HPREC President's Message By Bernard Bruand

I hope you all had excellent holidays and a great time moving into 2017.

In early December we had the Holiday Luncheon with around 150 participants. It was a huge success from the feedback we received. Great performance from Master of Ceremony **John McGowan** and other presenters, with a special thanks to **Oscar Lombardi** who helped keep the audience very awake and laughing while he and Darlene Cano drew for the \$50 certificates.



Abbreviated financial summary of FY16:

Income: \$15,263 Expenses: \$16,529

We used \$1,266 from our savings. This amount was less than targeted as we managed expenses very well during the year.

Major expenses: Newsletter (print and mail) ~ \$8,100

Directories ~ \$2500 Ballots mailing ~\$900

Sponsorship of 3 Club events: ~ \$1,600 (Holiday Luncheon, Spring Fling, Picnic)

Travel ~ \$700 (some trips broke even, some ran a loss depending on attendance)

Insurance and other expenses: ~ \$2,500

We have enough savings to plan again in FY17 to cover small subsidies for events or trips that may not break even, if needed.

Directory and Membership Renewal: We mailed Reminder Dues Notices to more than 200 members who didn't renew before December. Please insure you have renewed your membership. The deadline for your name to be in the HPREC Directory is the middle of January, so don't delay. Directories will be mailed to homes in February.

Spring Fling: The luncheon will be held on March 13, 2017, Mariani's Restaurant - Chair Harold Kaye. Reserve the date. You will also be able to bring guests and friends. Look for more info in this newsletter and sign up via our web home page (see Hot News, Spring Fling).

Webb McKinney is confirmed as the guest speaker. Webb was a key strategic leader on some large HP programs and has just released a new book on HP, co-written with a Stanford professor. This should be a very interesting talk, different from last year when we looked at HP's future; Webb's talk will look at HP's history.

Looking for help: We are still seeking volunteers, so let us know if you can help in any area of expertise or interest. The **key openings are for a Treasurer** to take over from Gordon during the FY2017 in a smooth transition, and someone to take over **Dental Plan coordination** with Delta Dental, as **Elizabeth** would like to be replaced in this role.

Delta Dental Update By Elizabeth Shen, HPREC Delta Dental Liaison

As previously announced, both HMO and PPO Delta Dental Plans are now available to HPREC members who reside in California. The PPO Plan is new this year!

HMO — the **HMO** plans give you access to a network of providers that have agreed to lower their rates for plan members and meet quality standards. Services under an **HMO** plan are covered only if you see a provider within that HMO's network. You can see the list of Delta Dental HMO dentists in your area on Delta's website at www.deltadentalins.com under "Find a Dentist", then selecting DeltaCare USA providers. You can search by city or zip code too. If you don't select a Dentist, one will be assigned for you.



The updated quarterly HMO plan rates, from January 1, 2017 - December 31, 2018, are below:

	2017 – 2018 Rates
Enrollee	\$97.20
Enrollee + 1 dependent	\$153.52
Enrollee + 2 or more dependents	\$220.87

You may enroll in the **HMO** plan at any time. Delta Dental usually takes about a month to process your enrollment, and you should receive your membership card by the first of the FOLLOWING month. Your dentist's office will be notified of your enrollment during this period.

DeltaCare USA (HMO) Customer Service can assist at 800-422-4234

PPO - The new **PPO** plan offers greater flexibility by allowing you to select any licensed provider; however, if you select a Delta Dental PPO provider, you can receive the greatest savings with the lower out of pocket costs. They usually offer a larger network of providers as well. Premiums are typically higher, and it's common for there to be a deductible. For a current listing of PPO and Premier providers, please refer to Delta's website at www.deltadentalins.com. The site is updated regularly for accuracy.

The **quarterly PPO** plan rates, from January 1, 2017 - December 31, 2017, are below:

	2017 Rates
Enrollee	\$168.96
Enrollee + 1 dependent	\$313.14
Enrollee + 2 or more dependents	\$521.55

PPO plan changes can only be made at open enrollment, unless a member is new to the plan. Open Enrollment is from November 15 to December 15 (as noted in the November issue of *HPREC NEWS*) for a January 1 effective date. You must remain on the plan the entire year. If you want to change your plan, you would need to wait for the next open enrollment period or during a 30-day period following a qualifying event.

