Spring Fling Report By John McGowan

Seventy-five HPREC members and guests gathered March 20 at Mariani's Restaurant in Santa Clara to enjoy a good meal and hear **Mike Viskovich** from Keysight Technologies (Vice President of Global Sourcing, Real Estate and Workplace Solutions). Mike provided a powerful report on Keysight's actions in response to the Sonoma County fires in 2018 that damaged the Santa Rosa site extensively. One employee lost his life, and 119 employees lost their homes. As leader of the emergency response effort, Mike learned of the fire with a 2:00 am phone call, and by 4:30 had begun assembling a response center and was mobilizing efforts to safeguard employees and the facility. With personal safety as highest priority, the leadership team worked long hours for days contacting and offering assistance to employees and their families. Only after the people had been cared for did the long task of finding new office space and refurbishing the damaged Santa Rosa campus begin.

He has a family connection to HP, Agilent and Keysight, as his wife Megan worked at HP TMO in the 1990s for Larry Potter, and his father Joe Viskovich worked for HP, including in Cupertino for Data Systems Division in the 1980s. Mike's wife, father and mother all attended the luncheon as well.

The Club thanks **Harold Kaye**, **Jo-Ann Butler**, **Paula Hoelker-williams**, **Nadine Melanson** (obtained guest speaker), and other volunteers for making this year's luncheon a successful gathering for the retirees.

After sharing the story of the fire and Keysight impacts and responses, Mike offered an update on Keysight's performance and financial health since separating from Agilent in 2013. CEO Ron Nersesian and his team have led the electronics industry with innovative designs to enable rollout of 5G wireless technology, automotive, software and services solutions. These solutions have helped fuel impressive profitable growth since the launch of Keysight. Total shareholder return has been very positive, outperforming some higher profile tech and social media companies along the way.

Mike joined HP after graduating from Santa Clara University in 1994 and worked in a variety of finance, marketing and sales support functions prior to joining Agilent in 1999, and then Keysight when it split in 2013.

HP Memory Project Update Submitted by John Minck, HPREC member and contact for HPMemoryProject.org historical summaries.

Curator Note – First published in the HPMemoryProject.org website, March, 2017

Many interesting HP stories develop from readers of this website. Barry Fowler contacted us to thank us for preserving the memories. He sent along a past recollection that reflected on the humanity of Bill and Flora Hewlett. We had heard internal stories over the years that the Hewlett Packard Medical Benefit plan got established because of certain medical disasters which promised to devastate an employee's life financially. My original assumption was that **Joe Navarro**, the father in this story, was an HP employee in 1951. But his text shows he hired on in 1968. So, this means that Bill Hewlett's generous and anonymous payment of the large medical bill had only their family pediatrician in common. Bill's experience could well have convinced him that comprehensive medical plans were crucial for employee financial protection.

We were able to contact John and Joe for permission to republish their story, which appeared on an HP website in remembrance of Bill Hewlett, shortly after his passing in 2001. We are pleased to repeat the story, herewith. John's sister Rosemary reports that her father just died this March 12th at the age of 95.

On 3/12/2017 10:01 pm **Barry Fowler** wrote:

My name **is Barry Fowler**. My history with HP started in 1977. I first worked for Computer Service Division in Sunnyvale, then DSD in Cupertino (Production Engineer on the 1000 M and E systems), then transferred to HP Roseville. I also bounced off HP Ft. Collins for a couple of years. I worked in various engineering roles in Roseville, ending with the Failure Analysis lab there.

I really appreciate the HPMemoryProject website. I got to know many of the HP computer and test products working in my various positions at Hewlett-Packard. I haven't had the time to go through the entire website, but I very much like what I have read. HP's founders were very remarkable people at all levels, starting with Bill and Dave. The website brings back those days to me.

I retired from HP in 2012 after a 35-year career with HP. It was a great company.

Here's a story about Bill Hewlett that I saved from quite some time ago. It was published on a HP website in remembrance of Bill Hewlett, shortly after his passing. John Navarro himself posted the story. That HP internal website allowed people to comment about Bill Hewlett. This story will forever be in my mind, an example of the concern Bill and Dave had for their employees and their families.

HP Memory Project Update (Continued)

The Story of Premature Baby John Navarro and Bill Hewlett

My older brother Dan was born July 8, 1950. Then, two and a half months later my mother found out she was pregnant with me. I was born at the old Stanford Hospital on March 31, 1951. I was three months premature and weighed 1 pound 14 ounces. In 1951, doctors didn't have the technology and knowledge they do today; extremely premature babies didn't have much chance of living. The doctors did not expect me to live—and if by some chance I did—they thought I would probably have many health problems.

