March is here, and we have completed our annual Membership Renewal process. Similar to the last few years, we see a loss of around 100 members. For January 2017, membership stands at 966, which includes some new members. It is clear that the business environment is changing, and many people retire or leave from HP involuntarily. Please read Oscar Lombardi's article.

We will do all we can at the Board to promote and keep HPREC alive as long as we keep membership at a good level. We have no access to list of employees retiring from HP related companies, so **we ask all members to continue promoting the Club to people they know**. The higher number of members enables the Club to offer more activities or continue with the ones we offer now, so it is important we all promote the Club membership.

Sympathy: As the sympathy section was getting very long and covered many pages in each newsletter, we have started to shorten some obituaries, while providing the link to the full article. It has been our policy to not add text to published obituaries as they are written by families, taking an "as is" approach.

I just want to add a comment on the January newsletter Sympathy article regarding Gerry Priestley. It was indicated in the submitted obituary that he was active in HPREC. In fact, he was one of the past presidents of our Club.

Directory: You should receive the 2017 Member Directory in the mail in mid-March. Let us know if you don't receive one by the end of March. Please properly dispose of old or obsolete directories to protect the confidentiality of the information.

HPREC Membership Cost for 2018: The Board has discussed the membership pricing and the cost of distributing paper copies of the newsletter. This cost is a very large part of the yearly costs in HPREC. We will not have different pricing in 2018, as this would be difficult to administer and give minimum saving for some members. We decided to work on incentives and recognitions for people who only use 'online' newsletters. We will tell you more in future newsletters as we will discuss in upcoming meetings. If you want to share an idea, don't hesitate to write to me.

Looking for help: We are still taking in volunteers, so let us know if you can help in any area of expertise or interest. But the **key openings** are for a **Treasurer** to take over from Gordon during FY2017 in a smooth transition, and someone to take over the **Dental Plan coordination** with Delta Dental as Elizabeth would like to be replaced in this role.

Another key issue for HPREC is the need to get more Board members; we are down to 4 officers and 3 board members.

Dental Plan Update By Elizabeth Shen, HPREC's Delta Dental Liaison

PPO Update:

We recently discovered that Delta Dental doesn't yet have a system in place to process PPO payments directly from individual members, as it currently does with HMO Plan members. While the HPREC Board has a temporary process to handle payments for 2017, we are hopeful that Delta Dental will complete implementation of their payment system in time for a 2018 plan roll-out. We will update you regarding Delta Dental's progress of the payment system implementation as we get closer to the 2018 open enrollment period.

As a quick reminder, the open enrollment four-week window is from Nov. 15 to Dec. 15 for plan changes that would become effective on Jan. 1, 2018. To make changes to the plan, a PPO plan member would need to wait for the next open enrollment period or during a 30-day period of a qualifying event.

Emails from HPREC? By Carol Nakamoto

Are you receiving the occasional email from the Club?

If you are, that means that we have your current email and that you wish to receive emails when:

- 1) the latest newsletter is posted online and
- 2) someone on the Board sends a message to members (event reminder, annual membership renewal drive, for example). You do NOT need to do anything!

If you are **NOT** receiving emails and you elected to do so, that means you have not updated our <u>self-maintaining</u> membership database with your new email address. We have been receiving some

bounced emails after each message sent to all members who have shared their email with us. This last time (the Feb 21 Spring Fling reminder), we received 25 bounced emails, a majority of them were YAHOO email addresses! Could that include you?

It's very time consuming for a member of the Tech Team to research bounced emails against the Club's database (some names are different, some emails don't include the person's name) so <u>if you need to update our records</u>, <u>please follow</u> <u>these steps:</u>

Go to <u>www.hpretirees.org/hprec</u> and click on Member Info Updates in left navigation bar.

Enter HPREC's <u>user name</u> and <u>password</u> and then an online form will appear. (*Current user names and passwords were included in the email you received announcing availability of this newsletter*)

Select 3rd box on left "Email/Newsletter Notification Preferences (Member options)"

Enter your name, and then your new email address twice.

