett-Packard. Some of his best work was reprinted from his internal HP column (also called *Apparently So*), particularly when writing about then CEO and now US Presidential candidate Carly Fiorina, for whom David provided communications support during her first three years at HP. He gained an enormous and devoted following among thousands of HP employees, who always asked, when you met them, "Do you know David Price?"

David and Fatima spent the past year traveling, when David's health allowed, including trips to San Diego and Brazil. Despite the English-Portuguese language barrier, David charmed his new Brazilian family and friends with wit, creativity, guitar-playing skills and love for Fatima. All this while battling the insidious bile duct cancer, which is said to be worse than pancreatic cancer.

Easily wounded? David's life was punctuated with pain. He had a 40-year bout with Crohn's disease, which led to alcohol and prescription drug addictions. There were dozens of new, experimental procedures, transfusions, chemotherapy treatments and challenges that few people knew about. A fighter to the end, David wrote openly about his addictions in his second book. He also proudly talked about his recent 10 years of sobriety, his loving relationship with his 21-year-old twins, Ellery and Owen, and his friendship renewal with his first wife, Mira Dabrowski, who was an illustrator for *Apparently So*.

David could be salty and irreverent, but he was a pushover when it came to his kids. As one friend said of Ellery and Owen, "I know you stole his heart the minute you were born." David was so proud of his college seniors-to-be — Ellery, who's pursuing a degree in sports management, and Owen, who's studying neuro science — and they were very supportive during David's courageous battle. There are five children, one granddaughter in David and Fatima's blended family, all who miss him deeply.

In addition to his long HP career, David was a communications writer and manager at Gilead Sciences and Hitachi Global Storage Technologies. He also was a freelance writer for several years in his own company, David Price Communications. He attended "several fine universities of higher education," as he called them, including the University of Denver (near his birthplace in Englewood, CO) and San Diego State University, where he earned a degree in English, with a minor in zoology.

It's difficult to imagine a world without David Price. Even in the final weeks and days of his life, you knew David still had more stories to tell, more books to write. If you like great writing but haven't read *Slugger* <a href="http://www.amazon.com/dp/0990400654">http://www.amazon.com/dp/0990400654</a> and *Apparently So* <a href="http://www.amazon.com/dp/0986437808">http://www.amazon.com/dp/0986437808</a>, treat yourself and buy a copy. A memorial service for David was held August 15, at the Los Altos United Methodist Church, 655 Magdalena Ave., Los Altos. Goodbye, old friend. You are missed. — Jay Coleman.
