



HP's 50th anniversary articles copied from June 1989 Club newsletter:

In **January 1989**, **Ray Rooney** turned over the helm as editor of the HPREC newsletter to **Mary Elledge**. Ray was a member of HPREC and editor of the newsletter starting in December 1982, when it was called "Relaxed Retirees". Mary was editor of the newsletter for nine years, until September 1998.

Below is an article Mary included in the June 1989 newsletter, which was written by HPREC Secretary, **Zella Williamson**, describing the ceremony at the garage on Addison Avenue celebrating HP's 50th anniversary.

"More Anniversary Doings: By Zella

"The officers of HPREC were invited to the ceremony at "the garage" and Zella has very graciously written an account of this part of the 50th anniversary celebration for us: May 19, 1989. It was a festive sight on a sunny day. The 300 block of Addison Avenue in Palo Alto was blocked off to celebrate the dedication of "the garage" at #367 as a California Historic Landmark. The normally quiet tree lined street was transformed into a colorful party with ice cream, balloons, a band of HP-ites and a quartet that could harmonize like you wouldn't believe. It was a nostalgic reunion where many of us renewed friendships from the past. After an earlier interview with the media, Bill and Dave mingled with the crowd, which gave us an unusual opportunity to visit with them.

HP has grown to the point where it doesn't have the space to house all the people who would want to join in the company's 50th anniversary celebration, so, as usual, an innovative solution was devised. Each division elected a representative to participate in the activities and to return and report to the division on what they experienced. These people were outstanding - 109 of them from 32 countries. This group had by this time been together on several occasions and were feeling warm and friendly to those attending. (What a wonderful world this would be if countries could operate like that!). All those I spoke to were impressed that the people who work for HP anywhere in the world are special people. I was proud to

have them see the respect that the community has for Dave and Bill and HP.

You'll be happy to hear that Ralph Lee attended with his daughter, and it was good to see him looking so well. We also met a number of people from the neighborhood who had been invited to attend.

Also, among the guests were city and state officials and members of the State Historical Society, some of whom spoke during the program. Bill and Dave said a few words to the group. Bill said that neither of them had been back to the garage in 50 years. Dave modestly indicated that HP did make some contributions in those days but that we weren't the first ones in the area. He also stressed that it wasn't the work done in the garage that made HP grow, it was the people who worked for the company that made the difference. And he reiterated that we have enjoyed the success of the past 50 years but that we should be looking ahead to the positive things in the next 50 years. The overriding message I got from both Bill and Dave was the emphasis on the future.

Hal Mickelson of the Corporate Legal staff did an exceptional job of MC-ing the program. In his concluding remarks he had a message for all of us, especially the young representatives from all over the world. I believe it's a message worth quoting — it made me feel that because we have people with this kind of insight, HP will be even greater in the future.

He said: "I've talked with many people who, like me, have not been in Silicon Valley, electronics, the computer industry or HP for fifty years or even twenty years. For a lot of us, it's been more like ten years or five years, or ten months or five months. On behalf of that group, the people who most recently joined the team, I'd like to say this is a thrilling moment for us—to remember and celebrate everything that grew from these small beginnings and to be challenged about how much more we can build on the broad base that has been prepared for us.

And there's a reminder of one thing more. Our literature, our films and our plays are full of the stories of people who gained the whole world and lost their own souls. The story that this garage began reminds us that life doesn't have to work out that way. It's a story of great material success - scientific achievement, technical innovation, financial recognition and managerial excellence; yet some enduring human values are written on every page - honesty, integrity, respect for individuals, respect of their diversity, and a commitment to service in the community. Those of us who now have the opportunity to build on this record want to pledge that, as we help to write the chapters yet to come, those human values will be written on every future page as well.

And with this in mind, I invite all of you to salute Bill Hewlett and David Packard with one more tremendous round of applause." ... Hal Mickelson

When the city decided to honor HP's 50th anniversary along with its 67th May Fete Parade, they asked Jack to be co-grand marshal, and I can't think of a better choice. I'm sure you all enjoyed seeing in Measure the picture of Jack living it up in the elegant car. Way to go Jack.





Bair Island Lite Hike



Bair Island promotes itself as "A breath of fresh air amid the urban jungle." Ready to check it out for yourself?

Meet at Bair Island Parking. Be sure to allow sufficient time to get through heavy traffic. Find your own way to US 101. Going north, take exit 411 at Holly. For reference, this is about 9 miles from 101 and San Antonio Road. Continue onto Redwood Shores Parkway, then follow the signs to Sea Chase Drive and look for the Bair Island Parking sign, about 2 miles after exiting from 101. Do not park in the private residence parking areas.

We should see a variety of shore birds. Wear walking shoes and bring water, sunscreen, hat and jacket - the weather may be breezy along the bay. There are restrooms at the entry to the Bair Island Parking.

Edgewood Open Space Preserve



Meet at the Usual Carpool Location * or if you drive there directly, exit Edgewood Road from Highway 280. Go East (toward the bay). Go 1 mile on Edgewood Road to the Edgewood Park and Day Camp sign on your right and turn right onto Old Stage Road. Park in the parking lot just off Edgewood Road (There is an inner parking lot, but it probably will be full).

