**Picnic:** This year's picnic was held as last year at Cuesta Park in Mountain View. Signups were slightly less than last year. Again, it looks like graduations, weddings or other spring activities conflicted with the date. I was in this situation personally and could not attend. We will consider alternative date options when planning the 2017 Picnic, referencing survey data to target a best possible date.

Board strategy workshops: We have continued working on what we started last fall.

- 1) **HPREC Value Proposition**: We got strong feedback, thanks to all. The newsletter is the most appreciated value in the Club, as it reaches everyone, including people who can't join other activities. We will continue to invest in publication and mailing, while still encouraging people to get the online version to reduce cost. Using first class postage insures people without online access can read it in a timely manner.
- 2) Volunteers: We have been relatively successful at getting new volunteers to help in the Club. As mentioned in the January newsletter, Mona Foley and Darlene Cano have taken over the membership data management workload, Dan Burke has joined the Tech team, and Gene Marshall is starting to help with the newsletter work. At the June board meeting, we did an inventory of tasks and roles needing volunteer replacements. Here is a prioritized list of gaps and needs.
  - a) **Tech Team lead: Paula Hoelker-williams** will leave the board and the Tech Team at the end of October after many years of strong dedication and contribution. Thanks Paula.
  - **b) Secretary:** After many years as Secretary, **Chris Gandel** would like to have more time for other activities and workload; ideally she would like to stop at the end of October, so we need someone ready to join the board as Secretary. The main role of this position is to record and publish the minutes of the monthly board meetings. Many thanks, Chris, for your years as Secretary.
  - c) Longer term: We need to consider a **Treasurer** replacement as **Gordon Mullen** has been doing it for many years and would like to focus on other activities and new family members.
  - d) Longer term: We are also looking for volunteers able to take on technical aspects of the Club's website, and membership management tools. Tom Jew (webmaster) and Ed Tang (membership) would like to see fresh help on the Tech Team to plan a transition over the new two or so years.

We are always looking for fellow retirees who want to share their talents and leadership experience or perhaps just want to help out. You will not only be able to reconnect with friends, but also become involved with making sure our Club stays strong and relevant. HP, Agilent and Keysight look at retirees in the Bay Area as an excellent resource, and we continue to enjoy a special relationship with them.

Every year, a few Board members conclude their terms with the Club, so we are looking for new people who are interested in serving on our Board and helping us make the Club even better and more valuable to the membership. It's a very exciting time as we continue to evolve the HPREC to better serve the multiple generations of retirees that are now part of the membership. If your talents are in the administrative, planning, IT,

marketing, or communication skills, we can find a place to utilize your interests. Terms are for three years.

The Board members' activities and duties are pretty straightforward. The Board meets on the first Wednesday of each month at HP's Palo Alto headquarters at noon. The meetings are about 90 minutes long, and a typical agenda includes reviewing the finances, committee reports, upcoming events, condolences and other Club business, including strategies to remain of value to our membership and to discuss members input for improvement. In addition to the monthly Board meetings, Board members are usually on at least one committee. The committees typically meet once a month, but this can vary depending on the particular committee. Board members may also participate in planning some of the events like the Spring Fling (March), Summer Picnic (June) and Holiday Luncheon (December); plus we also focus on ensuring that communication on relevant HP and legacy company news are made available to our members.

## DeltaDental Update for 2017 By John McGowan

Elizabeth Shen manages our relationship agreement with Delta Dental to provide dental insurance to current members of HPREC (who reside in California). She has been working with our account representative at Delta, and advises that there will be two changes in 2017 to the program. The first is a small (4 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>%) increase in the rates for the existing DeltaCare HMO plan. The *quarterly* premium rate for a member and 1 dependent will rise from \$146.91 to \$153.52.



The second larger change is that members will also be offered the option to purchase insurance under a Delta Dental PPO program, which includes a larger number of participating dentists. The *quarterly* premium for a member and 1 dependent will be in the range of either \$315 or \$360, depending on the plan coverages and deductibles selected. Under the PPO plans, implants, orthodontia and other specialties are not covered, and there will be a \$1,000 per person cap in coverage per year. Details will be provided on our website in the next month or so, and we would appreciate feedback on which of the PPO plans members prefer. Our new Delta Dental insurance plans and rates will take effect on January 1 of next year.

## Volunteer Recognition By Oscar Lombardi

Dear fellow HPREC Club members,

In this publication, we feature **Gary Ruppel**, whose name you may recognize from the hiking reports or if your memory serves you well, as a member of the HPREC Board around the year 2000, when he served for six years.