Since they did not expect me to live, Dr. Cutter, my pediatrician, approached my parents and asked if they could experiment with me to help understand why premature babies either developed eye problems or crippling leg defects. They had found that previous premature babies, who were in an incubator receiving 100 percent pure oxygen and not exposed to the outside elements, developed problems with either their eyes or legs. They decided to give me less oxygen to see if that made any difference.

At that time, I was the smallest baby born at Stanford Hospital. I had to be fed with an eyedropper and they used handkerchiefs as diapers. The doctors experimented with the oxygen levels and I continued to get stronger and gain weight. They were surprised that the effects of my premature birth were minimal. I did not develop problems with my legs or eyes.

After about six months, I had gained more than five pounds, and my parents were finally able to take me home. When my father went to make arrangements to pay the hospital bill, my parents were told that they didn't need to worry because all of the medical bills had been paid for by a person who wished to remain anonymous. This was such a relief for my parents who had worried how they would ever be able to pay for the treatment I had received. My father wanted to know who had been so generous, but the hospital could not disclose this information.

I arrived at home still a small, fragile baby. Back in those days, doctors still made house calls. The doctor would occasionally knock at our front door asking for a cup of coffee while on his way to see other patients. After his cup of coffee, he would tell my mother, "Since I'm here, let me check out the kids," and would give us an examination. One day, when I was 11 years old, he made one of his usual visits to our house. Since he was quitting his practice, he was going to tell my father who had paid the medical bills - It was Bill and Flora Hewlett.

It turns out that Dr. Cutter was also Bill and Flora's pediatrician for their children. It was through him that Bill and Flora had heard about the tiny baby in the nursery fighting for life. This meant a lot to my parents. My father is a very proud man, and he always wanted to repay the Hewletts for their kindness and generosity.

In 1968, my father Joe Navarro started working at Hewlett-Packard. While he was working there in 1972, he helped me get an interview at HP, and I was hired. My father was a loyal HP employee and always gave it everything he could. He retired in 1985 after 15-plus years of service. After I started working at Hewlett-Packard, I thought maybe I should thank Bill myself. I called Bill Hewlett's office and thanked him personally for all he had done for my family and me. Bill remembered the tiny baby in the hospital and was very happy to know that his generosity 21 years prior had made such a difference

After 28 years of service, I left HP to join Agilent, but I still have very deep roots to HP.

Below is an article from the June 1989 HPREC newsletter, giving recognition to **Bob Kalsey** for computerizing the HPREC database.

The main reason we are able to keep our membership roster accurate and up-to-date — the new members we listed are those who retired in May and June — is, in a nutshell, Bob Kalsey. He designed the programs that established our membership data and has continuously refined and improved the database so that we can keep track of hire date, division, retire date, address and last, but not least, spouse's name for all our members.

Fortunately for us, Bob is one of those who are completely enchanted with computers. For many of us who managed to do our jobs for years without the help of computers, the initial introduction to them was painful to say the least. Looking back, some of our early experiences were so bizarre and frustrating that it's a wonder we survived and came to appreciate how much they could do for us under the right conditions. But Bob was one of those who right from the start saw the potential, and realized the benefits to an organization like HPREC of computerizing the records, and happily undertook the job. Oscar Bettendorf has now taken over the membership chairmanship and is reaping the benefits of Bob's pioneering efforts.

Now that doesn't mean that Bob is out of a job. On the contrary, as Treasurer, he is one of the officers of HPREC and still has lots of scope to exercise his fascination with computers. When you all fill out your little slips to attend some event and send your checks, Bob is the one who goes to the post office and picks them up, enters the information into the database, prints out a list for Fred Andersen, makes sure you have a

non-responsibility declaration on file and deposits the money.

He keeps track of the money coming in and going out for the various events as part of the overall balance because he is also in charge of the membership dues — he sends you the notice reminding you to renew your membership.

Needless to say, all the financial documents are on computer, and Bob interfaces with HP's financial and legal departments in matters pertaining to taxes and incorporation. An organization with over 600 members can no longer operate on an informal, folksy basis.

