





Meet at the Sanborn County Park. During this COVID-19 season, we will not attempt forming carpools. From Saratoga, take Hwy 9 toward Skyline. After 2.5 miles, turn left onto Sanborn Road for 1.1 miles to the park entrance. After passing the toll booth, take the first right turn for the Peterson parking lot.

Sanborn County Park has predominantly north facing slopes with mixed evergreen forests of oak, madrone, Douglas fir and redwoods. The San Andreas Fault cuts diagonally through the park. It is/used to be the home of Silicon Valley Shakespeare which has held Shakespeare outdoor (now digital) performances in the park/now online.

We will hike the steep San Andreas Trail for 2.3 miles, a 1300 ft climb. After a lunch stop, it's all downhill along the Sanborn Trails back to the parking lot. Bring a lunch and plenty of water.

Long pants are recommended as a guard against poison oak vines along the sides of some of the trails.

From Hwy 101, the Bayshore Freeway, take Embarcadero Road northeast (toward the airport) until it ends; go left at the "T" intersection and past the Duck Pond. When you see a sign on the left saying "City of Palo Alto Lucy Evans Nature Center" on your left, park in the lot across from it.

We'll start at the Lucy Evans Nature Center and walk along the creeks and sloughs by the airport and golf course looking for birds and other wildlife.

Meet at the Monte Bello Parking Lot on Page Mill Road. During this COVID-19 season, we will not attempt forming carpools. The parking lot is 7 miles west of Highway 280 and 1.5 miles east of Skyline Boulevard. There is parking space for about 45 cars. There is a porta potty at the parking lot.

Cooley Landing Park is a little-known park along the Bay shoreline in East Palo Alto. There are some historical markers explaining the significance of the site, which was once a port providing access to the mid-Peninsula. There are also markers showing how the shoreline of the Bay has shifted over the years. The walking paths go through marshy wetlands and along the shore.

To find the park, take University Ave. into East Palo Alto, and turn right (if coming from 101) on Bay Road. Bay Road narrows and goes through an isolated industrial area, but eventually dead ends at a modern looking Education Center at the eastern end of the road. The Education Center is usually closed, but there is ample parking available at the location.



* The carpool location (temporarily not in use) is at 1501 Page Mill Rd., Palo Alto 94306. This is the current headquarters of HP Inc. To get there, take I-280 to Page Mill Road (PMR). Proceed 2.1 miles east on PMR across Junipero Serra Blvd/Foothill Expressway to Peter Coutts Rd. At the intersection, turn right into the entrance and through the gate. Proceed straight ahead to the 2nd stop sign and turn right to meet the group. Please note: There are no restroom facilities so please make plans accordingly.

Bear Creek Redwoods Open Space Preserve - 3/10/20

Twelve hikers enjoyed a perfect day weather-wise for a nearly six-mile hike in one of the newest Mid-Peninsula Open Space District preserves, Bear Creek Redwoods. First opened in 2019, the District has a 20-year phased plan to restore

the property's natural environment and to discover its local history. The property formerly housed a close-knit equestrian community of century-old Bear Creek Stables, mill ponds, magnificent estates and Alma College, the first Jesuit school of theology on the West Coast. The Alma College area is currently closed. It will be opened in the future once some restoration is completed.

The group started on the Alma Trail which was fairly steep for about one mile. We then ventured onto the Redwood Springs Trail which rose up for about another half-



mile, then leveled off on a welcome ridge for a bit and descended to our lunch spot. After lunch, we then continued back on the Alma Trail to our starting point. The walk back on the Alma Trail took us through some old growth redwoods, shaded oak and grasslands and a visit to an old abandoned cabin site most likely used by loggers in the mid-1800s and beyond. From the parking area, the group took the Upper Lake Interpretive Walk (0.2 miles) which provided historical information about the property.

So, when Bill Hewlett's second wife, Rosemary, who was also German, needed some document notarized, her chauffeur would drive her over in front of Bldg 5, and Sigrid would go out to sit in the car and chat, and notarize the doc. At that time, she was married to Leo McCrary, who worked in shipping, and the name McCrary might be more recognizable to HP people. Sigrid Lucas broke her pelvis as a result of a fall, passing away a few weeks afterwards. Sigrid had been living independently until eighteen months ago when she broke a leg in a fall and began to require assistance with her daily routine.

Sigrid was born in Hannover, Germany. The death of her father when she was only two years old was traumatic for her and her sister until her mother married a much older man who at least could put food on the table. She completed a two-year Jr college diploma where she learned most of her secretarial skills. During WWII she was a personal assistant to a German General, where she was often saddled with the grim task of sending families glowing reports about their dead conscripted 14-year-old child who in fact was shot while running from gunfire.

After WWII her husband and two kids moved to Montreal, Canada. They had hoped they could emigrate to America, however American defense industry at that time was only looking for highly talented technical engineers to help in the space race.

The family caught a break in 1963 when the tech companies started actually building what was on paper. Sigrid's husband Werner, a very skilled machinist who came up the through the very demanding German apprenticeship program, was hired immediately. Sigrid tried being a homemaker but that drove her nuts. She hated planting flowers and being tied down. Though it was a nice home on Stockbridge Ave between Atherton and Redwood City, since she did not drive she was totally isolated. She bribed her 15--year-old son, Ralf that if he would drive her to work when he turned 16, she would buy him a car. A deal was struck and within weeks she was back in her element working for an executive at Ampex, the company that created videotape and multitrack audio machines.