*Gary* joined HP at the tender age of 16. A resident of Palo Alto, Gary was attending Cubberley High School and together with five other students was selected to go to an HP facility on Saturdays to learn electronic skills including "breadboarding", or in modern



terms, putting electronic components on circuit boards. One of the first (and big) tasks assigned to Gary on Saturday mornings was to "gas up" Dave Packard's Chrysler Imperial when he came in for some weekend work. Pleasing the boss is always a good start if you want to have a long career with the company!

Gary continued working for HP for four years as a part-timer while he earned his degree in Industrial Technology and Industrial Relations at San Jose State University. Gary left HP for a period of three years to work for PG&E while studying for his MBA; shortly after obtaining his MBA, Gary returned to HP where he remained for over 36 years, 25 of this was spent working for the Components Group, plus various HR assignments including Corporate. In addition to working in the Bay Area, Gary worked in Loveland, Colorado, and also together with his wife, Eileen, on an HR Project in Beijing, China.

At the time of the HP Agilent split (1999), Gary elected to go to Agilent given that he had spent the majority of his career with the Components Group. However, this assignment was short lived since both Eileen and Gary decided to retire in 1999 from HP and Agilent respectively.

After retirement, Gary joined the HPREC Board, where he served for six years. As part of his work with the Board, Gary headed the "day trip" group under the Travel Committee and for the past few years he's been compiling the Club's hiking activities for the newsletter as well as leading hikes. He also serves as the Club Historian.

Gary also worked on a project with Ed Miller (another long term HP employee) to establish term limits for BOD members to give other folks a chance to serve and bring in new ideas for our Club members.

**ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP DRIVE** - As we gear up for our annual membership drive in the fall, here's what to expect (dates approximate):

1. By Aug 15 - PLEASE provide us your email address (or update it, if needed), so that we may accomplish items #2 and #3 with you involved. Go to our home page (above), go to Member Info Updates under Popular Links, and fill in the form with your email address. You can choose which Member Options you wish to activate, if any. Refer to your annual Membership Directory, Web Introduction pages for the username and password.

2. Sept 1 - An email will be sent to all who have provided us their email address inviting you to renew your membership online AND, now, for the first time, you will be able to vote ONLINE for our new Board members' slate for **FY2017.** In the email you receive, it will include a link to an invitation that allows you to vote ONCE (I know the temptation is high to vote many times...haha). Anyway, we'd really appreciate you trying out this **new** web improvement as a way of getting your voice heard and a way for the Nominating Committee, who handles the Board elections each year, to have the survey system automatically tally the results (still anonymous). Being from HP, we all love cutting work out of a process, don't we!

3. Sept 15 - Everyone will continue to receive a paper mailing of their Dues Renewal Invoice and the Ballot. Either use the online features or send in the paper forms, but not both. O

Our dues are still just \$15. The Board decided to do a further analysis this coming year of ways to incent members to pay and vote online before considering any potential dues rate change. Other considerations: reducing mailing of paper newsletter, and reducing number of "reminder" notices needing to be mailed for dues payment. Please make every effort to renew BEFORE THANKSGIVING, so we can avoid the extra Club expense of mailing a Dues Reminder to your home. It takes \$\$ and volunteer time to handle this, so be kind.

**CALENDAR OF EVENTS** - As mentioned in the last newsletter, we are now linking the Calendar of Events on the website to page **two** of each issue of the newsletter, where the events and activities chart will now consistently reside. Hope you don't mind this change...less labor for the volunteers.

**NEWSLETTERS ONLINE** - Again, check out our update to the Newsletters link in the left navigation bar. It's now called Archived Newsletters and we've posted newsletters dating back to November 2009. We will no longer be deleting older issues, another labor saving task.

## JOHN WASTLE'S HP MEMOIR IS NOW ONLINE By John Minck

Our latest HP Memoir was recently published on the website <u>www.HPMemoryProject.org</u>. John's title; *International Procurement Can Be Fun...!!!!* tells of his years traveling the globe, setting up sub-contract sources of components which saved HP production costs and made our products more competitive.

