

Meet at the NEW and JUST REVISED (2-15-20) carpool location* or if you drive there directly, exit Edgewood Road from Highway 280. Go East (toward the bay). Go 1 mile on Edgewood Road to the Edgewood Park and Day Camp sign on your right and turn right onto Old Stage Road. Park in the parking lot just off Edgewood Road (There is an inner parking lot, but it probably will be full.)

The focus will be on native wildflowers. These wildflowers are better adapted to soils with serpentine minerals. Edgewood is known for having serpentine soils.

Our route will use the Sylvan, Serpentine, Clarkia, Sunset and Edgewood Trails. We will circle the Ridgeview Area, but not visit it.

April and May are the best times to visit Edgewood Park. Join us as we search for a large number of native wildflowers. This is especially true near the Clarkia Trail.

Long pants are recommended as a guard against poison oak vines along the sides of some of the trails.

Cooley Landing Park Lite Hike



Cooley Landing Park is a little-known park along the Bay shoreline in East Palo Alto. There are some historical markers explaining the significance of the site, which was once a port providing access to the mid-peninsula. There are also markers showing how the shoreline of the Bay has shifted over the years. The walking paths go through marshy wetlands and along the shore.

To find the Park, take University Ave. into East Palo Alto, and turn right (if coming from 101) on Bay Road. Bay Road narrows and goes through an isolated industrial area, but eventually dead ends at a modern looking Education Center at the eastern end of the road. The Education Center is usually closed, but there is ample parking available at the location.

Note: Individual arrangements for carpooling are encouraged.

The NEW and JUST REVISED (2-15-20) carpool location is at 1501 Page Mill Rd., Palo Alto 94306. This is the current headquarters of HP Inc. To get there, take I-280 to Page Mill Road (PMR). Proceed 2.1 miles east on PMR across Junipero Serra Blvd/Foothill Expressway to Peter Coutts Rd. At the intersection, turn right into the entrance and through the gate. Proceed straight ahead to the 2nd stop sign and turn right to meet the group. Please note: There are no restroom facilities so please make plans accordingly.

Three San Francisco Tiled Stairways & Land's End Hike - 01/14/2020

Twelve hikers gathered at our new carpool location which is the open area away from HP Inc's buildings at 1501 Page Mill Road in Palo Alto. Entrance to this parking lot is at Peter Coutts Road. Parking is much easier than it had been at the Arastradero Preserve, but we have no access to toilets. A stop at the Father Serra rest stop on I-280 solved that.

We first saw the 16th Avenue (Moraga) Tiled Steps. The bottom of the 163 steps is located at Moraga Street and 16th Avenue in San Francisco. Completed in 2005 as the first tiled steps in the city, these steps are a creative, community-driven mosaic project featuring a flowing sea to stars design. We climbed to the top and enjoyed the succulents planted along the sides. The views from the top toward the ocean were spectacular.

We visited our second set of tiled steps by walking a few blocks north. The Hidden Garden Steps are indeed hidden from the top. The 148 steps descend to the north from 16th Avenue near Lawton Street. Completed in 2013, these steps feature large scale flowers and a whimsical snake.

For our third tiled stairway, we drove to the Lincoln Park Steps. Completed in 2015, these 52 steps are located at the west end of California Street at Lincoln Park. They are tiled in an art deco design. Parking is impossible, so each carpool driver stayed with their car while the passengers photographed and climbed up and down the stairway.

Street west to the Land's End Lookout Center parking lot above the Sutro Baths ruins. When the Land's End trails are dry, you can visit the Palace of the Legion of Honor grounds and then return to your vehicle. Including the side trip to the Palace of the Legion of Honor, the total time from the carpool location is about 4.25 hours. The total hiking time is about two hours over three miles, including 363 steps.

Up again to the top of the dam on the Stevens Creek Tony Look Trail. We stopped at a shady place for lunch. After lunch, we continued up and down and up and down on the Stevens Creek Tony Look Trail back to the Madrone Picnic Area. The

Getting there: From I-280, take the Foothill Blvd Exit and drive south on Foothill Blvd that turns into Stevens Canyon Road, past the dam, the quarry and picnic area, past the Lookout Trailhead to the Madrone Picnic Area on the left side of the road (about 4.4 miles).

