

Two New HP Memoirs Are Now Online By John Minck

DAVE EVANS—Other than silicon in integrated circuits, the only other semiconductor technology which is creating massive social and economic change is the light-emitting semiconductor technology. As multi-color and super-high-efficiency and brilliant new high-intensity LED lights come into use, a lot of those accomplishments can be credited to LED application engineers like HPA's Dave Evans.

Although the earliest appearances of LED alphanumeric digits were in HP products like the HP 9830 desktop computer, we know that the true commercial LED blockbuster was the rollout of the HP 35 handheld calculator. Tens of thousands of 35s swept the engineering community by storm in 1972.



With product designers at hundreds of HP customer companies looking to exploit the portability and reliability of LEDs, the design complexities were serious. So, applications engineers like Dave devised powerful technical literature and customer training to leverage their uniqueness for customer-pleasing products which have revolutionized our lives. Moreover, in many cases, there were industrial trade associations which controlled the writing of specifications for their use.

Dave was instrumental in educating many of those groups, such as a technical experts group on night vision systems for military equipment. Or, in the adoption of LEDs for automotive applications. There were groups writing specs for building EXIT signs in public places, in airport runway lights, in traffic lights, even in street walkway warning lights. And there was Dave, in the middle of those spec writing trade groups.

Dave's recall is amazing, and this story presents so many fascinating episodes at customer's plants. Other times, a trip was necessary to investigate product failures, often caused by their production automation which compromised the performance of the digital and alpha-numeric components.

Two New HP Memoirs Are Now Online (continued...)

CHRIS CLARE— Imagine a boy about 12, getting his dad to buy him a WWII war surplus bombing computer, the Norden bombsight, the top secret invention which revolutionized precision bombing over Germany. And then, taking it apart, down to the nuts and bolts, and reassembling it. Imagine him building a go-cart with a Ford Model A transmission. Or building a ham radio, or a Jacob's ladder of arcing high voltage that drove the neighbors' TVs crazy. And then went to Cal Poly where the curricula had been developed to train "hands-on" invention.



It was probably random chance that his first work project at HP was the scientific desktop HP 9100, a blockbuster product which was one of the first personal computers. Its transcendental

and logarithmic computational power was profound. And he stayed in the HP Labs product team which, fairly quickly, was able to exploit integrated circuits to build the 9100's functions into a shirt pocket size wizard, the HP 35.

But then, semiconductor technology was in ferment. The industry was booming with visionary companies—Fairchild, Motorola, Intel and a hundred others. In that technology chaos, Dave and Bill and probably Barney Oliver made the decision that HP must build its own semiconductor processing labs, to provide unique functionality to HP integrated circuits. You will be captivated with Chris' management of automation and data gathering systems for processing machinery, diffusion furnaces, surface chemical processing and test probing, and a half dozen others. This is a truly enjoyable read in the HP contributions to the science and applications of crystal technology.





Bring water, lunch, and \$4 to reimburse carpool drivers and cover parking fees. Be prepared for San Francisco weather (i.e., it could be chilly if the coastal fog is in place).

Meet at the Usual Carpool Location* Alternatively, meet the group in front of the Officers' Club (50 Moraga Ave.) at 11 am. There is a large paid public parking lot directly in front of the Officers' Club. Pay enough at one of the machines to cover 2.5-3 hours (about \$4). The Officers' Club will have maps and restrooms available and is also the location of the first Goldsworthy piece.

This will be our second visit to one of the oldest historic destinations of the Bay Area. The San Francisco Presidio is a national treasure that has been in constant use (by Europeans) since it was established as a military post by Spain in 1776. The many miles of hiking trails offer magnificent views, historic buildings, varied landscapes, and some beautiful works of site-specific sculptural art by the worldfamous British artist, Andy Goldsworthy (who also did the Stone River sculpture on the Stanford campus).

Our route of about 4.5 miles will take us by the various Goldsworthy installations, the Inspiration Point Overlook, the National Cemetery Overlook, and an archaeological site.

Fitzgerald Marine Preserve to Pillar Point & Back By Jim Holl (leader) with photo by John McCabe Our visit to the San Mateo County coast during July was a delight. As we arrived, the fog lifted which gave us a sunny day with temperatures in the low 60s and a gentle sea-breeze. We climbed the bluff and watched about 60 harbor seals below. Many were resting on the exposed rocks. A few were cavorting in the lagoon.

We walked along the bluff through the Fitzgerald Marine Preserve and into a nice neighborhood with fine views of the ocean. We passed the Moss Beach Distillery Restaurant and continued along the bluffs using paved paths that were no longer recognizable as roads.

We entered Pillar Point Bluff County Park and were pleased to see so many wildflowers still in bloom. We noted that this park was a sanctuary for a few endangered animals, and it was also a fine viewing platform for the famous Mavericks surfing contest held ½ mile off-shore most winters. As we descended the bluffs, we spotted many great blue herons

hunting near Pillar Point Harbor. We passed a large group of kayakers re-entering Pillar Point Harbor from a beach. We continued to the jetty where we had our lunch break. A few seals swimming in the ocean and the ocean waves were our entertainment.

Our return route used the inland side of Pillar Point Bluff where we could view the local airport. Our route through the neighborhood and past the restaurant brought us back to the Fitzgerald Marine Preserve. By turning right at the three palm trees, we hiked the city side of the preserve.

After our hike was complete, we walked to an observation point to again see the harbor seals. The tide had risen and covered the exposed rocks. All of the harbor seals were resting on the beach.

To enjoy this hike, take I-280 northbound, use the 2nd from the right lane to take exit 33 for State Route 92 toward San Mateo/Hayward/Half Moon Bay, keep left, follow signs for CA 92 W/Half Moon Bay and merge onto CA 92 W/Half Moon Bay Road, turn right onto Main Street (in Half Moon Bay), turn right onto CA -1 N/Cabrillo Hwy N, drive 6.2 miles and turn left onto California Ave (in Moss Beach) to the parking area at the Fitzgerald Marine Preserve.

Length: about 5 miles. Duration: a bit over 2 hours of hiking. Difficulty: moderate. No dogs. Not wheelchair accessible.