She spent the early seventies looking for different scenery and ended up working for an attorney in Palm Desert.

By this time her son Ralf was working at HPTV in Boeblingen, Germany just outside Stuttgart. ITMT Sigrid wanted to come back to the Bay. Ralf suggested that she apply at the HP Temps pool in Palo Alto and the rest is as they say history. Sigrid was back in her

element. She loved working with smart people and taking on the challenges that came with being the right-hand gal of, as she used to say, "the big Boss!"

Sigrid lived mostly in Los Altos. After she retired, she married the love of her life, Dr. Earl Lucas. She spent many hours reading and exploring the streets of downtown Los Altos. She and Earl travelled extensively to her beloved Europe.

Sigrid had a dry sense of humor and could be very direct which could be off-putting to some, but to those who took the time to get to know her she will be forever missed.

Stephen Meyer

I died a rather happy man on March 12, 2020 in Palm Springs, CA of complications of glioblastoma, that nasty brain cancer you may have heard about. I was one of the lucky ones in that when I was diagnosed in August 2014. I was told I had 14-18 months to live. At the time of my death I was in month 67.

I was born January 7, 1951 as John Stephen Meyer on a snowy morning in Evansville, IN to June Fickas Meyer and Herman G Meyer, both of whom have predeceased me.

I graduated from Memorial High School in 1969 and for two years I attended the Indiana State University regional campus which is now the University of Southern Indiana. At that time an opportunity to move to California presented itself and I grabbed that brass ring and ran with it, never looking back. I first landed in Palo Alto, CA south of San Francisco and moved about the San Francisco Peninsula several times before Tony and I moved to San Francisco a couple months after the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, which interrupted the World Series. There I stayed until I moved to Palm Springs, CA in 2013. Curiously, while California is often considered the "earthquake center" in the U.S., and I've been through some doozies, the first earthquake I experienced was the 1968 New Madrid earthquake in Evansville, IN.

I was fortunate to be hired by Hewlett-Packard Company within a year of arriving in California and I enjoyed a 30-year career with H-P before accepting a generous "enhanced" early retirement package in 2002. I stayed retired for a couple years and then worked at a non-profit for a year. That was certainly an eye-opener for me. Then I worked for five years in the office of an immunogenetics laboratory at the University of California-San Francisco. The lab performed genetic and DNA testing for patients needing organ and bone marrow transplants. That was some of the most fascinating work I've ever done.

Duncan MacVicar lived a life full of joy and accomplishment, according to his family. The West Point graduate and business entrepreneur loved singing and enriched the lives of others through tireless community volunteering.

Mr. MacVicar died March 11 at his Los Altos home, surrounded by family. He had recently celebrated his 76th birthday. He had been battling a rare cancer the past three years.

Born in Cleveland, Mr. MacVicar excelled in academics throughout his school years and was accepted to West Point.

EARLY YEARS. Mr. MacVicar served in Vietnam as a combat engineer and company commander. He received two Bronze Stars, two Air Medals and an Army Commendation Medal at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory.

He earned a master's degree in physics from UC Berkeley. While working as a junior physicist at the Livermore Lab, Mr. MacVicar met teacher Jeanne Knox. They later married at the University of Kansas' Danforth Chapel in 1971. They welcomed a daughter, Bryn, in 1975.

Mr. MacVicar pursued a career in marketing that included employment at Hewlett-Packard and Spectra-Physics. Later, he started his own consulting business that focused on high-tech strategic planning. He also enjoyed working with startups and co-authored a book on entrepreneurship, "Managing High-Tech Start-Ups."

He was a longtime member of Los Altos United Methodist Church. Singing in the church choir was a favorite activity.

HELPING OTHERS. Recently, Mr. MacVicar helped initiate and lead Los Altos United Methodist Church's Cancer Support Group. An advocate of social justice, he and Jeanne were members of the church's Accompaniment Team, through which they assisted a Guatemalan mother and her children seek asylum in the U.S. After three years, that effort is still in process. In February, the MacVicars accompanied the mother and children when they appeared before a judge in the immigration court in San Francisco.

In 2004, the MacVicars initiated the Los Altos/Los Altos Hills Relay For Life to benefit the American Cancer Society, which became one of the top Relay events in the nation. Among his many awards and accolades, Los Altos Community Foundation honored him with its John W. Gardner Building Community Award.

DEALING WITH PTSD. As a Vietnam War veteran who experienced post-traumatic stress disorder, Mr. MacVicar put his experience to use in 2011 as a consultant with the California Veterans Legal Task Force. His work focused on helping fellow veterans with service-related mental health problems. Mr. MacVicar worked with the task force to establish Veterans Treatment Courts (VTCs)

throughout Northern California. He also worked nationally to promote diversion and alternative sentencing for veterans, seeking formal recognition of the value of treatment over incarceration.

FOND MEMORIES. Family members underscored Mr. MacVicar's positive outlook, compassion and willingness to help.

Wife Jeanne also paid tribute. "Duncan's greatest joys, in addition to his family, were helping others and serving the community," Jeanne said. "His sense of duty made him a courageous inspiration, always positive to the end."

Mr. MacVicar is survived by his wife of 49 years, Jeanne; daughter Bryn (Chris) Pennington and granddaughters.