You must be an HPREC member and reside in California to enroll in these Delta Dental plans. Refer to the Club's website, www.hpretirees.org/hprec, **Dental Plan** link for more details.

HAPPY 2017! We have had a fun year of special trips and events, and for those of you who supported your Travel Committee's efforts . . . THANK YOU! With the New Year starting, there are a few things we want to remind members about when going on these day trips.

First of all, our trips are self-sustaining. We price out a trip to include tickets, meals (if applicable), bus, tips, snacks/water (if applicable) and taxes. ALL MEMBERS PAY THE SAME PRICE LISTED. Your Travel Committee is no exception . . . we do the work for you, and we pay the same fees.



When we have had to cancel trips due to lack of participation, we do incur costs, and these costs are not covered by reservation fees. That is why we keep asking members to sign up early so we know if we can cover the total cost of any adventure. While the Club's "kitty" has helped us on some of these cancellation-cost situations, we do not want to make this a habit. The Club does subsidize some of the special events, like the Holiday Luncheon, Spring Fling, and Picnic, but those venues are not associated with your Travel Committee. Those events have separate leaders who do a great job of providing very special get-togethers for all members.

Your Travel Committee meets monthly to discuss and plan new events, and we continue to seek suggestions for venues of interest. We are hoping to include in the years to come an overnight trip to see local nesting eagles, visit a cheese factory, also an olive company, and stay at a nearby casino (for those of you who enjoy the sound of winning at the slots!). We still have spaces for the whale watching trip, and this promises to really be fun.



HAMILTON I do want to address the issue of getting tickets to see <u>Hamilton</u> in San Francisco at the SHN Orpheum Theater. Group tickets are NOT being offered, and the ticket prices are unbelievable. The upper balcony (which I call nose-bleed section) price is \$100 for the

very back rows, with added costs the closer you get to the front of the balcony. Seats on the main floor start at \$197 per person and go as high as \$500 for premium orchestra seating. (There are also special packages in the thousands of \$\$\$.) I did NOT join the overnight lines in San Francisco for an opportunity to get tickets, and I heard they sold out quickly. We estimated that an evening in SF to see this show would set people back about \$500 a couple, and we are not sure we want that kind of financial exposure for the Club. However, IF over 50 of you really want us to get tickets, bus, etc., we will do that IF YOU COMMIT TO PAYING THE PRICE AS SOON AS WE GET TICKETS. Let me know, via emails only (pat.fausett@sbcglobal.net), if you still want your committee to pursue this activity. I would work with SHN after the Christmas season, and I have a feeling they will be adding many more showings of this musical.



- * Thursday: Help register judges, monitor the hall during judging, etc.


Tasks can be done while walking or standing. Indicate if you have a preference.

National Historical Park

An unusual urban national park, the **Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park** is located on the waterfront in Richmond, CA. It is the flagship national park for telling stories of the home front efforts across the United States. The oldest National Park docent, Betty Reid Soskin works here.

The new Rosie the Riveter Museum is housed in a restored historic brick Oil House that once powered the Ford Assembly Plant in Richmond. The Center includes historical exhibits and houses a gift shop, offices, classrooms and a theater providing space for ranger talks and film showing. We will tour the USS Red Oak Victory Ship which will also be docent-led. During her hazardous tour of duty in the Pacific, this ship handled many tons of ammunition, supplying the fleet without a single casualty. She is the last surviving ship built in the Kaiser Richmond shipyards during World War II.

A hosted lunch will be at Assemble Restaurant, Ford Point (nearby). Lunch includes your choice of Sandwich or Veggie Chef Salad, non-alcoholic beverage and gelato with shortbread cookie for dessert.

Changes Coming to HPREC Golf By John McCabe





This East Bay Regional Park adjoins the San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge and offers trails in marshes, grasslands and hills. If trail conditions in March are as wet as they were in January 2013, we will again feature a hike in the hills and enjoy the great views. If trail conditions in March are dry, we will explore the wetlands and visit the Tuibun Ohlone Village site. Please bring water, lunch, and \$4 to reimburse our carpool drivers.

The "wet" route will be kept short of five miles so we can climb some strenuous hills. This hike is exposed to bay winds. Some of the wetlands will be visited.

The "dry" route will be near five miles and will feature great opportunities for bird watching.