Review the **Options** to make sure we are following your wishes:

- 1. Newsletters: it will default to not sending you a paper copy to your home unless you select the 2nd button (we're encouraging as many of you as possible to stop the paper mailing)
- 2. Emails: it will default to sending you the occasional email unless you Opt-Out of receiving them

Hit **Submit** (and you're done!)

If you are not able to process the change online, please mail your new email address to our Membership Team at <u>ba.membershipchair@hpretirees.org</u>, and it will be individually entered for you by one of our volunteers.

How the News Becomes Our Newsletter? By John McGowan

For most of our members, the bi-monthly newsletter becomes a quick online or paper read every other month for a few moments, checking items on the calendar like hiking schedules, trips planned and volunteer activities. Our front-page President's Message summarizes past and future major activities, and there are sections on websites, HP discounts and other general news.

But are you aware of how it is assembled?



Starting more than a month before publication, **Gene Marshall**, our Editor, pulls together a spreadsheet for each edition, identifying expected articles and their authors, and establishing a schedule for writing, editing and publishing. The goal is to have the newsletter posted online during the first week of each odd-numbered month, with the printed versions received at your home approximately two weeks later. There are typically more than a dozen authors, each of whom is provided a "style sheet" and a due date to write about their subjects. In addition, several contributors produce the flyers each month for events like Travel group trips, and

our Holiday and Spring Fling luncheons, and the Picnic. A special software program is used to search obituaries each month in local newspapers, looking for links to HP or Agilent or Keysight, and those notices are supplemented by messages from family members to the Club.

As the articles are completed, they are passed to Associate Editors, **Carol Nakamoto** and **Betsy Riccomini**. The articles are "polished" to assure compliance with the style sheet guidelines, and checked for accuracy and language. As the Associate Editors complete their work, the articles are passed along via Dropbox to Gene Marshall, who begins the process of assembling them into a master Word document. Dropbox use was introduced by Gene to the Newsletter Committee, and it provides a more organized approach to submitting articles and flyers from the Associate Editors to the Editor. Often the articles need rearranging for space, or to fit photos and graphics into the allotted spaces, or to align captions and names under photographs. Once the newsletter is assembled, it is returned to the Associate Editors and our Proofreader, **Marialis Seehorn**, for a final review, who looks in great detail for spelling, punctuation, type fonts and other details. All of the hyperlinks and URL's are also tested and verified.

Once it has passed final edit, the newsletter (minus all of the HP discount passwords) is passed to our web team as a pdf file for uploading to the Club's website by **Tom Jew**, our webmaster. **Dan Burke** and Carol handle the email announcement to members who have declared their preference for being notified that it is now online. Tom and Carol, with online assistance from **Ed Tang** (Tech Team), ensure our website has a major event ready for online registration. At the same time, a pdf file with passwords is passed to **John McGowan** to be walked into FedEx for printing and mailing of the roughly 600 copies still mailed to members. After a proof copy is reviewed of both the printed version and the address files and addressing of the envelopes, the project is released to the remote printing and mailing plant which turns the job around in about a week. Those printed newsletters arrive between the 15th and the 20th of the month.

We strive for a quality product and hope that you enjoy one of the great benefits of Club membership, our prized *HPREC NEWS*.

An unusual urban national park, the **Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park** is located on the waterfront in Richmond, CA. Meet at the Usual Carpool Location* or if you drive there directly, exit Edgewood Road from Highway 280. Go East (toward the bay). Go one mile on Edgewood Road to the Edgewood Park and Day Camp sign on your right and turn right onto Old Stage Road. Park in the parking lot just off Edgewood Road (there is an inner parking lot, but it probably is full).

With all of the rain that we have been having, this should be a great year for spring wildflowers. Edgewood County Park and Natural Preserve is a great place to see them. Although our hike will be relatively short (about 3 miles) and has only about 550 feet of elevation gain, it has something for everyone. It has lovely shady trails along steep canyons, sunny grassy hillsides with a wide variety of wildflowers (not to mention butterflies), hilltops covered with live oaks and buckeyes, and great views of the San Francisco Bay. I recommend wearing long pants (and/or keeping in the middle of the trails), as there is sometimes poison oak along the sides of the trails.