This is a story about the HP Way, installing the HP work culture in a class-society in Europe and full-on inter-HP-divisional politics. John grows up in Scotland in an industrial apprenticeship role and enters the HP production functions in the Tooling Dept. He moves



into the beginnings of fabricated parts outsourcing and serves his career in crucial International Procurement Operations. He and his team brought the HP Way into his subcontractors around the globe. His narrative has some rough edges, and many Nixonian (expletives). It has some disguised personalities, and is long at 148 pages. But it reads like a novel, and you will be charmed by this memoir of life in the HP production trenches.

It also serves as an HP travelogue, as he describes the dozens of countries he visits. His descriptions of HP travel expense-account living are charming. Many of the trips also lead to detailed descriptions of the foods that are offered. You can imagine his local hosts in exotic countries like Malaysia, seeking to impress him, recommending local delicacies like sea cucumbers or chicken feet.

## Bill Hewlett and Dave Packard Charity Golf Classic By John McCabe









**Meet at:** \* the usual carpool locations at the Arastradero Preserve parking area. Take I-280 and turn southwest on Page Mill Road. Proceed .5 mile to Arastradero Road and then go .5 mile to the Arastradero Preserve to form carpools.

To go directly to Huddart Park, take King's Mountain Road out of Woodside. The Huddart Park entrance road is on the right. \*Please get a parking permit at the entry kiosk (no charge for seniors) to avoid getting ticketed; there are staff there on weekdays! Meet at the Zwierlein Picnic Area.

**Meet at:** The parking lot located at the northeast corner of Hwy 9 and Santa Cruz Avenue (across from the green colored Hult's Restaurant) in Los Gatos. The sign at the lot says "Free Unlimited Parking - Northside Lot". To get there, take Hwy 17 South toward Los Gatos. Exit at Hwy 9 - Los Gatos/Saratoga and continue West on Hwy 9 (approximately 1/3 mile) to the parking lot on your right just before Santa Cruz Avenue. The carpools will depart at 10 am.

Fall Creek (a unit of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park) is in Felton. Note that this hike is well suited to hot September weather. The trails are completely shaded, and the locals claim that the creek runs all of the time. Fall Creek features the former site of lime kilns and a barrel mill and is second-growth mixed evergreen forest. Most of the hike will be along creeks with minimal elevation gain.

From the carpool site, take Hwy 17 South from Los Gatos to Mt. Hermon Road (exit 3) West (turn right toward Felton) for 3.5 miles to Graham Hill Road (where road ends), right for 0.2 mile to the next stoplight (Hwy 9). Turn left on Hwy 9 and go through downtown Felton for 0.7 mile to the entrance of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park. Turn left into the park and proceed to the Park Entrance Station. The entrance fee is \$10 per vehicle (bring your Annual Pass if you have one). We will have about twenty minutes to visit the restrooms, gift shop and Roaring Camp railroad. Next we will move the cars to the trailhead on Felton Empire Road.

Bring water, lunch and \$3.00 to reimburse carpool drivers. Light walking sticks will be useful if you have them.

HPREC Volunteers at RAFT By John McCabe

As always, HPREC volunteers had lots of fun at RAFT. RAFT, Resource Area for Teaching, is a nonprofit organization that believes hands-on teaching is the best way for teachers to teach and students to learn. Each time we are there, we make kits that are different from any kits we made before. This time, some of us made Kumihimo kits. The kits contain a simplified version of an ancient Japanese braiding technique. They tie together art, history, and mathematical patterns in a fun activity suitable for all ages.

Others of us made magnetic coils for Simple Motor kits. These kits provide the material for students to create a simple spinning motor. Students create opposing magnetic fields using a coil of magnet wire and a ring magnet. The motor converts electrical energy into kinetic energy—the energy of motion. The kits we

### Three San Francisco Tiled Stairways and Lands End Hike

On May 10, nine hikers gathered at San Francisco's Tiled Steps at Moraga Street at 16<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The weather became sunny as we climbed the city's 10-year old tiled stairway featuring a sea to sky theme. The succulent plantings were in great shape, and the views toward Ocean Beach were superb. The group then walked north along 16<sup>th</sup> Avenue for two blocks to reach the top of the Hidden Garden Steps which were tiled just three years ago. We descended these newer steps and then turned around to admire the colorful large flowers and animals displayed in the tiles. The group then drove

to the Lincoln Park Steps which are located at the end of California Street near 32<sup>nd</sup>Avenue. These newly tiled steps are quite wide and feature beautiful geometric floral patterns.