Not surprisingly, Bob is HPREC's contact for the Employee Purchase Program for computers and peripherals, and is up on all the latest stuff. He and his wife are most faithful and enthusiastic participants in almost all the HPREC affairs — and have pictures to prove it! And last, but not least, you wouldn't be receiving this mailing were it not for Bob's program that prints out your names and addresses on labels. So, if you suspect that you haven't received your stuff, you know who to blame. And the likelihood of that happening is just about nil — Bob's thoroughness and attention to detail are unmatched and we all owe him a great big vote of thanks for all his efforts on our behalf, and not least for his unfailing good humor and enthusiasm. Nothing is too big or too small to merit his attention. Thank you, Bob, for all your hard work, contributions and dedication to HPREC.

Identity Theft - Beware and Be SAFE! Provided by Carol Nakamoto and John McGowan

With security breaches that have occurred in recent years, we should all assume that our information will be compromised. Sadly, your best and only real defense against ID theft is to monitor your information regularly to catch problems early

	Any telephone call you get (live or robotic) threatening you with jail or fines or arrest is going to be a scam. Don't



Arastradero Preserve was established in the 1970's. The City of Palo Alto purchased the property from Arastra Ltd for \$7.5M and, in 1981, the property was designated as parkland. In 2004, it was renamed the Enid-Pearson Arastradero Preserve to honor the former city council member and environmentalist.

The Preserve is 533 acres and has numerous hiking, biking and equestrian trails within its confines. One can also access Palo Alto's Foothills Park via one of the trails. Arastradero Lake, which we will visit, is a mere 20-minute walk from the Preserve headquarters.

Meet at the Usual Carpool Location * or, if you drive directly to the Fitzgerald Marine Preserve, take I-280 northbound, use the 2nd from the right lane to take exit 33 for State Route 92 West toward Half Moon Bay. When CA 92 ends, turn right onto CA-1 N/Cabrillo Hwy N, drive 6.2 miles and turn left onto California Ave. When California Ave. ends, go right on Lake Street and into the Fitzgerald Marine Preserve parking area.

This hike is from the Fitzgerald Marine Preserve, Moss Beach to the Pillar Point Harbor jetty and back. Last taken in 2017, the hike has been described as lovely, cool, fun and pleasant. This is a bluff-top route past the Moss Beach Distillery to the area where the Mavericks surf contest is held. The bluff is climbed twice. The rest of the hike is fairly level. None of the hike is on sand, but we expect to see resting harbor seals on the beaches.

Fall Creek Hike



- Meet at the Usual Carpool Location * or, if you drive there directly, take Hwy 17 South from Los Gatos to Mt. Hermon Road (exit 3) West (turn right toward Felton) for 3.5 miles to Graham Hill Road (where road ends), right for 0.2 miles to the next stop light (Highway 9). Turn left on Highway 9 and go through downtown Felton for 0.7 miles to the entrance of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park. Turn left into the park and proceed to the Park Entrance Station. The entrance fee is \$10 per vehicle (\$9 if 62 years old or bring your Annual Pass if you have one). We will have about 20 minutes to visit the restrooms, gift shop and Roaring Camp railroad. Next, we will move the cars to the trailhead on Felton Empire Road.
- Fall Creek (a unit of Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park) is in Felton. Note that this hike is well suited to hot July weather. The trails are completely shaded and the locals claim that the creek runs all the time. Fall Creek features the former site of lime kilns and a barrel mill and is second-growth mixed evergreen forest. Most of the hike will be along creeks with minimal elevation gain.



Santa Clara Science Fair By John McCabe

If you ever want to restore your faith in the next generation, you should go to, or better yet, volunteer at a science fair. 2019 was the 60th year for the Santa Clara Science Fair, aka the Santa Clara Valley Science and Engineering Fair, aka the Synopsys Science & Technology Championship. Whatever you call it, it is a major operation. This year we had 1,152 students from 106 schools show 859 projects. There were 456 middle school students and 696 high school students. Over 40% of the students presenting projects had participated in a previous year. For a few of the students, it was their seventh year presenting projects at the Santa Clara Science Fair. About 51% of the students were female. The projects were judged by 510 judges. It takes a whole host of volunteers to make this happen successfully. A number of the volunteers were HPREC members.

The Santa Clara Science Fair is renowned for presenting some of the best projects in the country. They routinely win prizes at the state and national level. A total of 136 students from the Synopsys Championship qualified to compete at the California State Science and Engineering Fair (CSEF) in late April. Fourteen of these students will be awarded expense-paid trips to CSEF. The projects are on topics that will definitely make this world a better place. I went around and looked at the students' projects. I could barely understand the titles of many of the projects, let alone fully understand them.

Thanks to all our members who came out to volunteer for this wonderful event.