With all the rain that we have been having, this should be a great year for spring wildflowers. Edgewood County Park and Natural Preserve is a great place to see them. Although our hike will be relatively short (about 4.5 miles) and has only about 550 feet of elevation gain, it has something for everyone. It has lovely shady trails along steep canyons, sunny grassy hillsides with a wide variety of wildflowers (not to mention butterflies), hilltops covered with live oaks and buckeyes, and great views of the San Francisco Bay. I recommend wearing long pants (and/or keeping in the middle of the trails), as there are sometimes poison oak vines along the side of the trails.

Volunteering at RAFT By John McCabe

On a stormy day in February, 10 HPREC volunteers got together at RAFT (Resource Areas For Teaching). We caught up with each other and helped create kits that will inspire a new generation of students learn STEM subjects through handson activities.

One of the kits that we made a large number of is called "Scalloped Circle String Art." It provides colored strings and simple cardboard shapes to allow kids to create artistic designs based on intriguing mathematical patterns. String art is fun for all ages -- every pattern has infinite possibilities! To fix a mistake or try a new approach, just unwind the string! As my grandkids say, "Easy peasy lemon squeezy!"

Another kit we helped make is called "Glove-a-Phone." This kit has disposable vinyl gloves, tubes, rubber bands, and lesson plans. Using these materials, students will create musical (in the broadest sense of the word) instruments and discover first-hand a wide range of explorations into the science of sound. I'm sure that the kids will have lots of fun making all sorts of loud sounds with them!

The third kit we helped make is one that we were tempted to use ourselves. It uses CDs, rubber balloons, and other items to make hovercrafts. The kits we helped make will allow students to create hovercrafts that gracefully glide all over the place on a thin cushion of air. Sounds like fun to me! While doing this, students will be exposed to the science of motion,

We saw canvasbacks, ruddy ducks, northern shovelers, mallards, great egrets, avocets, blacknecked stilts, American white pelicans, double-crested cormorants, Canada geese, sandpipers, a turkey vulture, and a bufflehead. If you do the same hike during similar times of the year, you might also see lots of other ducks including pintails, gadwalls, widgeons, and goldeneyes. Also seen regularly at the Baylands are herons, godwits, willets, curlews, dowitchers harriers, coots, and grebes. We may have seen some of these, but we were more interested in keeping up the pace rather than bird watching.



If you would like to do a similar hike, you should go to Byxbee Park. To get there, take US-101 to the Oregon Expressway / Embarcadero Road exit (Exit 402), take Embarcadero Road East (toward the airport and bay) past the golf course to where it ends at a "T" intersection. Turn right onto Embarcadero Way, turn left into Byxbee Park, and park in the parking lot. We took the Adobe Creek Loop Trail. We took a side excursion to Mountain View's Shoreline Lake to eat our lunches on the benches there. We hiked back along the East Bayshore Frontage Road. After crossing Matadero Creek, we took a right turn to go between the Emily Renzel Wetlands and Matadero Creek. As our entire hike up to that point was completely level, we took to the Byxbee Park Hills to get great views of the areas we had been hiking.

Paul Solomon Zygielbaum, July 1, 1950 - January 25, 2019, 68

Paul passed away after a more than 15-year battle with mesothelioma. A long-time resident of Santa Rosa, California, Paul dedicated his life to promoting laws and regulations that protect people from asbestos exposure, advocating for American ideals of freedom, equality, fairness, and access to medical care. He is the son of Holocaust survivors, Joseph and Adele Zygielbaum (both deceased). He received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Engineering and Applied Science in 1972 and a Master of Science in Mechanical Engineering in 1973 from the California Institute of Technology. In 1987, Paul earned a Master in Business Administration from Golden Gate University.

Paul had a rich technical and managerial career beginning in 1972 as an engineer at the NASA/CALTECH Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Focusing his early career on advanced research in electric power generation, he worked for the Electric Power Research Institute. He then became a manager in engineering methods and processes for Hewlett-Packard and Agilent Technologies. In 2004, he helped to start a company, C8 MediSensors, working toward noninvasive technology to measure blood glucose levels for people with diabetes.

Paul's battle with cancer began, most likely, when he unknowingly ingested asbestos while helping to convert a power plant in Oregon to using coal.

He loved to travel. Paul and his wife, Michelle, visited much of the world in several trips and in a round-the-world private jet tour. Meeting, befriending, and getting to know people were key to Paul. That helped form his deep dedication to the welfare of others.

A student of early American politics, Paul developed expertise on the people who created America, its ethics and political system. He was actively consulted by top leaders as well as aspiring candidates of the Democratic Party.

Paul has been a member of Congregation Beth Ami for 35 years, president of the congregation and board member for 10 years. Reflecting his interest in people, he was an active board member for more than 5 years of the Career Technical Education Foundation, an organization dedicated to attracting children to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. He was a founding member and active in the Asbestos Disease Awareness Organization.