Continuing to Fulfill Bill and Dave's Citizenship Objective By John McCabe





Bill Hewlett and Dave Packard instilled in us the importance of giving back to our community. Their 1966 Corporate Objectives included Objective #7, Citizenship: "To meet the obligations of good citizenship by making contributions to the community and the institutions in our society which generate the environment in which we operate." For the past 22 years, the Bill Hewlett and **Dave Packard Charity** Golf Classic has continued this tradition by raising money for at-risk youths.

For the past 20 years, the **Teen Health Van**, an outreach program of the **Lucille Packard Children's Hospital**, has provided free medical care to at-risk teens and young adults in the Bay Area. The van brings services of a physician (Dr. Seth Ammerman), a nurse practitioner, a dietitian, and a social worker, as well as free medications, to schools, parks, and the streets where they are needed. The care team focuses on each patient's strengths rather than their weaknesses, keeping them engaged in improving their own health. The program now serves 400 unique patients each year. The board, the other volunteers, and the participants of the Bill Hewlett and Dave Packard Charity Golf Classic are proud of the part they have played in helping Dr. Seth and the rest of his team provide these greatly needed services. This year, we presented a check for \$27,000 to the Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford.

Dr. Seth talked about the importance of the Bill Hewlett and Dave Packard Charity Golf Classic to the Teen Health Van. When people suffer from conditions such as diabetes or cancer, friends and relatives will often donate money to find a cure. Friends and relatives of homeless and other at-risk youths are, most likely, not in a position to help the Teen Health Van. He also told us that federally funded agencies have held up the Teen Health Van as an example of what people in other parts of the country should do. With the change in the U. S. administration, support for these programs is at risk.

On a perfect October day in the Bay Area, nine hikers opted to enjoy a hike in Palo Alto's Foothills Park. Located some five miles west of Hwy 280 off of Page Mill Road, the park offers miles of hiking trails, picnic sites, a lake for boating and fishing, campsites and an interpretive center. Open only to Palo Alto residents (although access during the week is possible for others since the entry kiosk is not staffed), the park also is great for viewing wildlife, especially deer and many species of birds and even an occasional rattlesnake. It is also (at least at the time of our hike), an active mountain lion area due to the abundance of deer upon which to feast.

Our route began at the Orchard Glen Picnic Area and proceeded up the fire road to the Fern Loop Trail, then up the Castanoan Trail (fairly steep but with steps). At the juncture of the Los Trancos Trail, we took a right turn which led us to a superb overlook of the valley and beyond. We then hiked up the Madrone Fire Road to the Trappers Fire Road where the group picture was taken below the street sign (cows in Berkeley?). Following Trappers, we descended down via the Sunrise and Los Trancos Trails ending up close to the Interpretive Center. The total length of the hike was four miles with an estimated elevation gain of ~900 feet.

On the return hike, we came down the High Meadow Trail to the Lower Meadow Trail and down to the Permanente Creek Trail back to the parking area. The total elevation gain was about 600 feet. and the length of the hike around 5 miles. At our lunch stop, a mole was moving dirt and piling it around the hole. We saw a herd of deer which included several bucks while coming down the High Meadow Trail, and quite a number of wild turkeys along the Permanente Creek Trail. Directions to Rancho San Antonio County Park entrance: From I-280 coming from the north take the Foothill Blvd exit and turn right

toward the hills. Almost immediately, turn right on Cristo Rey Drive at traffic signal. From I-280 coming from the south, take the Foothill Blvd exit and turn left toward the hills. After you go under the I-280 overpass, turn right on Cristo Rey Drive at traffic signal. Proceed about one mile down Cristo Rey Drive and turn left into the park. Turn right almost immediately upon entering the park and proceed to the county park entrance. Restrooms are available. In case the county lot is full, use the equestrian lot.

Richard Allen Fellows, 84, April 18, 1932 - October 25, 2016, resident of Saratoga

Born and raised in Landsdowne, PA, Richard enlisted in the Air Force in 1951 and served at air bases in Texas and Illinois during the Korean War. He attended San Jose State ate University on the G.I. Bill, where he met Carolyn Ann Harp of Campbell, CA. They were married in 1962. Richard – known to his family and friends as Dick – started his career at Fairchild Semiconductor, worked briefly at Westinghouse in southern California, then at Hewlett-Packard Corporation in 1965.