Next up was the Sutro Baths where the Lookout Café on Point Lobos Avenue is located. We walked a loop through the Lands End area along the Coastal Trail. We had fine views of the Golden Gate area and passed the California Palace of the Legion of Honor. Many wildflowers were in bloom including lupines and paint brush. We saw one very large bird of prey, which was confirmed by John McCabe as a young golden eagle.

**Getting there:** Take Hwy 280 to San Francisco. Use one of the three left lanes to take exit 49B for California 1 N toward 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue/Golden Gate Bridge. Continue onto Junipero Serra Boulevard. Use one of the left three lanes to turn slightly left onto 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Turn right onto Ortega Street. Turn left onto 16<sup>th</sup> Avenue and admire the "Story Book Houses" on the left. The Moraga tiled steps are at Moraga Street at 16<sup>th</sup> Avenue.

To reach the Lincoln Park tiled steps, drive down Moraga Street to 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Turn right and immediately get into the far left lane. 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue becomes Crossover Drive. Turn left onto 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue. Turn left onto California Street and you'll see the Lincoln Park steps at the court at the end of California Street.

From the Lincoln Steps, turn right onto 32<sup>nd</sup> Avenue. Turn right onto Clement which becomes Seal Rock Drive. Turn left onto Alto Mar Way. Turn right onto Point Lobos Avenue. Turn right into the large parking lot above the Sutro Baths.

## Monte Bello Ridge OSP – Stevens Creek Nature Trail

Eleven hikers took advantage of a wonderful day to walk the Stevens Creek Nature Trail at Monte Bello Ridge Open Space Preserve. This hike was a substitute for a hike to Mindego Hill at the Russian Ridge OSP. Your leader and his intrepid spouse (Eileen) had hiked to Mindego Hill as a pre-hike the week before. We followed a route that was quite difficult given a very warm day and multiple ascents and descents of varying difficulty. We did see, however, a coyote and a bobcat on the trail. We decided that a more doable hike for the group would be the Stevens Creek Nature Trail at Monte Bello given that a good portion of the hike is downhill in shaded woodland. Of course, what goes down must go up; however, the day was cool, and we took our time on the way back. The 3.8-mile loop has sign posts explaining the terrain and its inhabitants both flora and fauna. Interpretive sign posts are helpful in understanding the area. We did not see any large mammals, however many western fence lizards. Marcia Adams, being an inquisitive sort, asked if there were any "eastern" fence lizards. None of us eleven hikers could answer that question, other than to state "not in the west." Upon further research, it has been determined that, indeed, an "eastern" fence lizard actually exists in the eastern U.S from

New York to Florida and east to Texas.

One of the more interesting stops was at a "sag pond" which was created by a slippage along the San Andreas Fault. The pond had water in it supporting a vast number of lily pads along with ferns and cattails.

**Getting there**: From Hwy 280, take Page Mill Road west about five miles. The parking lot for the Preserve is on the left. Trail guides are available as well as restrooms.

a master's degree in Electrical Engineering from Illinois in 1958. He continued to maintain friendships with people from these schools until his death, telling lively stories of their shared camaraderie.

In 1956, Nick met Joan on a blind date, where they watched a movie and attended a jazz club. Over the years, there were jokes about his falling asleep during the movie, but he also went back to the theater at midnight in hopes of correcting the change error made by the attendant. It was true love after that! Nick was also passionate about skiing, backpacking, and fly fishing, especially when doing these with great friends. He maintained a very active life to the very end - he had a ski pass for this season - and continued his education. Nick's desire for lifelong learning extended to classes at SRJC and Sonoma State until very recently. He was also a frequent world traveler and particularly enjoyed trips with his wife, siblings and in-laws.

Nick will be remembered for his sweetness and humor, close friendships, and integrity. His constant intellectual exploration, particularly when considering spirituality and science, is often commented on by friends. Still, it was his unique devotion to his family that seems to have been the hallmark of his life.

He was a fan of jazz music, particularly Miles Davis and the writings of Ralph Gleason, shared with his family the pleasure of the 49ers of the 1980s. and enjoyed the Applebox, his cabin at TwainHarte, as well as trips to Nevada and Indiana. For most of his adult life he suffered from his cerebral palsy and terribly from physical and psychiatric complications of neurosurgical procedures intended to relieve his tremor. He was respected for and will be remembered by his family, friends and caregivers for his intelligence, seemingly infallible memory, and for the tenacity and willpower required continuously over decades to live the best he could. Jon was predeceased by his father Wayne (the son of Rufus Musser, thus Jon's middle name).