Bring water, sunscreen, lunch, and \$2 for the car pool drivers. Bathrooms are available at the beginning and end of the hike.

Length: About 3 miles. Duration: 3 ¹/₂ hours. Difficulty: Easy to Moderate – about 550 feet of elevation gain. No dogs. Not wheelchair accessible.

HPREC Volunteers Start the Year Off Right By John McCabe

Sixteen HPREC volunteers started the new year right. They showed their support of STEM education in the area by volunteering at RAFT, the Resource Area for Teaching. Jennifer Albin, the RAFT Volunteer Program Manager said that we far surpassed what she was hoping we would accomplish on a January afternoon!

The efforts of the HPREC volunteers will impact many students throughout the area. The "Design A House" kits we made will help 1,000 architects-in-training design and build a house using different materials. They will explore what is possible and dream of what might be. The "Colors of Light" kits we helped make will help 4,500 students understand that white light is actually a combination of different colors. The easy-to-build spectroscopes separate the incoming light into its component colors, forming a light spectrum (rainbow). Besides creating interesting color patterns, the spectroscopes can be used to identify different sources of light. The "Understanding Biodiversity" kits with their many assorted color beads, pawns and game pieces, paper clips, caps, tables, graphs, and 20-sided dice will help 1,200 students understand that everything that lives in an ecosystem, including humans, contributes to the biodiversity of the planet. The students will explore how the many species interact and depend upon one another for things like food, shelter and oxygen. Students will learn how to measure biodiversity in terms of species richness (the number of species living in a particular area) by sampling "species" in a simulated ecosystem and graphing, and then analyzing, data.

That's a total of 6,700 students reached! And that does not count all the parts that we unpackaged and prepared to be put back into inventory for other kits. Not bad for a bunch of HPREC members who had lots of fun working together for a morning at RAFT.

Sawyer Camp Road, South By John McCabe (Leader)

In the first 18 days of January 2017, there were only two days with no rain. The originally scheduled date for our January HPREC hike was not one of them. But, the second date was. Six HPREC members took the opportunity to walk off the holiday meals and start the new year off right with a 7-mile hike along the Crystal Springs Reservoir. The Sawyer Camp trail proved to be the perfect place to hike after the rain. The hiking trail conditions were perfect. There was no mud to deal with. The views were beautiful. Turn left onto Skyline Blvd. and drive 1.3 miles. Park on the side of the road just before Crystal Springs Road.

When Rohnert Park was established in 1962 and launched an aggressive growth initiative, they were leaders in the successful drive to resist absorption by incorporating Cotati as a city in its own right. Lloyd served as Cotati's mayor, and Prue sat on the City's Design Review Committee. Meanwhile, The Cotatian succumbed to the technology and economics of the digital age. She also worked at the Hewlett-Packard plant in Rohnert Park. The tragic loss of their son Jay (Jeffrey Edward) in a 1975 motorcycle crash was devastating to Prue and Lloyd, but they responded with typical grace and creativity, joining the Peace Corps and working for two years in Samoa - Prue as a teacher, Lloyd as a newspaper publisher. They made lifelong friends in Samoa, and retained lifelong interests in its people and culture. Samoa launched them on a series of travel adventures that took them around the Pacific and to the Amazon, the Andes, Mexico, Central America, Europe and Africa. Back in Cotati, Prue and Lloyd plunged into a range of civic affairs. City Councilmember John Dell'Osso says: "Prue Draper has been a pillar in our community. Along with her husband Lloyd, they have made Cotati what it is today." Prue was also an energetic supporter of Sonoma State University's library and community outreach activities. Prue's health began a rapid decline in January 2017. Prue is survived by her son and daughter, Robert Lloyd and Robin Draper of Cotati, and by her granddaughter Erin Roman of Santa Rosa.