As forecast, the weather was sunny, cool, windy and free of rain for our trip to the Coyote Hills. From the visitor center, we began by walking across the main marsh on the Chochenyo Trail. The usual large number of birds (ducks, egrets, gulls, and a bird of prey) was present around the marsh. A pleasant surprise was the Lizard Rock Trail which has been nicely upgraded with new gravel. The Bayview Trail brought us close to Alameda Creek and the start of the hills.

Eleven hikers tested themselves as we used the Red Hill Trail to climb about 300 feet over three large hills. The strong winds added to the challenge. We followed the Soaproot Trail and the Quail Trail to reach the Dairy Glen picnic area where we enjoyed a wind-free lunch. The photo was taken at the Dairy Glen. The wildlife seen during each visit varies widely. Just four days earlier, a rabbit and three house cats had been seen during a pre-hike by our leader and his wife. During a visit in 2017, this group had to skirt a large group of wild turkeys in the middle of the Red Hill Trail.

1906. The 94301 Zip Code, which includes the Crescent Park portion of Palo Alto, as well as Palo Alto's Professorville, is said to have the priciest homes in the nation. Although it is bordered by bustling University Avenue, the Crescent Park area, with its mature trees and variety of architectural styles, has a small-town feel. We walked by some very nice homes with some very nice gardens.

The most prominent house we walked around was the John Adams Squire House. It was built on University Avenue in 1904-1905 for John Adam Squire, a lecturer in Classics.

We also walked around the estate of Priscilla Chan and Mark Zuckerberg. Priscilla is a pediatrician; Mark is the co-founder and CEO of Facebook. Together they run the Chan Zuckerberg

Initiative. Its aim is to "advance human potential and promote equality in areas such as health, education, scientific research and energy."

SF Stairways of Corona Heights, Twin Peaks Foothills and Upper Haight

Ten hikers gathered at San Francisco's Randall Museum on a sunny and increasingly windy spring day. The 3-mile route taken was derived from three hikes in Stairway Walks in San Francisco. The route included most of the 'Upper Market' walk and some portions of the 'Twin Peak Foothills' and 'Upper Haight' walks. The route was kept short as our elevation changes amounted to 850 feet.





The hike features pretty stairways such as the Vulcan, Saturn and Pemberton stairs. The best views were from the Tank Hill Open Space and the Randall Museum. The group picture was taken at the Mt. Olympus monument.

From the Randall Museum, the group followed Museum Way to Roosevelt, turned left on Roosevelt to Levant, descended Levant and turned left to descend the Vulcan Stairs. We then turned right on Ord to the Saturn Stairs, climbed the stairs and then continued onto Saturn to Temple, turned left on Temple and crossed 17th, turned right to the first street, which is Mars, turned left to Corbett, turned right to Clayton and viewed the neighborhood garden. We crossed Clayton and climbed the Pemberton Stairs which cross two streets, turned right on Crown, crossed Twin Peaks Boulevard and climbed the stairs to Tank Hill.

We retraced our steps to Twin Peaks Boulevard and turned left to Clayton, crossed both Clayton and 17th, turned right and climbed the Monument Stairs to Upper Terrace, turned left to the Olympus Monument and used the stairs next to 480 Upper Terrace to descend to the lower part of Upper Terrace, turned left and continued to Buena Vista Park, climbed the wide service road to the grassy knoll and

descended to Upper Terrace, continued to Masonic, turned left to Masonic, turned left to Roosevelt, crossed Roosevelt to Museum, and followed Museum to our starting point.

Bair Island Lite Hike By Barbara Beebe (Leader) with photo by Steve Mar

On a gorgeous spring day, 16 hikers made their way to Redwood City to explore a portion of Bair Island. Most had never been there so were eager to check out this area billed as "A breath of fresh air amid the urban jungle."



Opened in late 2015, Bair Island is actually three islands (inner, middle and outer) of mudflats and salt marsh vegetation, and a hot spot for birds and marine wildlife, although we saw few of either. Once used for cattle ranching, farming and salt production, levees were built to prevent the flow of tidal waters around the island. In 1997, work began to restore the island to its natural state. In 2015, the final levee was breached, and waters of the Bay came back to re-shape the land over time. We hiked the inner island on trails built between 2013 and 2015. Owned by the State of California, the area is managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as part of the Don Edwards San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge.

You may reach Bair Island going either direction on US101. Take exit 409 East at Whipple Road, then keep right and follow the frontage road (East Bayshore Road) into the roundabout, where you will then head east on Bair Island Road. Look for the Bair Island Parking sign on the right just before the Villas apartments and the marina, about 1 mile after exiting 101. You will find restrooms and a very good map there.