On February 19, 12 hikers meandered through Cupertino neighborhoods between Cupertino's Memorial Park and the Don Burnett Bicycle-Pedestrian Bridge over I-280 to Homestead Road. The weather was sunny, cool becoming warm, and no wind. We passed some older housing which had become a mix of original houses without sidewalks and large new homes. The hike took a bit more than an hour.

The 2.25- mile hike is mostly level and entirely paved. You may bring your leashed dog and your wheelchair.

There are restrooms at the start and finish of the hike. Here is the

path we followed: From the restrooms behind the baseball diamond, we walked north across Christensen Drive to Ann Arbor Court, turned right onto Lauretta Drive and then immediately turned left onto Ann Arbor Avenue. We walked the length of Ann Arbor Avenue to Garden Gate School and turned left onto Greenleaf Drive. We turned right onto Castine Avenue. We walked up Castine and then turned left onto Meteor Drive. We took Meteor to Mary and then turned right over the bridge and all the way to Homestead Road. The return route uses the same path.

Getting there: Park in the two-hour parking lot which is the third lot behind (north) the Cupertino Senior Center at 21251 Stevens Creek Blvd, Cupertino. The Senior Center is across from De Anza College at the corner of Mary Avenue and Stevens Creek Blvd. Exit Hwy 85 and then go East on Stevens Creek Blvd.

After turning onto Mary Avenue from Stevens Creek Blvd., take the first driveway on the right. Turn left at the first lot and drive toward the baseball diamond. Please note that it is illegal to park at the Oaks Shopping Center and then walk away from the Shopping Center. The Mary street parking is usually filled with De Anza College student cars.

Kari K. Salomaa

Kari K. Salomaa unexpectedly died quietly in his sleep in late November 2018. He was 68 years old. He had been resting with Susan Barquist, his life partner, after a morning of working together in their forest north of Jenner, felling and limbing dead oak trees.

A naturalized citizen, Kari came to the U.S. at age two from Finland with his parents, Matti and Hanna Salomaa. He was the eldest of four children. The family lived in Quincy, Massachusetts. Parents and brother Paul predeceased Kari.

Kari excelled at North Quincy High School, class of 1968. He was awarded a full academic scholarship to MIT. There, he enjoyed intensive study and mastery of sailing on the Charles River for five years while also studying a wide range of scientific offerings. He found his passion, graduating in 1973 in Mechanical Engineering, which he practiced his entire career and in his home shop after parting from HP (Agilent) in 2002.

Kari was an innovative and technically brilliant inventor, taking products through to full manufacturing, devising manufacturing analysis, tooling and methods. Patent topics include microdilution automation (Cetus) and lightwave technology (Hewlett Packard/Agilent Technologies).

On and off the job, Kari was the Go-To-Person for 'How does this work?' type questions, which he relished, and always had time for clear explanations and interesting examples. He also had a vast repertory of tales about his experiences and observations and was a consummate and engaging storyteller. Topics ranged from his childhood bank account getting swapped for his father's to repairing major structural damage to his motorcycle inflicted by a tornado in Missouri, using tools and materials from a big box store across the road from the motel. He was so pleased with his impromptu repair results that the fix continued 'as is' for the full 8,000-mile trip. Before the long trips, Kari always tore down his favorite motorcycle, a BMW K100 RS and spent time admiring the fine details and lack of wear of the well-maintained and beautifully engineered parts while rebuilding it back to trip readiness.

Susan and Kari were joyful motorcycle riding companions for more than 40 years. They lived happily on their very steep 50 acres of Redwood forest a mile from the Pacific Ocean, north of the town of Jenner, California. They designed and constructed their own buildings and worked in their forest and garden as well as at their engineering careers. Kari served 15 years on the Jenner Volunteer Fire Department (Susan, 10) in the '80s and '90s. They responded to emergency calls from home where Kari maintained one of the Jenner engines. They traveled to Finland many times to sightsee and visit relatives and friends. In the U.S. and Canada, the travel was usually two-up or Kari alone on motorcycle. He enjoyed many four-to-six-week-long explorations of back roads in 49 states and all of Canada. Kari always engaged people he encountered with open and congenial conversation and assistance if needed on the roadside, at stores, cafes, the post office, jobsites, campsites - everywhere.

Looking back in later years he estimated that he might have approached a million motorcycle miles including the road trips, commuting to work and recreation started in pre-teen years.

He loved every minute of it. Ride on.
